Stacking Overview

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Stacking

A stack is a group of devices that operate as a single chassis.

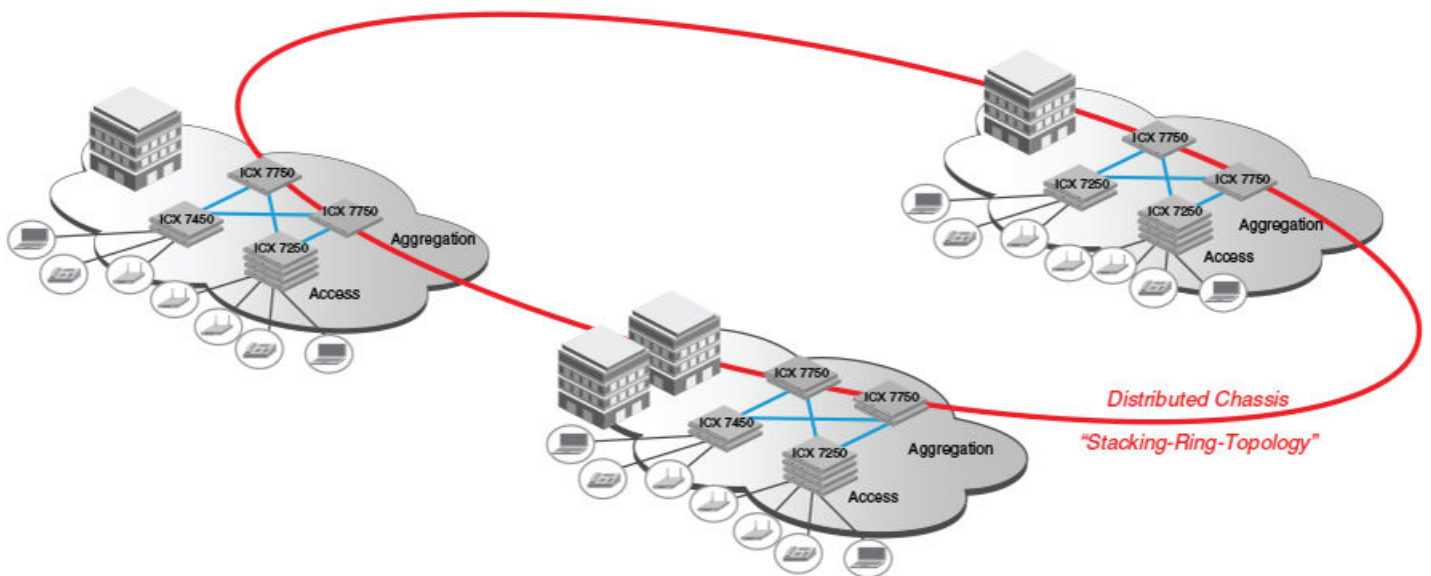
A Ruckus stack contains from two to 12 units configured in a ring or linear topology. The units in a stack are from the same model family; that is, a stack can be an ICX 7150 stack, an ICX 7250 stack, an ICX 7450 stack, an ICX 7650 stack, an ICX 7750, or an ICX 7850 stack.

The members of a stack may be located together. For example, Top-of-rack switches can form a stack that acts as a single switch to manage data center access. Stack members can be physically separated, and the distance between stacking members depends on the type of connector cables used.

Certain fiber optic options increase the potential distance between stacks, which allows members of the same stack to reside in different wiring closets, on different floors of one building, or in different buildings across the campus as illustrated in the following figure. Refer to [FastIron stacking distances and optics by device](#) on page 50 for more information.

Ruckus stackable devices are connected either through dedicated stacking ports or through ports that can be configured for either stacking or data. The location of stacking ports and configuration options differ by device type. Refer to the section on each device type for more information.

Network management and stack configuration

Even when all the switches within a stack are physically distributed, you can manage them as a single entity, enabling one-touch configuration changes via a single IP address.

The active controller manages the other stack units. It maintains the information database for all stack members and downloads software images as needed to all stack units. Each stack also has a standby controller for stack redundancy, and the stack can fail over seamlessly to the standby.

Configuring the stack through the stack interactive-setup utility is straightforward. Stack zero-touch provisioning can be enabled to automate stack interactive-setup so that no user intervention is required. Custom configuration can be combined with automated setup if, for example, you want to add units, move stacking ports, create trunks, or transform a default stacking port into a data uplink port.

Switching and routing advantages

Packet switching between ports on stack units is handled by the hardware. All protocols operate with stacking in the same way as on a chassis system.

You can use stack connections to link distributed switches instead of standard inter-switch links with Layer 2 Spanning Tree Protocol (STP) or Layer 3 routing. Using stack connections has significant advantages:

- Layer 2 simplicity. Stack links do not need to be considered as part of the overall network topology, which means that they can be used to provide resiliency, and Layer 3 routing is not needed to manage traffic flows.
- No closed links. Because the stack links are internal to the switches, they are not seen as part of a Layer 2 network. This means that all links can remain open and can be used to carry traffic simultaneously, maximizing throughput.
- Fast failover. The rapid detection and recovery techniques used on stack links mean that the failure of a link or a switch results in hitless failover, with no impact on user services.

The next section describes Switch Port Extender technology, which is based on an ICX 7650 or ICX 7750 core stack. Refer to the *Ruckus FastIron Campus Fabric Configuration Guide* for more information.

Campus Fabric

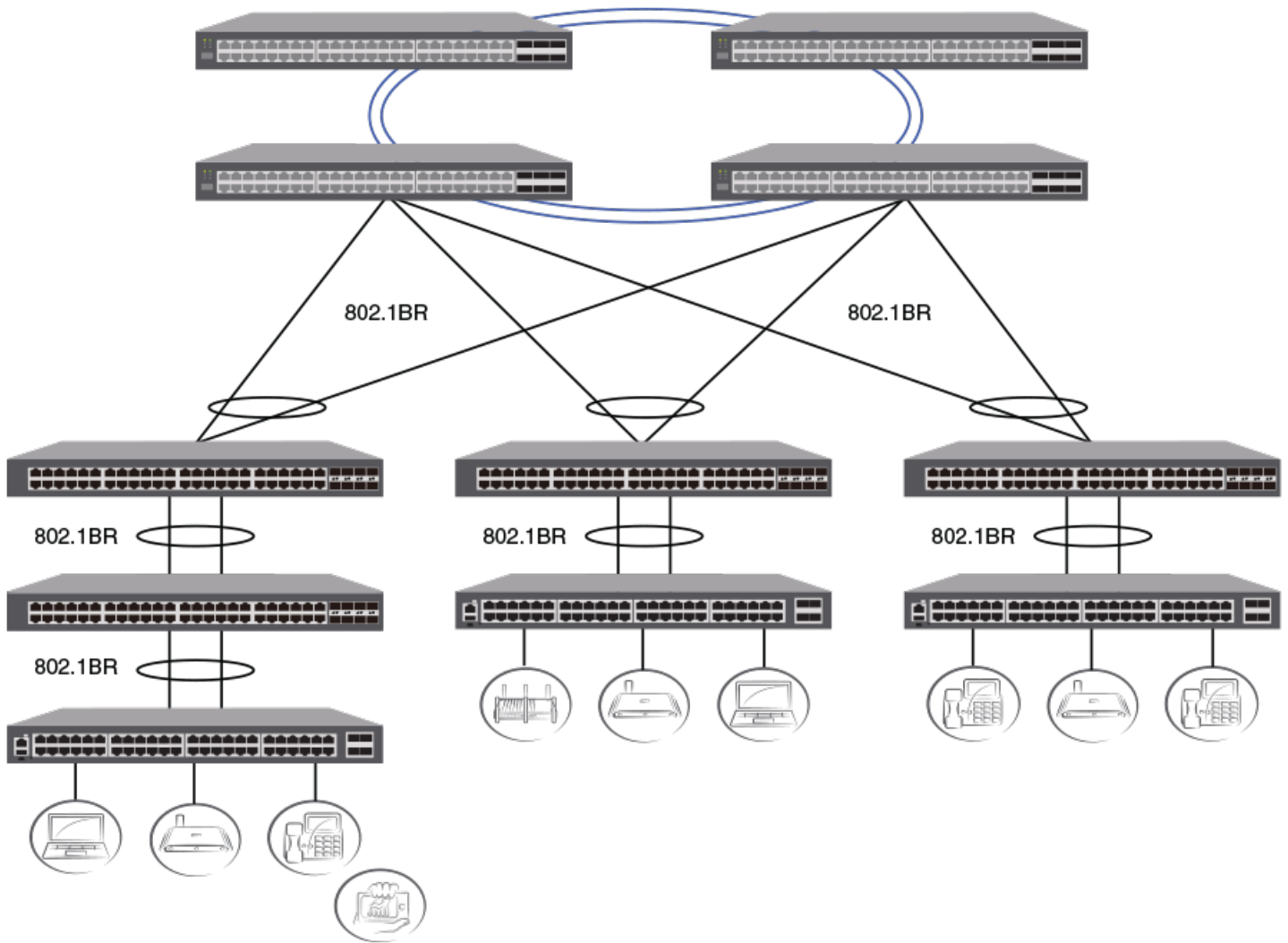
Campus Fabric is sometimes referred to as Switch Port Extender (SPX).

Campus Fabric creates a more scalable architecture based on IEEE 802.1BR standards. Ruckus Campus Fabric architecture adds ICX 7450, ICX 7250, or ICX 7150 devices configured as port extenders (PEs), or PE units, to a set of ICX 7750 or ICX 7650 stack units configured as the control bridge. The ICX 7750 or ICX 7650 control bridge (CB) provides a single point of management for the extended network. Active and standby controller functions are retained and continue to provide hitless recovery as well as extended administrative functions. Campus Fabric greatly increases the number of access devices that the network can support. The distributed CB at the center of Campus Fabric architecture manages PE units and hundreds to thousands of ports at the network edge.

PE units are standards-based devices. Typically lower in cost, PE units rely on the CB for most network functions. As the network expands, new PE units can be detected and added to the network automatically using defined Campus Fabric communication protocols. PE units also inherit Premium-license features from the CB, which further reduces cost.

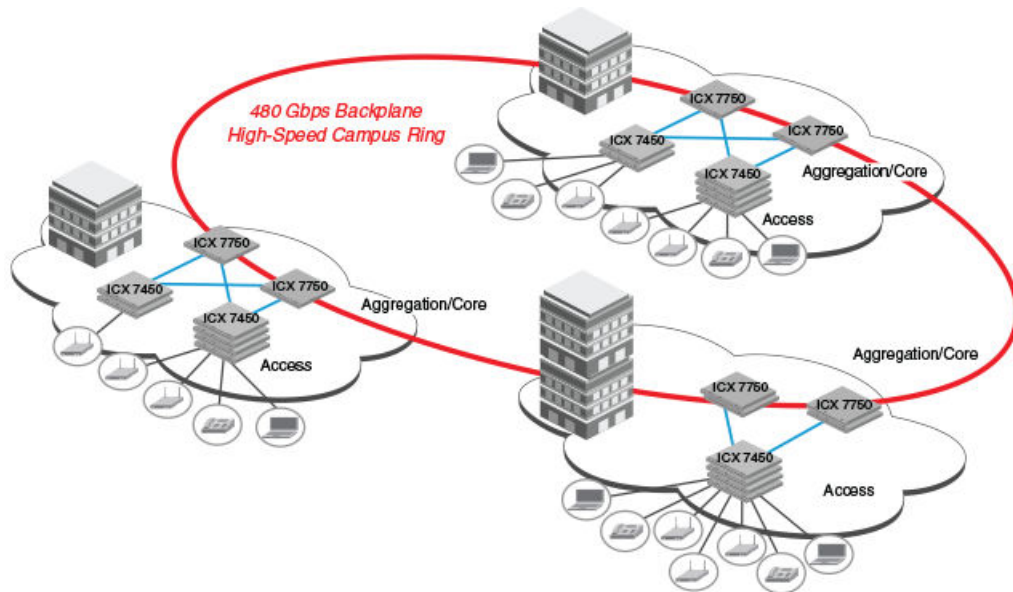
Campus Fabric architecture simplifies network management by unifying core, aggregation, and access functions. As illustrated in the following figure, a core stack (distributed chassis) serving as the CB connects to downstream Campus Fabric (PE) units that aggregate large numbers of access devices.

Ruckus stackable models

Stacking terminology

Certain terms and roles specific to stacking are used throughout this guide. This section describes the roles stack units may assume as well as terms key to understanding stacking.

NOTE

Refer to the *Ruckus FastIron Campus Fabric Configuration Guide* for terms specific to IEEE 802.1br and switch port extender (SPX) capability.

Stack unit roles

- Active controller: Handles stack management and configures all system- and interface-level features.
- Standby controller: The stack member with the highest priority after the active controller. The standby controller takes over if the current active controller fails.
- Stack member: A unit functioning in the stack in a capacity other than active controller or standby controller.
- Stack unit: Any device functioning within the stack, including the active controller and standby controller.
- Standalone unit: An eligible unit that is not part of a stack that can be interchanged with an active controller without reload. A standalone unit becomes an active controller when any member joins the stack. An active controller becomes a standalone when it loses all stack members.

Stacking terms

- Bootup role: The role a unit takes during the boot sequence. This role can be standalone, active controller, standby controller, stack member, or PE (port extender, in an 802.1br Campus Fabric network).
- Clean unit: A unit that contains no startup flash configuration or runtime configuration. To erase old configuration information, enter the **erase startup-config** command and reset the unit without entering the **write memory** command. If a stack member is without an active controller, you can access its local console and enter the **stack unconfigure clean** command to convert it to a clean unit. Converting a unit to a clean unit does not remove its loaded licenses.

NOTE

An ICX 7650 device with startup-config flash using 40-Gbps stacking ports that has no other configuration is treated as a clean unit. Because an ICX 7650 device that uses 40-Gbps stacking requires the **rear-module stack-40g** command followed by the **write memory** and **reload** commands to change the default 100-Gbps stacking ports to 40-Gbps stacking ports, the related startup-config flash must be present.

- Control path: A path across stacking links dedicated to carrying control traffic such as commands to program hardware or software image data for upgrades. A stack unit must join the control path to operate fully in the stack.
- Default ports: FastIron devices used the default-ports to define stacking port candidates. The **stack default-ports** command is deprecated in Release 08.0.90. However, the default-ports are still used internally to define which ports can be stacking ports. From Release 08.0.90, these ports are often referred to as valid-stack-ports or simply as stack-ports. See also the term *Valid-stack-port set*.
- Direction: Every stack unit has one or two directions for linking to other units. Each direction is either a stack-port or stack-trunk. System output, for example, in show commands, uses "D0" or "dir 0" to indicate the first direction.
- Dynamic configuration: A unit configuration that is dynamically learned by a new stack unit from the active controller. A dynamic configuration disappears when the unit leaves the stack. The configuration becomes a static configuration after you enter the **write memory** command.
- Interprocessor Communications (IPC): The process by which proprietary packets are exchanged between stack unit CPUs.
- IronStack: A set of Ruckus stackable units (maximum of twelve) and their connected stacking links so that all units can be accessed through their common connections. A single unit can manage the entire stack, and configurable entities, such as VLANs and trunk groups, can have members on multiple stack units.
- Linear-topology trunk: A type of trunk available only in a two-unit stack to place stack-ports in both directions into a single trunk. The resulting trunk achieves the same redundancy as a two-unit ring and doubles the bandwidth of the stacking ports. All ports in the linear-topology trunk are used in forwarding between the two units, in contrast to a two-unit ring, which uses only one direction, even when two paths are available. For ICX 7750 devices, a linear-topology trunk may contain ports from two slots, for example, the configuration **stack-trunk x/2/1 to x/2/6 x/3/1 to x/3/6**. This feature is available in FastIron release 08.0.90 and later. Refer to [Support for two-unit stack linear-topology trunks](#) on page 36.
- Non-Functioning stack unit: A stack unit that is recognized as a stack member, and is communicating with the active controller over the Control Path, but is in a non-functioning state. A non-functioning stack unit will drop or discard traffic from non-stacked ports. This may be caused by an image or configuration mismatch.
- Reserved / provisional unit: A unit configuration number that has no physical unit associated with it.
- Sequential connection: Stack unit IDs, beginning with the active controller, are sequential. For example, 1, 3, 4, 6, 7 is sequential if active controller is 1. 1, 7, 6, 4, 3 are non-sequential in a linear topology, but become sequential in a ring topology when counted from the other direction as: 1, 3, 4, 6, 7. Gaps in numbering are allowed.
- Stack interactive-setup: An interactive tool that assists in discovering units and constructing a stacking system. The stack interactive-setup utility can also discover new links between existing stack units, enlarge a stacking trunk, or change a chain topology to a ring. The utility also provides an option for users to change member IDs interactively.

NOTE

Ruckus recommends the use of stack interactive-setup in preference to stack zero-touch provisioning (**stack zero-touch-enable** configuration) because the interactive-setup utility allows you more flexibility when selecting units, assigning, IDs, or configuring a linear-topology trunk. Stack interactive-setup displays warning messages about connection errors, making them easier to spot.

- Stack path: A data path formed across the stacking links to determine the set of stack members that are present in the stack topology, and their locations in the stack.
- Stack slot: A *slot* in a stack is synonymous with a *line model* in a chassis.
- Stack topology: A contiguously-connected set of stack units in an ICX stack that are currently communicating with each other. All units that are present in the stack topology appear in output from the **show stack** command.
- Stacking link: A cable that connects a stacking port on one unit to a stacking port on another unit.

- Stacking port: A physical interface on a stack unit that connects a stacking link. Stacking ports are point-to-point links that exchange proprietary packets. Stacking ports cannot be configured for any other purpose while operating as stacking ports. The number of available stacking ports depends on the platform. Some ports can be configured as either stacking ports or regular data ports. Refer to the hardware installation guide for the specific device for more information.
 - Stack-port: A configuration command used to define a single stacking port in one direction.
 - Stack-trunk: A configuration command used to define multiple stacking ports in one direction. A trunk is also referred to as a link aggregation group (LAG).
- Stack zero-touch provisioning (ZTP): Automatic discovery of stack members when **stack zero-touch-enable** is configured. When stack zero-touch provisioning is enabled, the system performs stack interactive-setup every three minutes in background, without any prompts to the user or opportunities for user input. The resulting configuration is similar to running stack interactive-setup and accepting all suggested values.
- Standalone unit: A unit that is not enabled for stacking, or an active controller without any standby controller or stack members.
- Static configuration: A configuration that remains in the database of the active controller even if the unit it refers to is removed from the stack. Static configurations are derived from the startup configuration file during the boot sequence, are manually entered, or are converted from dynamic configurations after a **write memory** command is issued.
- Trunked stacking port (trunk): A trunk consists of multiple stacking ports and is treated as one logical link. It provides more bandwidth and better resilience than individually connected ports. A trunk is often referred to as a link aggregation group (LAG).
- Unit replacement: The process of swapping out a unit with a clean unit that contains the same modules. Unit replacement is periodically triggered in background and does not require any command entry.
- Valid-stack-port set: A set of stacking ports that must be used to configure stacking. There are two stacking directions, so each valid-stack-port set contains two ports. Each stack direction must start with a specific port in the valid-stack-port set. For example, an ICX 7150-24P device has the valid-stack-port set (x/3/1, x/3/3, 2). In this notation, the "2" indicates that a stack-trunk can have up to two ports. The stack-port configuration must be a valid-stack-port (for an ICX 7150-24P, x/3/1 or x/3/3). A stack-trunk configuration contains contiguous ports starting from a valid-stack-port, for example, for an ICX 7150-28P device, **stack-trunk 1/3/3 to 1/3/4**. A platform may support multiple valid-stack-port sets. Both stacking directions must originate from the same set. For example, an ICX 7250 device has two valid-stack-port sets, (x/2/1, x/2/3, 2) and (x/2/5, x/2/7, 2). When you configure an ICX 7250 for stacking, you cannot configure stack-port 1/2/1 and stack-port 1/2/5 in the same unit. For more information, refer to [Valid-stack-port sets](#) on page 23 and to the stacking overview section for a particular ICX device.

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Valid-stack-port sets

Ruckus stacking systems support flexible stacking ports. Most platforms allow users to select stacking ports from a list of ports. The ports that are not used as stacking ports can be used as data ports. The stacking port selection cannot be arbitrary. It must follow rules that respect the defined valid-stack-port set (*a/b/c*, *a/b/d*, *n*), where *a/b/c* and *a/b/d* are the starting ports of two directions, and *n* is the maximum number of ports in a stacking trunk. Some platforms support multiple valid-stack-port sets.

Ruckus supports linear or ring topologies. A unit has one direction (in a typical linear topology) or two directions (in a ring). Each direction contains one or multiple stacking ports. The command **stack-port** *unit/slot/port* contains one port, and the command **stack-trunk** *unit/slot/port to unit/slot/port* uses multiple contiguous ports.

In FastIron 08.0.90 or later, you must observe the following rules to configure the **stack-port** or **stack-trunk** command related to the valid-stack-port set.

NOTE

The examples given apply to ICX 7750 devices. Valid-stack-port sets for different ICX models differ and are provided in the stacking overview for each device. Every ICX 7750 device has six valid-stack-port sets. The three most common sets are (*x/2/1*, *x/2/4*, 3), (*x/3/1*, *x/3/4*, 3) and (*x/2/1*, *x/3/1*, 6), where *x* represents a stack ID, and the third number in each set specifies the maximum number of ports in a stacking trunk.

- A stack-port must be a port in the valid-stack-port set. For example, the configuration **stack-port 1/2/4** is allowed, but **stack-port 1/2/2** is not allowed.
- A stack-trunk must contain contiguous ports starting from one port in the valid-stack-port set. For example, the configuration **stack-trunk 1/3/1 to 1/3/5** satisfies the valid-stack-port set (*x/2/1*, *x/3/1*, 6), but the configuration **stack-trunk 1/3/2 to 1/3/4** is invalid.
- The number of ports in a **stack-trunk** configuration cannot exceed the number defined in the valid-stack-port set.
- The **stack-port** and the **stack-trunk** configuration for a unit must originate from the same valid-stack-port set. For example, the configuration **stack-port 1/2/1** and **stack-trunk 1/3/1 to 1/3/6** satisfies the valid-stack-port set (*1/2/1*, *1/3/1*, 6). The configuration **stack-port 1/2/1** and **stack-port 1/3/4** is invalid because the two stacking ports originate in different valid-stack-port sets.
- Adding **stack-port** or **stack-trunk** configuration may cause the removal of existing **stack-port** or **stack-trunk** configuration if the new configuration is not contained in the same valid-stack-port set. For example, suppose a unit configuration contains **stack-port 1/2/1** and **stack-port 1/2/4**. If you configure **stack-port 1/3/1**, the system removes

stack-port 1/2/4 and keeps 1/2/1 because port 1/2/1 and port 1/3/1 satisfy the valid-stack-port set (1/2/1, 1/3/1, 6). If you configure **stack-port 1/3/4**, the system removes both old stack-ports because no valid-stack-port set contains both the ports in the new configuration, 1/2/x and 1/3/4.

- If adding **stack-port** or **stack-trunk** configuration would cause the removal of a live stacking port or stacking trunk, the command entry is denied. For example, suppose a unit has a live link 1/3/1 to another unit. If you were to configure **stack-port 1/2/4**, it would cause the removal of 1/3/1 because the port combination (1/2/4, 1/3/1) is not contained in any valid-stack-port set. In this case, the system prints an error message and denies the configuration as shown in the following example.

stack-port 1/2/4 would remove stack-port 1/3/1 to satisfy (1/2/1, 1/2/4, 3).
```

No more stack default-ports configuration

In releases prior to FastIron 08.0.90, users either had to use the factory-set default stacking ports or configure alternative default stacking ports using the **stack default-ports** command; otherwise, the desired stacking ports could not be configured, and the unit could not be discovered by the stack secure-setup utility (replaced by the stack interactive-setup utility in FastIron 08.0.90).

FastIron 08.0.90 eliminates the requirement of configuring default stacking ports. For example, you can link ICX 7750 ports on slot 3 and use the **stack interactive-setup** command to build a stack without any **stack default-ports** configuration. In releases prior to FastIron 08.0.90, users had to configure **stack default-ports 1/3/1 1/3/4** on every ICX 7750 unit that stacked from slot 3 before running the stack secure-setup utility because the factory-set default stacking ports are 1/2/1 and 1/2/4.

Stacking ports displayed even when stacking is not enabled

In FastIron releases prior to 08.0.90, when stacking is not enabled, the system does not display factory-default stacking ports in **show running-config** command output. However, in these releases, if the stacking ports have been changed, they are displayed. In contrast, FastIron release 08.0.90 always displays stacking ports in **show running-config** command output, regardless of whether stacking is enabled or whether the stacking ports are set to factory default or have been changed.

In all FastIron releases, when **stack enable** is not configured, the stacking ports are available for use as data ports and may contain any data port configuration such as tagged ports.

NOTE

FastIron release 08.0.90 corrects the difficulty of configuring stacking ports as breakout ports that was present in previous releases.

NOTE

Beginning with FastIron release 08.0.90, any stacking port can serve as a breakout port as long as the **stack enable** command is not configured. However, the stacking ports are always displayed in three-tuple format (x/y/z) even when they have been configured as breakout ports. For example, if port 1/2/1 is a breakout port, it appears in general configuration or **show** command output as 1/2/1:1; however, any output that shows the port as stack-port configuration displays the port as 1/2/1.

In all releases, when you enter the **stack enable** command, the system checks all stacking ports to make sure they contain no configuration. If any configuration is present, the **stack enable** command is denied.

Changes to stack-port and stack-trunk configuration

Beginning with FastIron 08.0.90, using the **stack-port** and **stack-trunk** commands to configure stacking ports and trunks eliminates the following restrictions that were present in previous configuration methods.

1. A stacking trunk had to be built on top of a stacking port. Without **stack-port** configuration, you could not add **stack-trunk** configuration. Both the **stack-port** and the **stack-trunk** configuration represented the **stack-trunk**.
2. In releases prior to FastIron 08.0.90, the command **no stack-trunk** changed a stacking trunk to its underlying stack-port; it did not remove all ports from the stacking trunk.
3. A **stack-port** configuration could contain one or two stack-ports. If you re-entered the **stack-port** command with only one of the original two ports, the other port was removed.
4. To configure stacking ports or stacking trunks that did not use the factory-set stacking ports, you first had to configure different default ports (choosing from those available) using the **stack default-ports** command.

The following sections provide more detailed comparison of new behavior and old behavior. All examples are based on ICX 7750 ports.

General comparison of the new and old behaviors in configuring stacking ports and trunks

The following table provides a side-by-side comparison of stacking port and stacking trunk configuration basics in FastIron 08.0.90 (New behavior) and prior releases (Old behavior). The new behavior uses one command per stack-port or stack-trunk.

Comparison of configuration changes that use non-factory valid-stack-port sets

The following table provides a side-by-side comparison of new and old configuration command behaviors for stack configurations that use stack-ports other than the factory-set default ports. In the table, an ICX 7750 stack serves as the example, and configuration changes use stack-ports other than the factory-set combination (ports 1/2/1 and 1/2/4). The new behavior does not require you to use the **default-ports** command.

Comparison of common configuration procedures using factory-set default stacking ports

The following series of tables provide side-by-side comparisons of new and old configuration behaviors required for standard stack configuration procedures when factory-set default stacking ports are used. The examples reference ICX 7750 stack configuration, for which factory-set default stacking ports are 1/2/1 and 1/2/4.

The old behavior sometimes required multiple commands to add or delete one stack-port or stack-trunk and sometimes needed only one command to add or delete two stack-ports or stack-trunks. In contrast, the new behavior always adds or deletes a stack-port or stack-trunk with one command.

NOTE

Adding a stacking trunk with no prior configuration in the old behavior requires two steps. The first **stack-port** command adds a stacking port. The second command, **stack-trunk**, changes the stacking port just added to a stacking trunk.

NOTE

Completely removing a stacking trunk in the old behavior requires two steps. The first command, **no stack-trunk**, changes the trunk to a stacking port. The second command, **no stack-port** is required to remove the trunk completely. Another option is to enter the command **no stack-port 1/2/1**, which removes both the **stack-trunk** and the **stack-port** configuration.

The new behavior must add the new stacking port or trunk before removing the old one because there is only one stack-port or stack-trunk, and there is no common port between the new and the old configuration.

NOTE

When you add a stack-port or a stack-trunk in a different valid-stack-port set, the system removes the old stack-port or stack-trunk if there is no valid-stack-port set that handles both the old and the new stack-ports or stack-trunks.

Changes to upgrade and downgrade for stacking from FastIron release 08.0.90

The stacking port format is different beginning with FastIron 08.0.90. The change in format creates upgrade and downgrade issues.

Upgrading to FastIron release 08.0.90 from earlier releases

Upgrades from earlier releases to FastIron 08.0.90 are seamless. FastIron 08.0.90 recognizes the old format and parses startup-config flash to convert the configuration to the new format. After upgrade, if you enter the **write memory** command to save the configuration, the new format is stored to startup-config flash.

In the following example, an ICX 7450 stack is upgraded to FastIron 08.0.90 from FastIron 08.0.80 startup-config flash. The user has not yet used the **write memory** command. Output for the **show configuration** command shows that the FastIron 08.0.80 startup-config flash remains in the old format. The command output for the **show running-config** command displays the runtime configuration in the new format.

Downgrading from FastIron 08.0.90 to earlier releases

A standalone or active controller parses the startup-config flash to read the stacking ports for the entire stack. A release prior to FastIron 08.0.90 does not understand startup-config flash content generated by FastIron 08.0.90 or later releases. As a result, if you try to downgrade from FastIron 08.0.90 or later to a pre-08.0.90 release, the stack may break. FastIron 08.0.90 attempts to overcome the need to downgrade by saving and recovering the original startup-config flash.

In FastIron 08.0.90, when the **write memory** command is used, the system renames the startup-config flash "pre-8090-startup-backup" if it has been generated from a pre-08.0.90 release. You can view the contents of the saved file using the **show pre-8090-startup-backup** command.

NOTE

When a stack downgrades to a pre-08.0.90 release from recovered pre-08.0.90 startup-config flash, it loses all configuration changes made under FastIron 08.0.90.

Every unit, including a stack member, has a startup-config file, and every unit renames the startup-config as the backup file when the **write memory** command is used.

If you no longer need the pre-8090-startup-backup file, you can delete it using the **erase pre-8090-startup-backup** command. This command erases the pre-8090-startup-backup file in every unit in the stacking system. You may no longer need the older backup file if you are certain you will not have to downgrade the system or if you have made many configuration changes with the FastIron 08.0.90 or later release installed, making the backup file obsolete.

When a system running FastIron 08.0.90 detects that it is about to reload to a pre-08.0.90 release, the system tries to recover the backup file. A message is displayed asking for confirmation before recovering the file with a warning that all changes made with the current release will be lost.

NOTE

In contrast, the **reload yes** and **boot system flash secondary yes** commands do not require confirmation. The following example shows the system response when the **boot system flash secondary yes** command is entered.

When a system is upgraded to FastIron 08.0.90 or later and then downgraded to a pre-08.0.90 release, the results of the downgrade differ, depending on the situation. The following cases describe specific situations and the expected results. The scenarios in the following tables apply to a standalone unit or a stack.

TABLE 13 Downgrade scenarios

Situation	Result
The user never uses a write memory command when running FastIron 08.0.90.	The downgrade is seamless.
The user does not change any configuration but uses the write memory command when running FastIron 08.0.90.	The downgrade is fine. The system recovers the backup file before reloading to a pre-08.0.90 release.
The user makes configuration changes while running FastIron 08.0.90 and uses the write memory command.	The downgrade loses all configuration changes made under FastIron 08.0.90. The system recovers the backup file that does not contain the changes.

Switchover or failover does not affect these downgrade scenarios. For example, you may perform a switch-over to change the active controller and then reload. The recovery result is the same as a reload without changing the active controller.

There are a few cases where recovery does not work.

TABLE 14 Scenarios where downgrades cannot be performed

Situation	Result
The user reloads the system by powering down.	The system cannot recover the backup file before reloading.
The standalone or active controller does not have a startup-config flash file generated by any pre-08.0.90 release.	Downgrade is not possible.

NOTE

It is recommended that you copy the running configuration to a file before downgrading. You can do this using the **copy running-config** command to copy the configuration to different locations such as a USB disk file or a tftp server, or you can simply enter the **show running-config** command and then copy the output and paste it into a computer file.

NOTE

If you don't have a pre-08090-startup-backup file (which can be checked with the **show pre-8090-startup-backup** command), or you have many configuration changes to the 08.0.90 release or a later release and you need to downgrade to a pre-08.0.90 release, you must manually edit the 08.0.90 configuration to create a pre-08.0.90 format.

Stack interactive-setup

Stack interactive-setup is the recommended method for constructing a stack. The utility allows you to select units, IDs, and two-unit linear-topology trunks. Stack interactive-setup replaces the stack secure-setup utility used in releases prior to FastIron 08.0.90. The **stack interactive-setup** command, entered in privileged EXEC mode, is used to initiate the utility and is available on a standalone unit or on the active controller of a stack.

Stack interactive-setup has the following capabilities:

- Changing the ID for any existing unit, except for the active controller.

NOTE

Changing an ID does not result in a configuration change. For example, when users change a unit ID from 2 to 3, the system does not change any unit 2 configuration to unit 3 configuration.

- Discovering new links between existing units and enlarging the stacking port or stacking trunk. Stack interactive-setup can discover new links between two end-units of a linear topology and convert the topology to a ring.
- Discovering clean units and converting them to stack members.
- Discovering existing standalone units and converting them to stack members.

NOTE

If a discovered standalone unit is password protected, stack interactive-setup prompts you to enter the password. Stack interactive-setup checks for **enable super-user password** and ignores all other passwords.

Ruckus recommends that you make all physical connections and run **stack interactive-setup** on the active controller of a stack or on a standalone unit that will become the active controller.

In a two-unit stack, you can choose a ring or a chain that forms a linear-topology trunk in either of the following cases:

- The configuration of the active controller is a linear-topology trunk. For example, an ICX 7250 has **stack-trunk 1/2/1 to 1/2/4** or **stack-trunk 1/2/5 to 1/2/8** configuration.
- All linear-topology trunk ports have physical connections.

Refer to [Support for two-unit stack linear-topology trunks](#) on page 36 for more information.

For example, if you connect all four ports 1/2/5 through 1/2/8 to ports 1/2/5 through 1/2/8 on another unit, stack interactive-setup displays an option to choose a ring of two trunks (stack-trunk 1/2/5 to 1/2/6 and stack-trunk 1/2/7 to 1/2/8), or a linear-topology trunk (stack-trunk 1/2/5 to 1/2/8). The default is to form a ring.

The following restrictions apply to connections for both stack interactive-setup and stack zero-touch provisioning:

- The connection cannot be out of sequential order in a stacking trunk. Suppose, for example an ICX 7750 has the connection stack-trunk 1/2/1 to 1/2/3 that links to stack-trunk 2/2/4 to 2/2/6 on stack unit 2. Port 1/2/1 must link to 2/2/4, port 1/2/2 must link to 2/2/5, and so on.
- The primary port must be connected. For example, link 1/2/2 to 2/2/5 without link 1/2/1 to 2/2/4 is not valid. The system displays an error message and aborts.

The system performs numerous checks to confirm that the discovered topology is supported. If the system detects any error, it displays a message and aborts the operation.

The stack interactive-setup utility includes the following behaviors to improve the configuration process:

- The utility sends out probes to discover new units and connections as soon as it is enabled.
- The system changes configuration to suit the discovered topology. For example, if ICX 7750 stacking ports are configured on module 2 and another unit is discovered through ports on module 3, the system changes the ICX 7750 stacking port or stacking trunk configuration to module 3.
- The system tries to consider the current configuration when assigning stacking ports. For example, if the system discovers that ports 1/2/1 and 1/2/2 link to a new unit and the current configuration is stack-port 1/2/1, it enlarges the configuration to include port 1/2/2 and changes it to stack-trunk 1/2/1 to 1/2/2. If the current configuration is stack-trunk 1/2/1 to 1/2/3, the system keeps the super set.
- The stack-trunk is contiguous. If ports 1/2/1 and 1/2/3 link to another unit, the system generates stack-trunk 1/2/1 to 1/2/3, even if 1/2/2 has no link.
- After successfully converting standalone units to stack members, the priority of the unit running the stack interactive-setup utility is raised to 128.

If stack interactive-setup detects new links between existing units and discovers new units, the utility handles only the new links. Then stack interactive-setup requests that you run the utility again to discover new units.

For more information, refer to [The stack interactive-setup utility](#) on page 56.

Differences in stack unit replacement

Stack unit replacement is handled differently beginning with release 08.0.90. The following table compares stack unit replacement in release 08.0.90 and earlier releases.

NOTE

Unit replacement cannot be performed when stack zero-touch provisioning is enabled. Stack zero-touch provisioning is a superset of unit replacement and can handle single or multiple unit replacements.

NOTE

If the unit replacement process cannot handle particular cases due to ambiguity, Ruckus recommends using stack interactive-setup.

Stack zero-touch provisioning

Stack zero-touch provisioning is a subset of the stack interactive-setup utility without any user interaction. Stack zero-touch provisioning can detect new links between existing units and can discover new clean units (without startup-config flash), but it cannot change existing unit IDs. Stack zero-touch provisioning is similar to running stack interactive-setup option 2 and accepting all recommended values.

Stack zero-touch provisioning is enabled by entering **stack zero-touch-enable** in global configuration mode. It is triggered every three minutes in background.

Ruckus recommends that you make all physical connections and then configure **stack zero-touch-enable**. Wait for a few minutes for zero-touch provisioning to trigger and discover new units or new links.

NOTE

When enabled, stack zero-touch provisioning is triggered every three minutes; however, if a member is in the process of joining or has joined the stack within the last 90 seconds, discovery is postponed for 30 seconds to allow a minimum pause of 90 seconds after the last join.

After all new units join and all new links appear in **show running-config** command output, it is better to disable stack zero-touch provisioning using the **no stack zero-touch-enable** command. Leaving stack zero-touch provisioning enabled is harmless; however, the utility sends probes in background every three minutes, which wastes resources if there are no more units or links to discover. (In contrast, stack interactive-setup immediately sends out probes when you run it.)

Stacking deployment guidelines

This section provides guidance for constructing a new stack, adding new members, replacing members, or adding new links within a stack. These tasks can be performed in several different ways. This section describes the most common methods. Other methods are discussed in more detail in later sections.

NOTE

Adding new units or new links without spanning tree protocols (STP) may create loops. Loops cause high traffic in the affected ports and may cause high CPU usage if the looped packets are trapped to the CPU. As a result, failure to enable STP in a stack may have significant impact on traffic in a production environment. STP is enabled by default in switch images. It is not enabled by default in router images.

NOTE

ICX 7150 and ICX 7250 devices must pre-load licenses to enable 10-Gbps stacking ports that allow a unit to join a stack. Refer to the *Ruckus FastIron Software Licensing Guide* for details on ICX licenses.

Constructing a new stack from scratch or adding new units to a stack

Consider the following points when creating a new stack or adding new units to an existing stack.

- The easiest way to create a stack or to add units to a stack is to use the stack interactive-setup utility. The **stack interactive-setup** command provides two options. Option 2 is used to discover clean units. Option 3 can discover clean or non-clean units. For a definition of "clean unit," refer to [Stacking terminology](#) on page 19.
- If you are configuring a stack in a production system, Ruckus recommends configuring spanning tree protocols (STP, RSTP or MSTP) on the active controller before making connections. You can enable either global STP or STP only on the default VLAN. If there are already loops in the system before you configure STP and if the looping packets have higher priority than the STP BPDU packets, STP may not converge. In this case, disable or disconnect the looping links to break the loops so that STP can converge. Then reenable or reconnect the links.
- If you are configuring a stack in a non-production system and you don't want to configure STP, the stack interactive-setup or stack zero-touch provisioning utility can discover new clean units under looping conditions.
- Make all connections before entering the **stack interactive-setup** command.
- Ruckus recommends using stack interactive-setup option 2 to discover clean units.
- When a clean unit receives stack interactive-setup or stack zero-touch provisioning probes, it temporarily installs a filter to drop all traffic except protocol packets on every port to break possible loops in case STP is not enabled. As a result, a clean unit can be discovered by stack interactive-setup or stack zero-touch provisioning under looping conditions. The temporary filter exists only during the stack interactive-setup or stack zero-touch provisioning process. Once the process is completed, loops may recur if STP is not configured.
- Stack interactive-setup option 2 and stack zero-touch provisioning cannot detect non-clean units. Only stack interactive-setup option 3 can detect non-clean unit. However, option 3 may fail under looping condition.
- All loops disappear after the new units are discovered and reload to join the stack. The connected ports become stack-ports or stack-trunks.
- Be sure to enter the **write memory** command after new units join as stack members.

Replacing stack units

Consider the following points when replacing stack members.

- To replace a unit with a clean unit containing the same modules, simply disconnect the old unit and replace it with a clean unit using the same links. The new unit will be discovered in less than two minutes. No command is needed on the active controller or the clean unit.
- A non-clean unit cannot be discovered by the unit replacement feature. It logs and prints a message when it receives unit replacement probing packets. To convert a unit to a clean unit so it can be discovered by stack zero-touch provisioning or stack interactive-setup, enter the **erase startup-config** command on the unit followed by the **reload** command without entering the **write memory** command.
- Replacing a unit does not cause loops, even when STP is not configured. The reason is that replacing a unit uses the same links that are already configured as stack-ports or stack-trunks.
- If the stack is a ring topology, replacing a unit does not break the stack. The stack becomes linear until the new unit joins to form a ring. If the stack is a linear topology, only the edge unit can be replaced. Replacing a non-edge unit in a linear stack causes other units behind it to become unreachable. The unit replacement could fail because the loss of multiple units causes ambiguity.
- To replace multiple units at the same time, first replace all units and make all physical connections before entering the **stack interactive-setup** command.

Adding new links between existing stack units

Adding new links between existing units causes loops if STP is not configured. Any link, excluding stacking ports, between two units in the stack causes loops.

Use one of the following methods to add links successfully between existing stack units.

1. Configure STP and run the stack interactive-setup utility.
 - a. Configure spanning tree protocols (for example, STP, RSTP, MSTP, and PVST) on the active controller before making connections. You can enable either global STP or STP only on the default VLAN. If there are already loops before STP is configured and if the looping packets have higher priority than the STP BPDU packets, STP may not converge. In this case, disable or disconnect the looping links to break loops and allow STP to converge. Then reenabling or reconnecting the links. For example, suppose a link from data port 1/2/4 to 2/2/4 creates a loop. You can configure **disable** under **interface ethernet 1/2/4** to break the loop. Then configure **enable** after STP converges.
 - b. Make all new physical connections.
 - c. Wait for STP to converge before entering the **stack interactive-setup** command. When STP converges, it places some looping ports in the BLOCKING state.
 - d. Run the stack interactive-setup utility. Either option 2 or 3 can discover new links within the stack and configure proper stack-ports or stack-trunks. A linear stack may become a ring. The utility can discover multiple sets of links between unit pairs. For example, it can convert a linear stack to a ring and discover the links among units in one run.
 - e. Be sure to enter the **write memory** command if the system prompts you with a "write memory" message.
2. Use **stack-port**, **stack-trunk**, **multi-stack-port**, or **multi-stack-trunk** commands to create links.
 - a. This approach does not require configuring STP.
 - b. Configure the **stack-port** or **stack-trunk** command on both edge units to change a linear stack to a ring. Then add new links to connect both edge units.

- c. To enlarge the connections between two units, configure the **multi-stack-trunk** command to change both ends of a live link at the same time. Then connect the new links. The links won't cause loops because they have proper stack-trunk configuration.
- d. To reduce the live connections between two units, physically remove the unwanted cables first. Then configure the **multi-stack-port** or **multi-stack-trunk** command to change both ends of the live link at the same time. For example, suppose you have an ICX 7750 stack with a live link stack-trunk 1/2/1 to 1/2/3 connected to stack-trunk 2/2/4 to 2/2/6. After removing the unwanted cables between ports 1/2/3 to 2/2/6 and/or between ports 1/2/2 to 2/2/5, you can enter the command **multi-stack-port 1/2/1 and 2/2/4** or the command **multi-stack-trunk 1/2/1 to 1/2/2 and 2/2/4 to 2/2/5** to reduce the number of ports in the live link.
- e. Changing stacking ports to data ports may cause loops. It is better to disconnect the unwanted cables before reducing live connections as explained in the previous point. The other option is to reduce live connections and then disable the data ports after reducing live connections using the **disable port-number** command in interface configuration mode.

Support for two-unit stack linear-topology trunks

FastIron 08.0.90 and later releases support a linear-topology trunk in a two-unit stack. A two-unit stack can form a linear-topology trunk containing all stacking ports, instead of dividing the ports into the two directions of a ring topology. The linear-topology trunk provides the same redundancy as a two-unit ring because of trunk load balancing. Furthermore, a linear-topology trunk doubles the bandwidth of the stacking ports between two units.

In a two-unit ring topology, only one direction is used even though there are two paths for a unit to reach the other unit. In contrast, a linear-topology trunk uses all ports to reach the other unit.

NOTE

In a ring of more than two units, all directions of any unit are fully utilized because each direction is to a different unit. Therefore, the linear-topology trunk is not supported in a stack of more than two units.

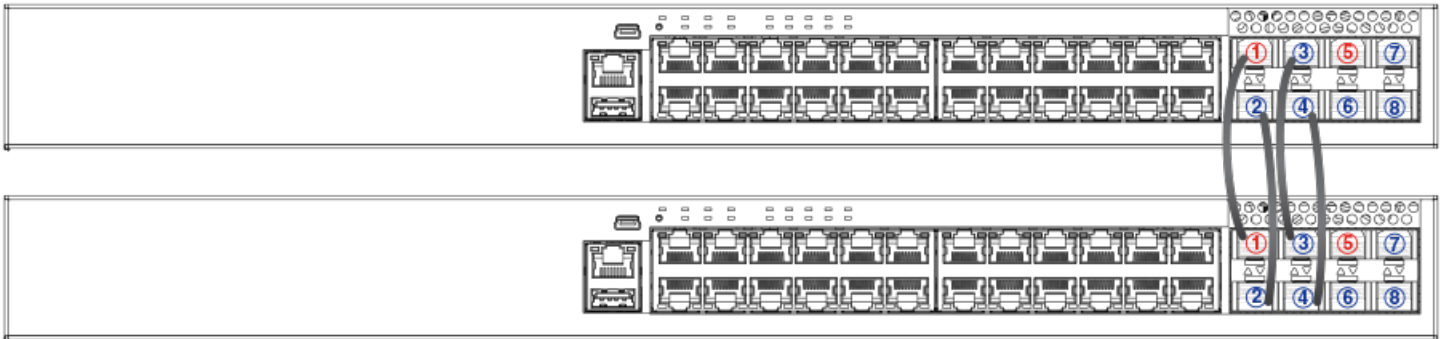
NOTE

A linear-topology trunk cannot co-exist with another stack-port or stack-trunk in the same unit. Therefore, if you configure a linear-topology trunk, the original stack-port or stack-trunk configuration is removed. If a unit has a linear-topology trunk and you configure a stack-port or stack-trunk, the linear-topology trunk is removed.

Building a two-unit linear-topology trunk manually

The following procedure uses an ICX 7250 stack as an example. A two-unit ICX 7250 stack has two potential linear-topology trunks, (x/2/1 to x/2/4) and (x/2/5 to x/2/8). The following figure shows the appropriate cabling for the four-port linear topology trunk (x/2/1 to x/2/4) on an ICX 7250 two-unit stack configured in the following procedure.

FIGURE 4 ICX 7250-24P two-unit stack with linear-topology trunk as configured in example



NOTE

If you configure an ICX 7750 two-unit stack, you would have the choice of two linear-topology trunks. You can configure **stack-trunk 1/2/1 to 1/2/6 1/3/1 to 1/3/6** or **stack-trunk 1/2/5 to 1/2/6 1/3/5 to 1/3/6**. Both trunks contain ports in two slots.

Complete the following steps to configure a two-unit linear-topology trunk manually (in this case, on an ICX 7250 two-unit stack).

1. On both units, create the desired trunk in stack unit configuration sub-mode.

The example configures ports 1/2/1 through 1/2/4 as a stacking trunk on one of the stack unit candidates. Enter the trunk configuration on the other unit, too.

2. Enter the **stack enable** command on both units.

3. Connect cables between the two units. (For this example, connect four cables.)

Once connected, both units perform elections to choose the active controller. The unit that loses the election is reloaded as a stack member and later is assigned the standby role.

When the member boots up, it joins, and a two-unit stack forms.

4. Enter the **write memory** command to save the learned configuration.

Building a two-unit stack with a linear-topology trunk using stack interactive-setup

The interactive-setup utility generates the linear-topology trunk option only when either of the following conditions is met:

- All ports of the linear-topology trunk are connected.
- The active controller has a linear-topology trunk configuration.

The following procedure uses an ICX 7250 stack as an example. A two-unit ICX 7250 stack has two potential linear-topology trunks, (x/2/1 to x/2/4) and (x/2/5 to x/2/8).

Complete the following steps to configure a two-unit linear-topology trunk using stack interactive-setup.

1. Connect cables between the two units. (In this example, four cables are used as shown in [Figure 4](#) on page 37.)
2. On the unit you want to become the active controller, enable stacking.

Creating a two-unit linear-topology stack using stack zero-touch provisioning

Stack zero-touch provisioning elects to form a linear-topology trunk only when the active controller has a linear-topology trunk configuration for itself. If the active controller does not have a linear-topology trunk configuration, stack zero-touch provisioning forms a ring.

The following procedure uses an ICX 7250 stack as an example. A two-unit ICX 7250 stack has two potential linear-topology trunks, (x/2/1 to x/2/4) and (x/2/5 to x/2/8). The system configures a four-port trunk and removes the other direction.

NOTE

Neither stack interactive-setup nor stack zero-touch provisioning can convert a live two-unit stack to a linear-topology trunk. If you are working with a live system, you can enter the **multi-stack-trunk 1/2/1 to 1/2/4 and 2/2/1 to 2/2/4** command to change the configuration on both units simultaneously. Refer to [Changing a live two-unit stack to a linear-topology trunk](#) on page 45 for more information.

Complete the following steps to configure a two-unit linear-topology trunk using stack zero-touch provisioning.

NOTE

1. Connect cables between the two units. (In this example, four cables are used as shown in [Figure 4](#) on page 37).
2. On the unit that you want to become the active controller, create the desired trunk in stack unit 1 configuration sub-mode.

Changing a live two-unit stack to a linear-topology trunk

The ICX system performs numerous checks to block commands that could break a live stack. However, the checks have limitations and may not catch all potential breaks. Therefore, you should verify the physical connections on the stack before using the **multi-stack-port** or **multi-stack-trunk** command.

You can use the **show stack connection** command to check the physical connections of stacking ports (data port connections are not shown).

In a live system, you can configure the desired trunk on both units simultaneously using the **multi-stack-trunk** command.

In the following procedure, an ICX 7250 two-unit linear-topology stack is created as an example. Each ICX 7250 device has two potential linear-topology trunks, (x/2/1 to x/2/4) and (x/2/5 to x/2/8). When you configure either trunk, the system creates the specified trunk on each unit and removes the other stacking direction.

Changing a live linear-topology trunk to a ring

The ICX system performs numerous checks to block commands that could break a live stack. However, the checks have limitations and may not catch all potential breaks. Therefore, you should verify the physical connections on the stack before using the **multi-stack-port** or **multi-stack-trunk** command.

You can use the **show stack connection** command to check the physical connections of stacking ports (data port connections are not shown).

Suppose the physical connections displayed only two-port trunk connections on each unit, for example, ports 1/2/3 to 1/2/4 and 2/2/3 to 2/2/4. To change the existing live configuration to a stacking ring, the **multi-stack-trunk 1/2/3 to 1/2/4 and 2/2/3 to 2/2/4** command is required.

The following example uses an ICX 7250 two-unit stack with a linear-topology trunk between ports 1/2/1 to 1/2/4 and 2/2/1 to 2/2/4.

Complete the following steps to convert the linear-topology trunk to a stacking ring.

1. Enter global configuration mode on the active controller.

Building a Stack

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Planning to build a stack

Before you begin to build a stack, you should be familiar with supported stacking software requirements, topologies, and recommendations.

Software requirements

All units in a stack must be running the same software version.

Maximum configuration file size for any stack is 1 MB.

Stack requirements

Stacks must contain devices of the same type or product line. For example, a stack cannot combine ICX 7150, ICX 7250, ICX 7450, ICX 7650, ICX 7750, or ICX 7850 devices. However, a stack can contain any combination of devices from the same product line, for example, any combination of ICX 7250 devices.

NOTE

A core stack for an 802.1br (SPX) configuration is a stack that contains only ICX 7750 devices or only ICX 7650 devices, although the stack may contain different types of ICX 7750 or ICX 7650 devices. Refer to the *Ruckus FastIron Campus Fabric Configuration Guide* for more information.

Ruckus stacking topologies

Ruckus stacking technology supports linear and ring topologies.

Although Ruckus stackable units may be connected in a simple linear topology, Ruckus recommends a ring topology because it offers the best redundancy and the most resilient operation. Unicast switching follows the shortest path in a ring topology. When the ring is broken, the stack recalculates the forwarding path and then resumes the flow of traffic within a few seconds.

In a ring topology, all stack members must have two stacking directions; however, in a linear topology, both end units use only one stacking direction. A direction may be represented by a stacking port or a stacking trunk that contains multiple ports. A stacking trunk provides better bandwidth and redundancy.

FastIron stacking distances and optics by device

Because Ruckus devices use Ethernet for the inter-switch stack connections, the deployment options are greatly increased. If standard copper stacking cables are used, the inter-switch connections can be up to 5 meters, which is usually sufficient for locally distributed stacks, such as in Top-of-Rack (ToR) applications. For broader distribution, fiber-optic cables should be used, allowing a stack to be deployed across multiple physical locations, such as in the wiring closets of an office building, or in different buildings on a campus.

Cables that support different distances can be combined in the same stack. For example, you can use LR4 Single Mode Fiber (SMF) optics at both ends of a stacking connection, and the maximum distance is extended to 10 kilometers. Other stacking ports in the same stack can use other optics, such as SR4, at both ends. The maximum distance for such a connection is 100 meters.

NOTE

The same optics (for example, LR4) must be used on both ends of a connection. If the optics do not match on both ends, the ports will not come up.

The following table shows copper and fiber-optic options approved for stacking and stacking distance combinations.

Stacking configuration guidelines

Before you configure a stack, consider the following guidelines:

- Plan the number of units and how the stacking ports on the units will be connected. For more information, refer to the hardware installation guide for your device.
- The stack should be physically cabled in a linear or ring topology. Connect only those units that will be active in the stack.
- Make sure all units intended for the stack are running the same software version. On any of the console ports in the stack, use the **show version** command to view all units, or the **show version unit *unit-number*** command to view an individual unit.

NOTE

If you are running a router image and there is a potential loop in your topology, you must configure the Spanning Tree Protocol in the would-be active controller. Otherwise, excessive looping packets may affect stack formation. The Spanning Tree Protocol is enabled by default in switch images.

NOTE

If STP is not enabled, there may be a loop issue when multiple cables are used to connect a standalone unit to a stack. The loop does not affect stack formation. The loop issue disappears after the multiple links are converted to stacking trunks when the standalone unit is integrated to the stack. However, temporary looping may cause some data traffic interruption.

NOTE

If you want to enlarge a live link or change a linear stack to a ring in a production network, it is better to use **stack-port** or **stack-trunk** commands or, for live links, **multi-stack-trunk** commands to make the configuration changes before you connect the new links. If you connect new links first without the new configuration, the new links cause Layer 2 loops and possible data traffic interruption. After you run `stack interactive-setup` to discover these new links and generate new configuration for the new links, the loop issue disappears.

- When you have a stack of eight or more units, you may need to increase the trap hold time from the default (60 seconds) to five minutes (300 seconds). This will prevent the loss of initial boot traps. To increase the trap hold time, use the following command.

Planning to build a stack with 802.1br switch port extender capability

If you are planning to create an 802.1br SPX configuration with an ICX 7650 or ICX 7750 core stack, there are a few considerations.

In general, Ruckus stacking and 802.1br SPX configuration are independent. Here are a few details to keep in mind:

- Only ICX 7650 devices or ICX 7750 devices can serve as the control bridge (CB). The CB can be a standalone unit or a stack of multiple units.
- ICX 7150, ICX 7250, and ICX 7450 devices can be configured as PE units attached to the CB. PE units can be attached to any CB unit.
- While a stack may include up to 12 units, a CB stack of no more than four units is recommended.
- ICX 7750 breakout ports can be used with an 802.1br SPX configuration; however, they can be enabled only in a standalone ICX 7750 unit.
- SPX runs over LLDP protocol at Layer 2. When you enable SPX with the **spx cb-enable** command, the **lldp run** command is also executed if LLDP has not previously been enabled.
- You will need to plan a server location from which images and manifest files can be downloaded to PE units.
- In general, ICX 7650 and ICX 7750 devices in the CB retain all capabilities. The feature set of devices operating as PE units, however, may be affected.

For detailed information on 802.1br SPX configuration, including protocol considerations, refer to the *Ruckus FastIron Campus Fabric Configuration Guide*.

Stack construction methods

NOTE

The principles outlined in stack construction scenarios apply to all ICX devices. Figures used to illustrate a certain stack topology are not necessarily representative of other devices. For illustrations specific to a particular device, refer to the stack configuration section for that device, which also contains device-specific stacking considerations.

There are several ways to build a stack.

1. The stack interactive-setup utility. Interactive-setup gives you control over the design of your stack topology and provides security through password verification. Ruckus recommends interactive-setup because it provides the flexibility to choose stack members and their IDs. As you create the stack, you can see the topology and any potential connection errors. Refer to [Scenario 1 - Using stack interactive-setup to create a stack](#) on page 57 for more information.
2. Stack zero-touch provisioning. With this method, after all members are connected, you configure stack zero-touch-enable on the unit that will ultimately serve as the stack active controller. All other units must be clean units, without startup or running configuration. The zero-touch provisioning process is triggered every three minutes in background. The results of the process are equivalent to running stack interactive-setup utility option 2 and accepting all suggested values. Refer to [Scenario 2 - Using zero-touch provisioning to configure a stack](#) on page 77 for more information.
3. Manual stack configuration. With this method, you configure every unit individually and enable stacking on each unit. Once the units are connected together, they automatically operate as a stack. With this method, the unit with the highest priority becomes the active controller, and ID assignment is determined by the sequence in which you physically connect the units. Refer to [Scenario 3 - Manually configuring a three member stack in a ring topology](#) on page 83 for more information.

The stack interactive-setup utility

NOTE

Stack interactive-setup works for units within a single stack. It does not work across stacks.

Stack interactive-setup lets you easily configure your entire stack through the active controller, which propagates the configuration to all stack members. Stack interactive-setup is the most secure way to build a stack and gives you the most control over how your stack is built. For example, stack interactive-setup offers three security features that prevent unauthorized devices from accessing or joining a stack:

- Authentication of stack interactive-setup packets provides verification that these packets are from a genuine Ruckus stack unit. MD5-based port verification confirms stacking ports.
- A superuser password is required to allow password-protected devices to become members of a stack.
- The **stack disable** command prevents a unit from listening for or sending stacking packets. When a unit is stack-disabled, no other device in the network can force the unit to join a stack.

NOTE

You can configure multiple passwords such as super-user, local-user, and telnet for a standalone unit or a stack. The stack interactive-setup process uses only the super-user password configured by the **enable super-user-password** command.

Stack interactive-setup can also be used to add units to an existing stack and to change the stack IDs of stack members.

Stack interactive-setup and the active controller

When the **stack interactive-setup** command is issued on a unit that is not already the active controller, the unit becomes the active controller. If this unit does not already have an assigned priority and if no other unit in the stack has a priority higher than 128, stack interactive-setup assigns the unit a priority of 128 by default. However, if another unit in the stack has a priority of 128 or higher, stack interactive-setup gives the active controller a priority equal to the highest priority unit in the stack (which is by default the standby controller).

Scenario 1 - Using stack interactive-setup to create a stack

The following are connection requirements for discovering new units:

- A port in a valid-stack-port set must be connected; otherwise, the stack interactive-setup utility treats the stack as an invalid topology. For example, one valid-stack-port set for ICX 7750 devices is (x/2/1, x/2/4, 3). You must connect either x/2/1 or x/2/4.

NOTE

The valid-stack-port requirement does not apply to the process of discovering new links between existing units, which enlarges stack-trunks or converts a chain to a ring.

- The connections must form a contiguous stack-trunk even if there are "holes" in the connections. For the previous ICX 7750 example, the two links 1/2/1 to 2/2/4 and 1/2/3 to 2/2/6 will form stack-trunk 1/2/1 to 1/2/3 and stack-trunk 2/2/4 to 2/2/6.
- The connecting ports must not have data port configuration.

NOTE

The active controller of a stack or a standalone with stacking enabled can initiate interactive setup to discover new stack units. The following procedure is performed from a standalone unit.

NOTE

Stack interactive-setup can discover new units and new links between existing units. If the process detects both new units and new links, it first handles the new links between existing units and terminates. The system then requests that you run stack interactive-setup again to discover new units.

Perform these steps to create a stack using the stack interactive-setup utility.

1. Connect the devices using the stacking ports and stack cabling. For more information, refer to the stacking overview for the device and to the appropriate hardware installation guide.
2. Power on the units.
3. Connect your console to the intended active controller. The unit through which you run stack interactive-setup becomes the active controller by default.

- (Optional) Enter the **show running-config** command to check the current configuration of the standalone from which you plan to construct the stack. The configuration must include **stack enable**.

- Enter the **stack interactive-setup** command in Privileged EXEC mode on the standalone that will serve as the active controller for the stack.

NOTE

The **stack secure-setup** command has been deprecated and replaced by the **stack interactive-setup** command. If you enter the **stack secure-setup**, the system responds with an error and instructs you to use the new command.

NOTE

The stack interactive-setup process can be initiated by a standalone unit or by the active controller of a stack. In the following example, the process is initiated by a standalone.

- Select from the available options as shown in the following example. If you are building a stack for the first time and the attached units are clean units with no startup configuration, select **2**.

NOTE

Units with any startup configuration in flash memory are not discovered by option 2.

NOTE

If the connected units contain configuration, you can select option **3**, which saves the manual steps of removing configuration from the units (using the **erase startup-config** and **reload** commands for each one).

NOTE

An ICX 7650 device with startup-config flash using 40-Gbps stacking ports but no other configuration is treated as a clean unit. Because an ICX 7650 device that uses 40-Gbps stacking requires the **rear-module stack-40g** command followed by the **write memory** and **reload** commands to change the default 100-Gbps stacking ports to 40-Gbps stacking ports, the related startup-config flash must be present.

The command triggers a Ruckus proprietary discovery protocol that begins the discovery process in both upstream and downstream directions. The discovery process produces a list of upstream and downstream devices that are available to join the stack. Interactive-setup can detect up to 11 units in each direction (22 units total); however, you must select a total number of units that is less than the maximum stack size for the device because the controller is also part of the stack.

NOTE

Probes are sent through all qualified ports, that is, ports that are up but have no configuration, excluding any stacking port or stacking trunk connected to a live neighbor.

NOTE

During the stack interactive-setup process, after two minutes of inactivity, authentication for stack members expires, forcing you to restart the process.

NOTE

To exit the stack interactive-setup process, enter **Control-C** at any time.

In the example, the user has selected option 2, which, when clean units are attached, initiates probes to discover other potential stack units and links as shown in the following example. Because the initiating standalone in the example has no live neighbors, it sends stacking probes through ports 1/2/1 through 1/2/6 and ports 1/3/1 through 1/3/6, assuming these ports are up and have no configuration.

NOTE

You can use the MAC address provided for each discovered unit to track its identity prior to stack unit ID assignment.

It is connected to stack unit 1 (the initiating standalone) through standalone port 1/2/1 and new unit port x/2/1. The double lines indicate a trunk of at least two ports is available for connection.

8. The active controller automatically checks all prospective stack members to see if they are super-user password-protected. If a unit is password-protected, the utility asks for the password after you select the unit. If the password entered is wrong, the utility repeats the ID selection for the same unit. If you do not know the password, take one of the following actions:
 - Discontinue stack interactive-setup by entering **Control-C**.
 - Obtain the device password from the administrator.
 - Skip the unit by entering 0 as the ID selection for this unit, and continue the stack interactive-setup process for your stack. The password-protected device and all devices connected behind it will not be included in the setup process.

9. As each discovered unit connection is re-displayed, enter **y** when prompted to accept the connection as shown in the following example (or enter **n** to decline the connection).

After you accept the topology, the active controller is confirmed, the stack is formed, and a standby controller is designated.

During the interactive-setup process, you are prompted to execute the **write memory** command if there are any changes to the stack-port or stack-trunk configuration on the active controller. At the end of the process, after new units join the stack, you are prompted to execute the **write memory** command to save the configuration of the other units.

If you do not issue the **write memory** command when prompted, you may lose the configuration the next time the stack reboots.

In the example, a stacking trunk is formed on ports 1/2/1 through 1/2/3 to connect to stack unit 3.

NOTE

To form a stack, the original stacking port and stacking trunk configuration may be modified or deleted, or new stacking port or trunk configuration may be added. Although the original configuration is not required in discovering units, the system attempts to keep the original configuration when possible, to respect the user's intentions.

After you save the configuration, all stack units except the active controller are reloaded.

The active controller is promoted to a priority of 128. In the example, the standalone (unit 1) that becomes the active controller was already configured with the priority 128. This priority is used in hitless switchover and failover negotiations as described in [Hitless Stacking](#) on page 171.

11. After the units reload and join the stack, the system displays information on the synchronization activities performed for each stack member as shown in the following example.

The originating unit, unit 1, forms a trunk through ports 1/2/1 and 3/2/1 as indicated by the double dashed line. Unit 1 also forms a stacking connection through port 1/2/4 and port 2/2/1. As the discovered units were already connected, a ring is formed. The output indicates the direction of the different connections. In the example, unit 3 (center) has a direction 0 connection on the stacking trunk 3/2/1 to 3/2/3 (connected to unit 1) and a direction 1 connection on port 3/2/4 (connected to unit 2).

Auto-trunking new links or converting a linear stack to a ring with stack interactive-setup

NOTE

The stack interactive-setup utility cannot detect mismatched live stack-trunks. For example, if one end of the trunk is stack-trunk 1/2/1 to 1/2/3 and the other end is stack-trunk 2/2/1 to 2/2/2, stack interactive-setup cannot detect the link 1/2/3 to 2/2/3 and enlarge the stack-trunk 2/2/1 to 2/2/2. The reason is that on one end, port 1/2/3 is an internal port, and on the other end, port 2/2/3 is a data port. The two ports cannot communicate. Output for the **show stack** command displays mismatch warning messages. Use the **multi-stack-trunk** command to correct the mismatch problem manually.

NOTE

Neither stack interactive-setup nor stack zero-touch provisioning can convert a live two-unit stack to a linear-topology trunk. If you are working with a live system, you can enter the **multi-stack-trunk 1/2/1 to 1/2/4 and 2/2/1 to 2/2/4** command to change the configuration on both units simultaneously. Refer to [Changing a live two-unit stack to a linear-topology trunk](#) on page 45 for more information.

The following example uses stack interactive-setup to enlarge and add stack-ports and stack-trunks to convert a linear stack to a ring. Although no new units are discovered, six additional links are detected between the existing stack units. The new connections between units 1 and 2 enlarge the stacking trunk to three ports. The existing stack does not show a connection between units 2 and 3; however, the stack interactive-setup probes have discovered three shared stacking links, which are expanded to a stack-trunk on each side to form a ring.

Changing stack unit IDs with stack interactive-setup

Scenario 2 - Using zero-touch provisioning to configure a stack

All stack member candidates must be correctly connected.

NOTE

The zero-touch provisioning process requires clean devices, with the exception of the active controller. Clean devices do not contain any configuration information.

NOTE

An ICX 7650 device with startup-config flash using 40-Gbps stacking ports but no other configuration is treated as a clean unit. Because an ICX 7650 device that uses 40-Gbps stacking requires the **rear-module stack-40g** command followed by the **write memory** and **reload** commands to change the default 100-Gbps stacking ports to 40-Gbps stacking ports, the related startup-config flash must be present.

If you are adding clean units without a startup or run-time configuration to a stack, you may elect to use the stack zero-touch provisioning process. Follow these steps to construct a stack with zero-touch provisioning.

Scenario 3 - Manually configuring a three member stack in a ring topology

If you are connecting units that have been individually configured for stacking and want unit IDs to be assigned based on physical sequence, you may want to configure the stack manually.

4. Connect the devices in a stack topology. The active controller retains its ID. The rest of the units are assigned unique ID numbers depending on the sequence in which you connected them.

NOTE

This method does not guarantee sequential stack IDs if you do not configure the optional **stack suggested-id** command on each standalone unit. If you want to change stack IDs to make them sequential, you can use `stack interactive-setup`. Refer to [Changing stack unit IDs with stack interactive-setup](#) on page 75.

NOTE

You can configure the **stack suggested-id** command in a standalone unit before using the **stack enable** command to cause the unit to join the stack. A unit is assigned the suggested ID if no other unit in the stack has that ID.

Log in to the active controller and verify the stack information by entering the **show stack** or **show stack detail** commands. If the stack is configured properly, you should see the following:

- One active controller, one standby controller, and stack members
- All stack members with a status of Ready

Displaying information on stack connections

You can check the data connections between stack units with the **show stack connection** command.

When the **show stack connection** command output includes the message ***** error: one-way**, this may indicate a stack port to non-stack-port connection. When this occurs, the side of the connection that is incorrectly configured as a stack port must be converted to a data port.

In the following example, the **show stack connection** command output indicates that CPU-to-CPU connections are working properly between all 12 members of the stack.

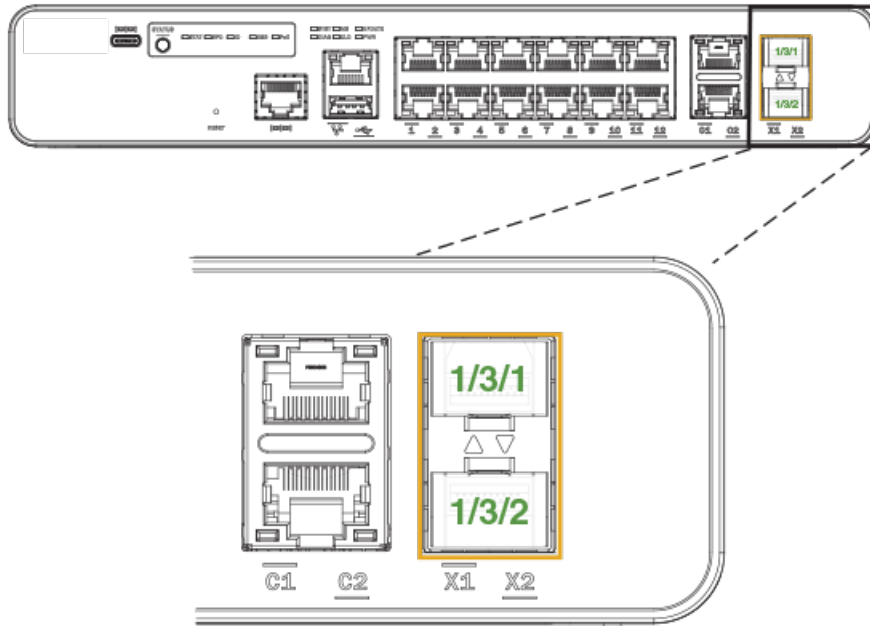

ICX 7150 stacking ports

Depending on the model, up to four SFP+ ports on the front panel of the ICX 7150 device support stacking. The ports can also be used as uplink (data) ports. The following figures show the location and numbering for stacking ports. The numbering for the ports is in three-tuple format (*x/y/z*) and refers to StackID/Slot/Port.

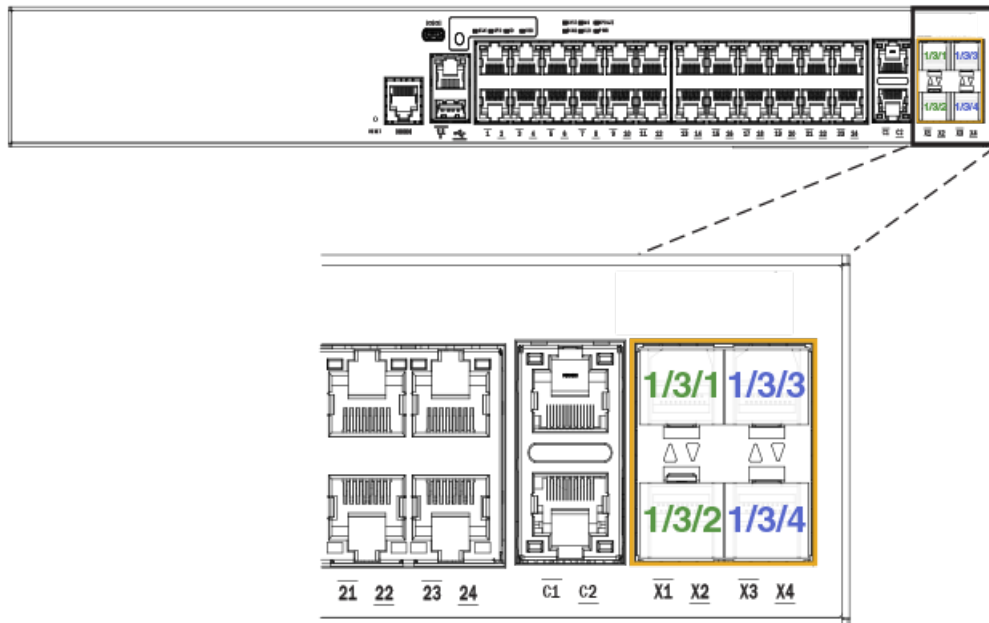

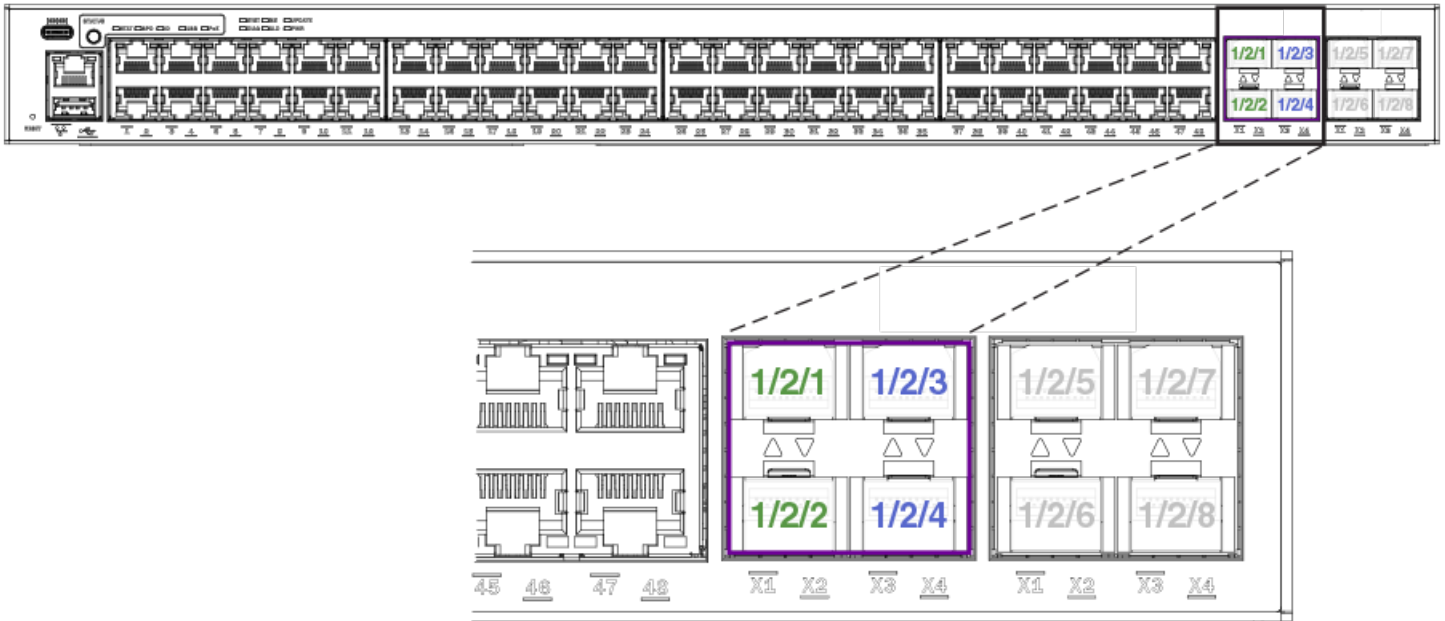
FIGURE 6 ICX 7150 stacking port location on 24-port and some 48-port models

The exception among 48-port models is the ICX 7150-48ZP, which has eight SPF+ ports on the front panel as shown in the following figure. Four of these ports, ports 1/2/1 through 1/2/4, can be used as stacking or data uplink ports. The remaining four, 1/2/5 through 1/2/8, can be used only as data uplink ports.

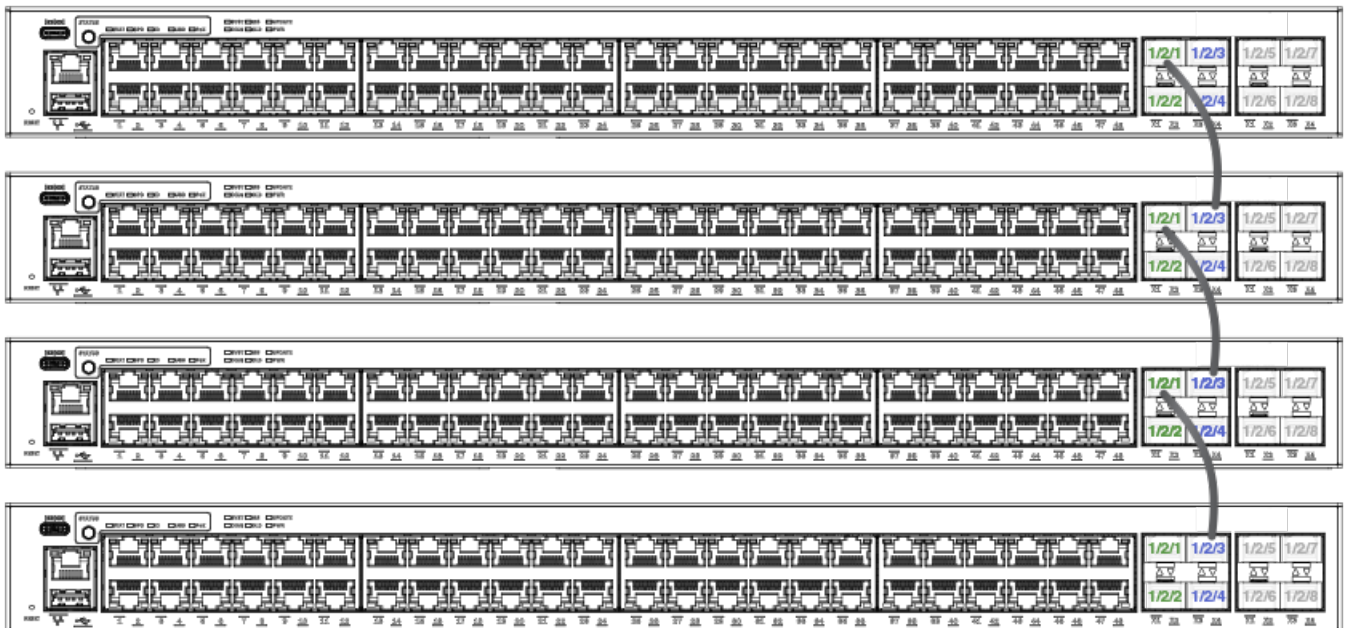
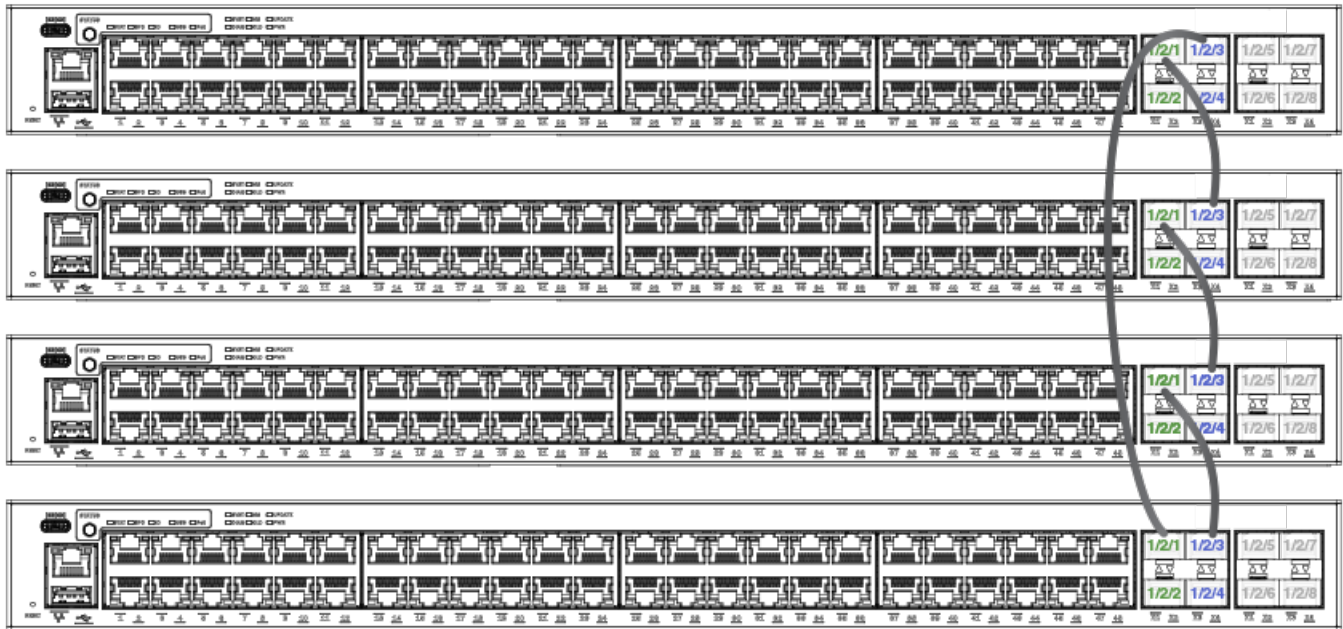
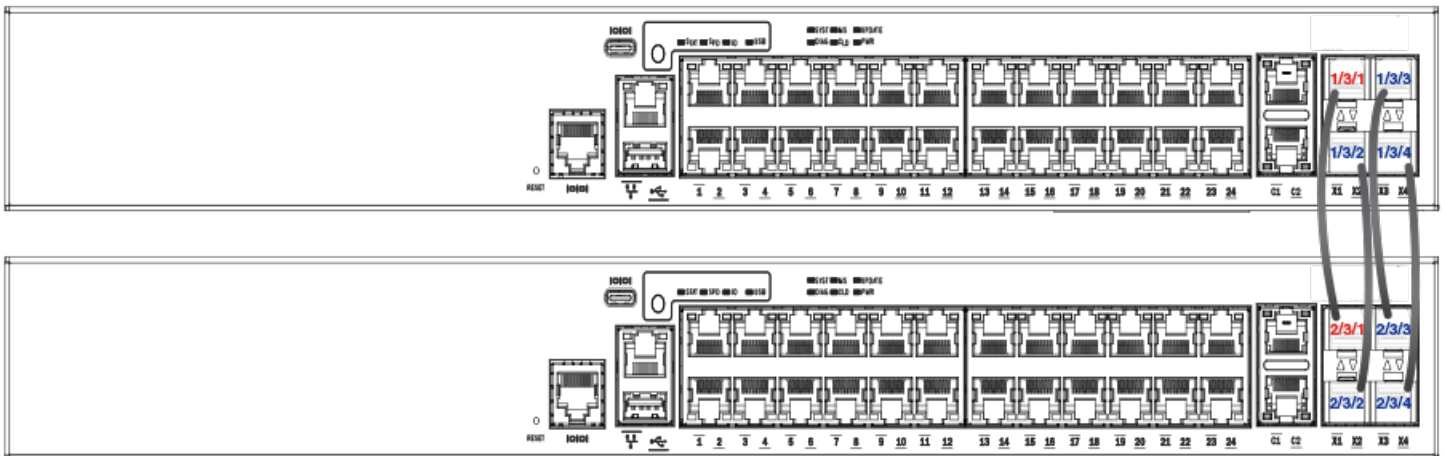


FIGURE 13 ICX 7150-48ZP stack ring topology

ICX 7150 configuration notes

In ICX 7150 devices, the LAG hashing scheme is different from other ICX platforms. As a result, the user may observe uneven distribution of packets when the traffic pattern is sequential or incremental in the same step, for example, when both the source and the destination IP address are incremented in the same step.

ICX 7150 stacking trunks

All ports on both ends of a trunk must be configured at the same speed. The lead port in a stacking trunk must be a valid-stack-port. The default valid-stack-ports come up automatically as 10-Gbps ports (assuming they are licensed). Additional 10-Gbps ports require a license.

NOTE

Two 10-Gbps stacking ports are standard on ICX 7150-48ZP devices.

Stacking trunks can be configured as part of the stack interactive-setup process. Trunks can also be added when a link is down or on a production unit as described later in this section.

The following table lists ports that can be combined as stacking trunks. Refer to [Support for two-unit stack linear-topology trunks](#) on page 36 for more information on linear-topology trunks.

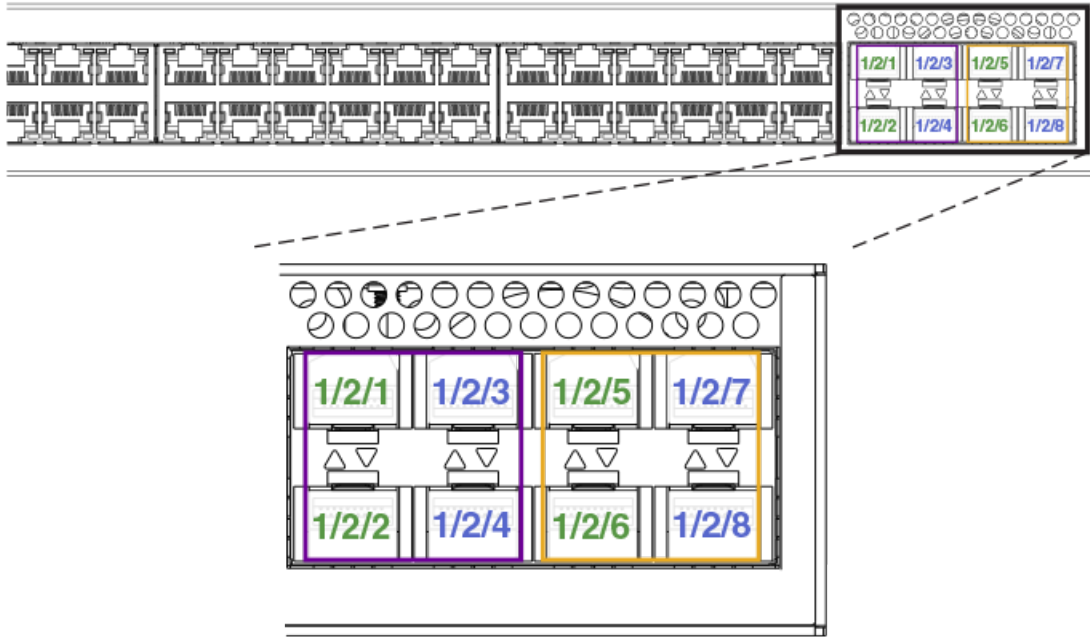
Up to 12 ICX 7250-24, ICX 7250-24P, ICX 7250-48, or ICX 7250-48P units can be connected in a linear or ring topology. Any of these models can be mixed in the same stack. Stacking ports are located on the front panel as shown in the following figures.

NOTE

The ICX 7250-24G is not stackable.

From one to four 10-Gbps ports (from eight available 10-Gbps ports) can be used for stacking on the ICX 7250. All stacking ports must have an active license installed to be properly configured. Active stacking ports can be configured in one of two sets of ports on the front panel; however, stacking ports cannot be mixed between the two sets of ports because of operational constraints. Available ports are numbered 1/2/1 through 1/2/8 as shown in the following figure.

FIGURE 16 ICX 7250-24P linear stack

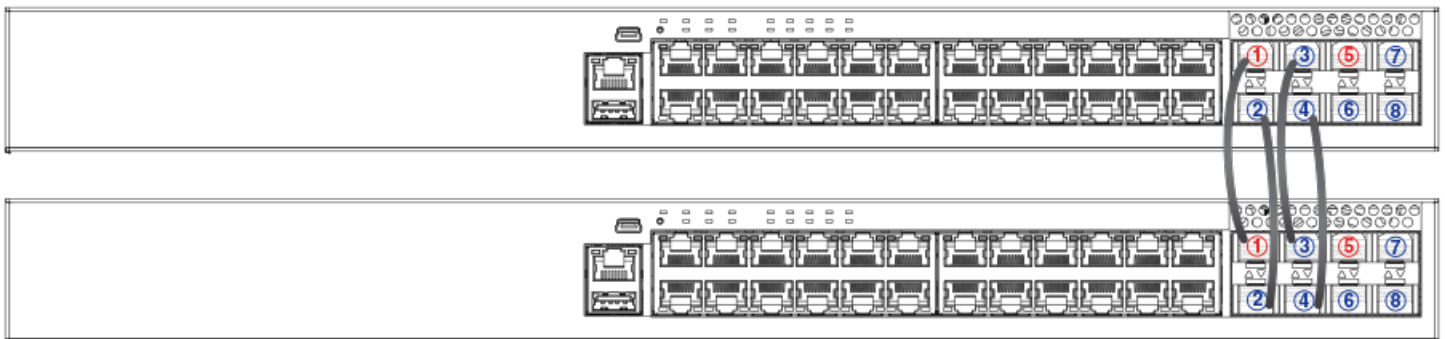


FIGURE 17 ICX 7250-24P ring stack

ICX 7250 stacking configuration notes

All ICX 7250 platforms except the ICX 7250-24G support stacking on 10-Gbps links. The ICX 7250 requires a license for ports to operate at 10 Gbps. Otherwise, the ports support only 1 Gbps. These 1-Gbps ports do not support stacking.

If a port is configured to operate at 1 Gbps in the startup configuration, it would continue to operate at 1 Gbps after a license is installed, unless it is re-configured to operate at 10 Gbps. Refer to [Reconfiguring ICX 7250 1-Gbps ports as 10-Gbps ports](#) on page 106. However, if no user configuration is present for the ports, they will automatically be configured as 10-Gbps ports when a license is installed.

If an ICX 7250 stack is formed on licensed ports and the license is later removed, the stack breaks after reload because the stack ports return to 1-Gbps mode. To form the stack again, the license must be downloaded to each device.

Of the eight 10-Gbps SFP+ ports potentially available on the ICX 7250 as stacking or uplink ports, a maximum of four ports can be used simultaneously for stacking. These ports can operate as separate ports, or they can be configured as two-port trunks. Refer

to [ICX 7250 trunk configuration](#) on page 106 for more information. All eight ports are available as uplink data ports when not used for stacking.

When stacking is configured, all stack ports and trunks must be either in the port range of 1/2/1 through 1/2/4 or in the port range 1/2/5 through 1/2/8. Ports 1/2/1 through 1/2/8 support both active cables and 10-Gbps SFP+ optics. Ports 1/2/5 through 1/2/8 have re-timers that support active cables. Any of these ports can be used for long-distance stacking if appropriate SFP's and cables are used. When any units in the stack are cross-cabled to a unit with stacking on ports 1/2/1 through 1/2/4, active cables should be used throughout the stack.

Reconfiguring ICX 7250 1-Gbps ports as 10-Gbps ports

A port previously configured as a 1-Gbps port must be reconfigured to operate at 10 Gbps. Stacking on the ICX 7250 is only available on 10-Gbps ports in module 2.

NOTE

A license is required for 10-Gbps ports on the ICX 7250. Refer to the *Ruckus FastIron Software Licensing Guide* for additional information.

NOTE

Once a 10-Gbps port license is installed, previously unconfigured ports that are covered by the license come up automatically as 10-Gbps ports. Ports must then be configured for stacking. Refer to [ICX 7250 stacking configuration notes](#) on page 105.

Use the **speed-duplex** command to reconfigure port speed on a 1-Gbps port.

In the following example, port 1/2/1, a 1-Gbps port, is reconfigured as a 10-Gbps port.

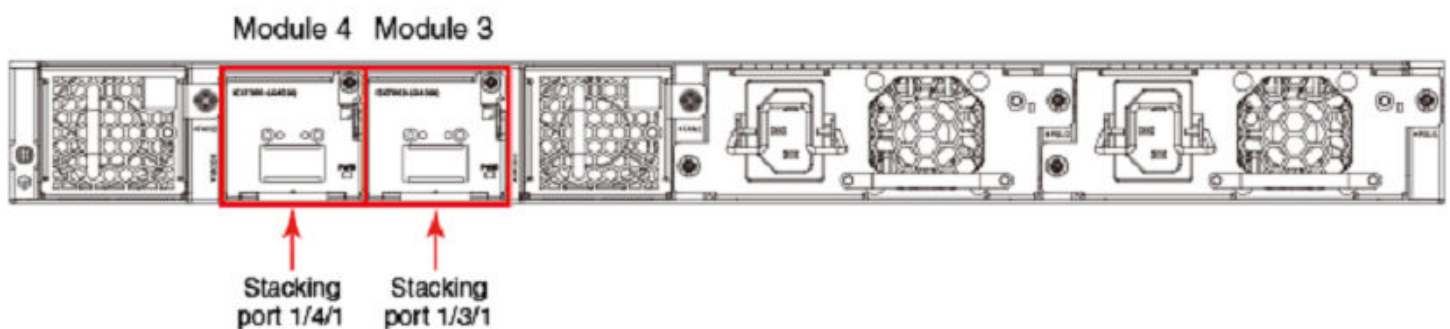

FIGURE 19 ICX 7450 1 X 40-Gbps valid-stack-ports

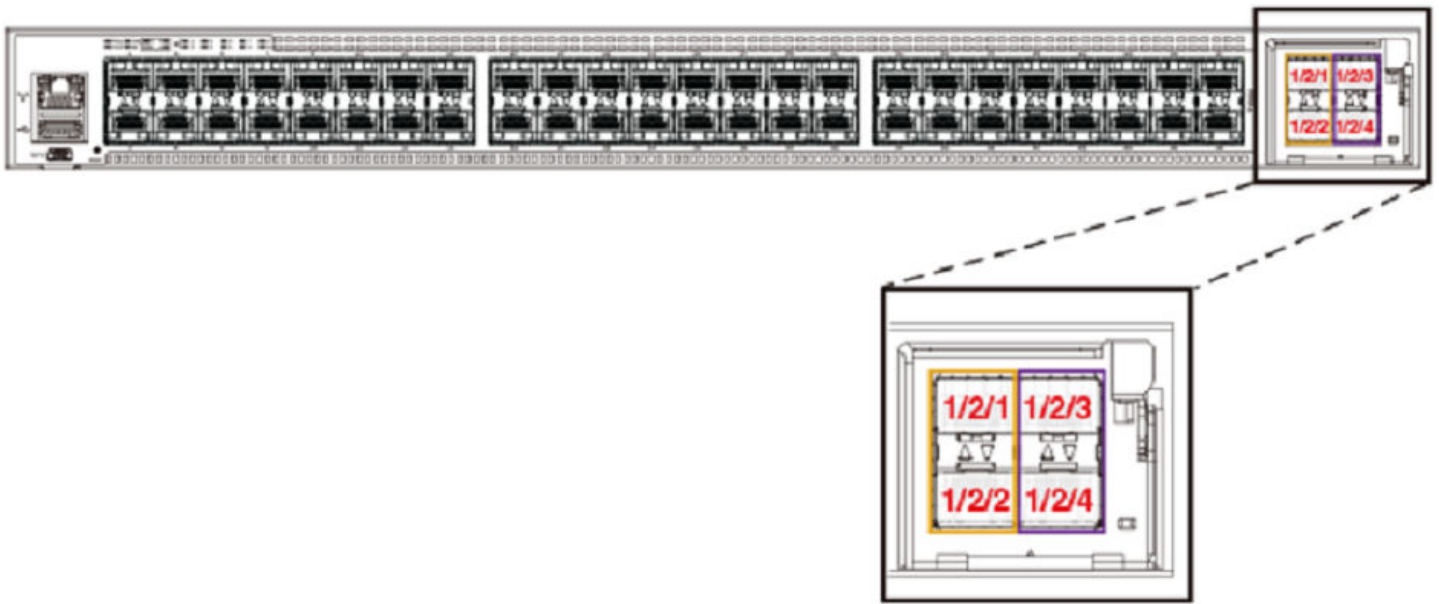

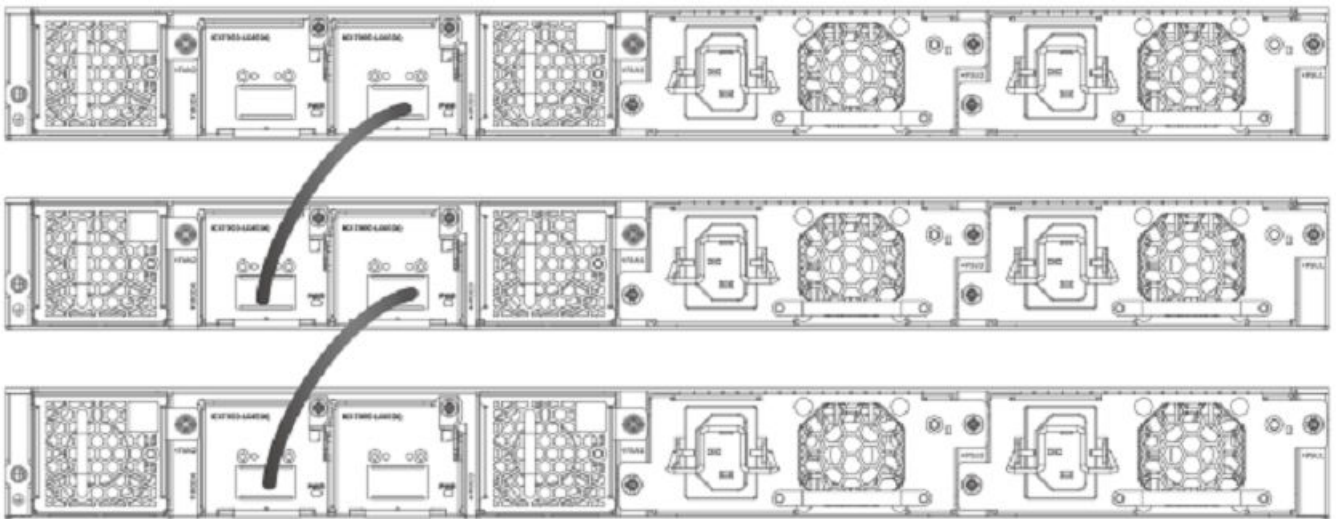

FIGURE 20 ICX 7450 module 2 ports available for stacking



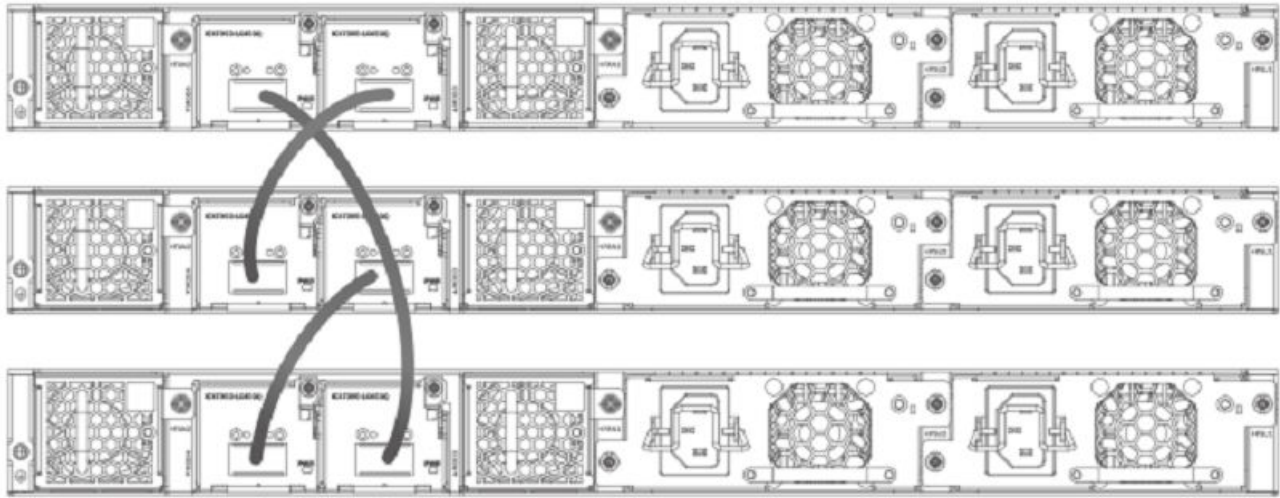

FIGURE 25 ICX 7450-24P two-unit stack with linear-topology trunk (front panel)

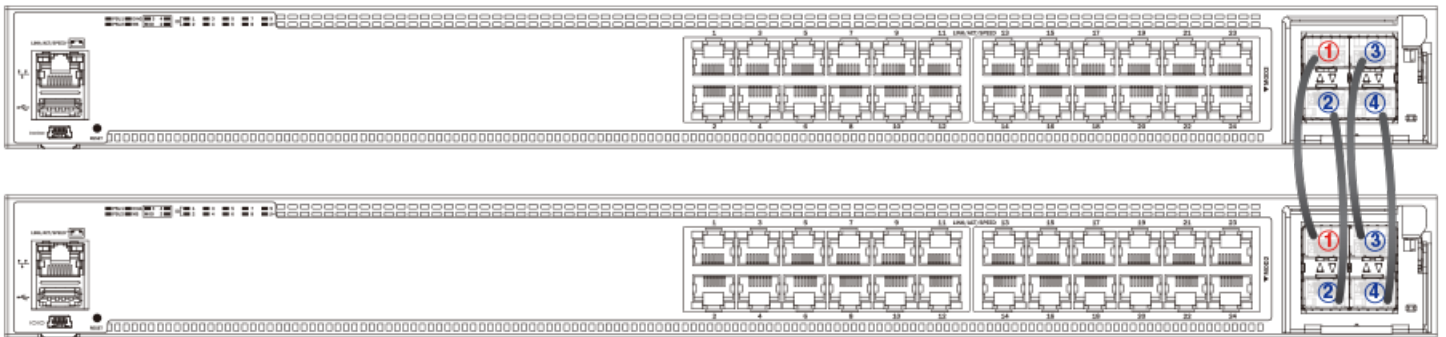
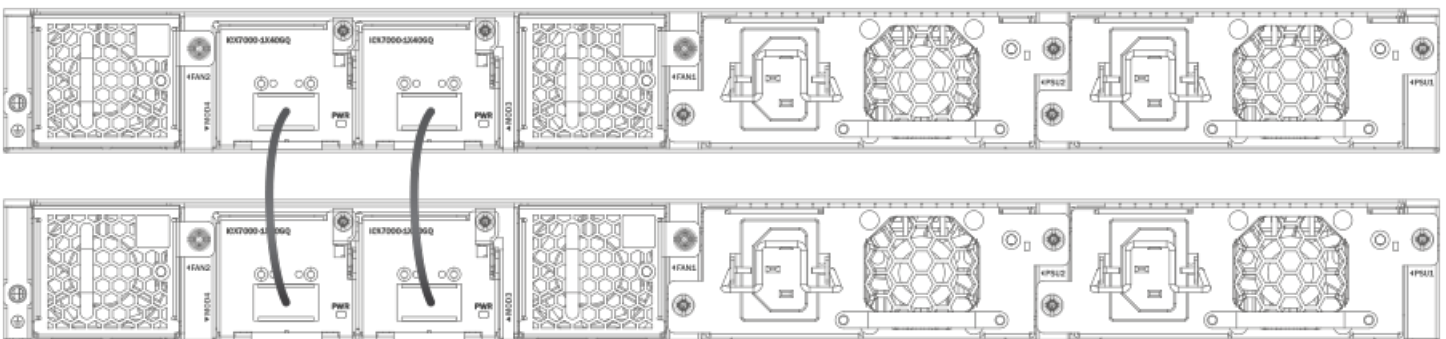


FIGURE 26 ICX 7450-24P two-unit stack with linear-topology trunk (rear panel)

- The 1 X 40-Gbps module supports stacking only when installed in rear panel slot 3 or 4.
- The ICX 7450 supports 10-Gbps stacking when a 4X10GF module is present in slot 2. Refer to [Configuring 10-Gbps stacking ports on ICX 7450 devices](#) on page 113 for more information on 4 X 10-Gbps ports.
- Stack ports can be configured using the **stack-port** or **stack-trunk** command.
- ICX 7450 units support stack trunks only on a 4 X 10-Gbps (4X10GF) module installed in slot 2.

Configuring 10-Gbps stacking ports on ICX 7450 devices

By default, the ICX 7450 uses 40-Gbps ports in slots 3 and 4 as stacking ports. When a 4X10GF module is installed in slot 2 on the front panel of an ICX 7450, 10-Gbps stacking can be configured.

Once the stack-ports are configured, enter the **write memory** and then the **reload** command, after which the unit is ready to join an existing stack or to be configured for stacking using stack interactive-setup or manual stack construction.

NOTE

You must enable stacking with the **stack enable** command before you can initiate stack interactive-setup or construct a stack.

NOTE

Changing the **stack-port** configuration and entering the **reload** command are not required for a unit to be discovered by stack interactive-setup or stack zero-touch provisioning. However, you must reload the prospective active controller after its stacking ports are changed before you initiate stack interactive-setup or stack zero-touch provisioning from that unit. The units to be discovered do not need to configure anything or reload. The active controller reloads them as members after they are discovered.

NOTE

If you use the manual construction method, you must reload every unit if you have changed stacking ports 1/3/1 and 1/4/1 to ports on slot 2.

Converting ICX 7450 slot 2 ports for MACsec or stacking

When a 4x10GF module is installed in slot 2 of the ICX 7450, it is enabled for MACsec even if the ports have not been configured. To use these ports for stacking, you must reconfigure them.

NOTE

The ICX 7450 can support 4 X 10-Gbps stacking from slot 2 or 40-Gbps stacking from rear ports; however, it cannot support both at the same time.

By default, if a 4X10GF module is present in slot 2, it is enabled for MACsec. No reload or power-cycle is required to enable or disable MACsec on slot 2 interfaces. However, to use the slot 2 ports for stacking, the stacking ports must be changed, and the unit must be reloaded as described in [Configuring 10-Gbps stacking ports on ICX 7450 devices](#) on page 113.

If the 4X10GF module in slot 2 is programmed for stacking during bootup, MACsec cannot be configured on the ports until the stacking ports have been changed to rear panel ports and the unit has been reloaded or turned off and on.

MACsec and stacking cannot be configured at the same time on slot 2 interfaces. However, 4X10GF modules installed in slots 3 and 4 on the rear panel of the ICX 7450 can support MACsec at the same time that slot 2 is configured for 4X10GF stacking.

The following error message is displayed when MACsec is configured on slot 2 and you try to set the stacking ports to slot 2.

Creating stacking trunks on the ICX 7450

The ICX 7450 supports two stacking trunks per stack unit when the 4X10GF module in slot 2 is used for stacking.

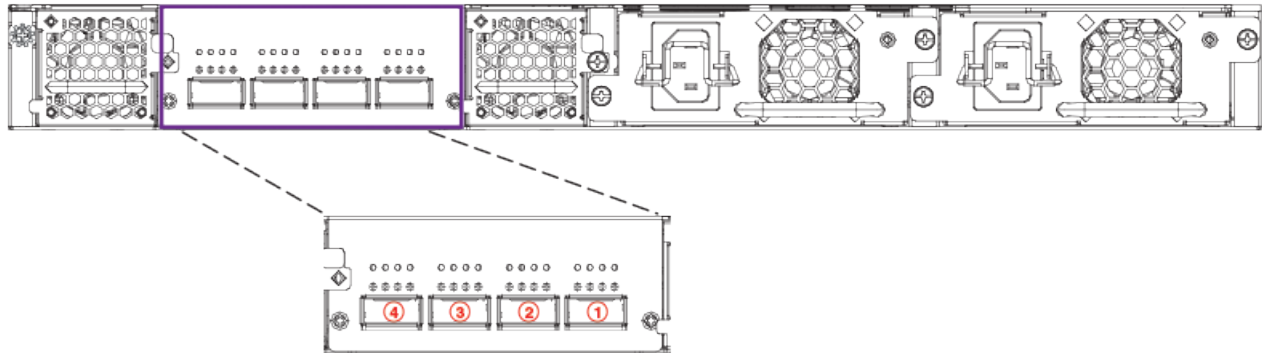

ICX 7650 stacking ports

ICX 7650 devices support stacking through Module 3 on the rear panel, shown in the following figure.

The rear module is fixed, and its ports can be configured for stacking or uplink. By default, the rear module supports 100-Gbps stacking on ports 1 and 2 (1/3/1 and 1/3/2). When 100-Gbps stacking is enabled, ports 3 and 4 are not used. Stacking trunks are not supported on 100-Gbps connections in a stack that contains more than two units. However, a 100-Gbps linear-topology trunk (ports 1/3/1 to 1/3/2) is supported in a two-unit stack.

The rear-module stacking configuration can be changed to support four 40-Gbps stacking ports using the rear-module uplink-40g command. Stacking ports or stacking trunks can be configured on 40-Gbps connections.

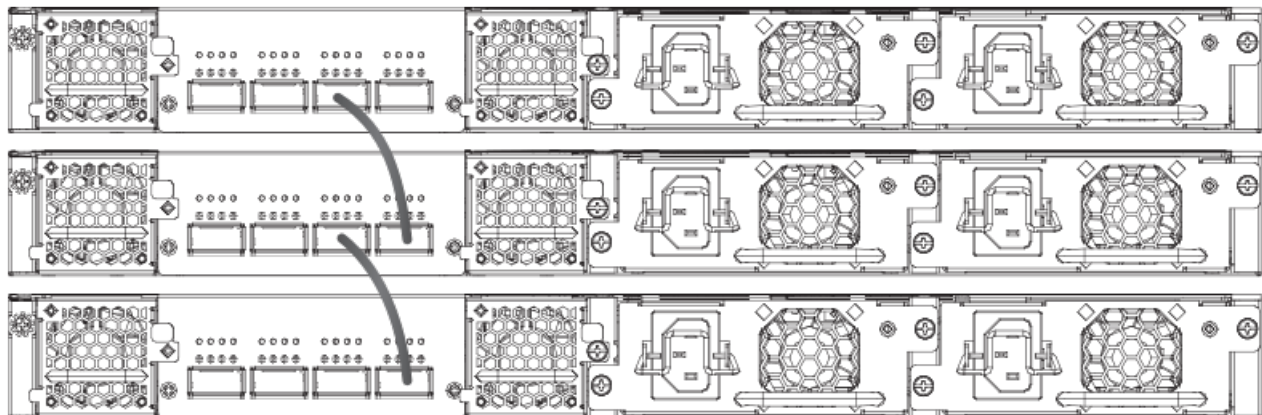

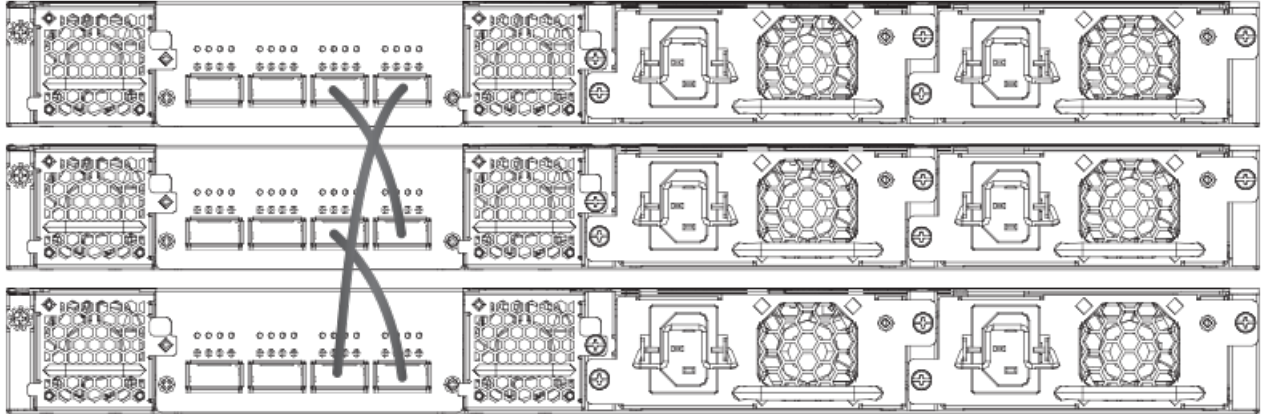
FIGURE 28 ICX 7650 100-Gbps linear stack

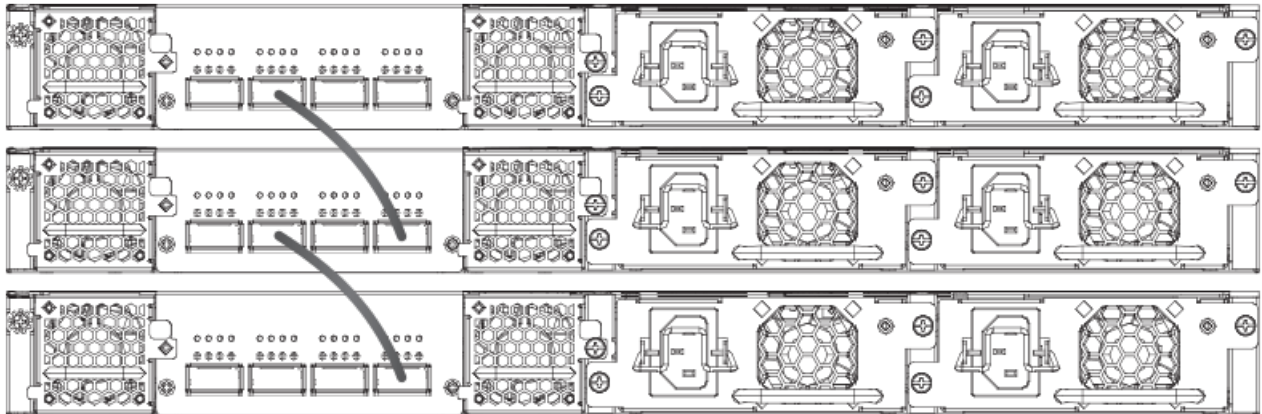
FIGURE 29 ICX 7650 100-Gbps ring stack

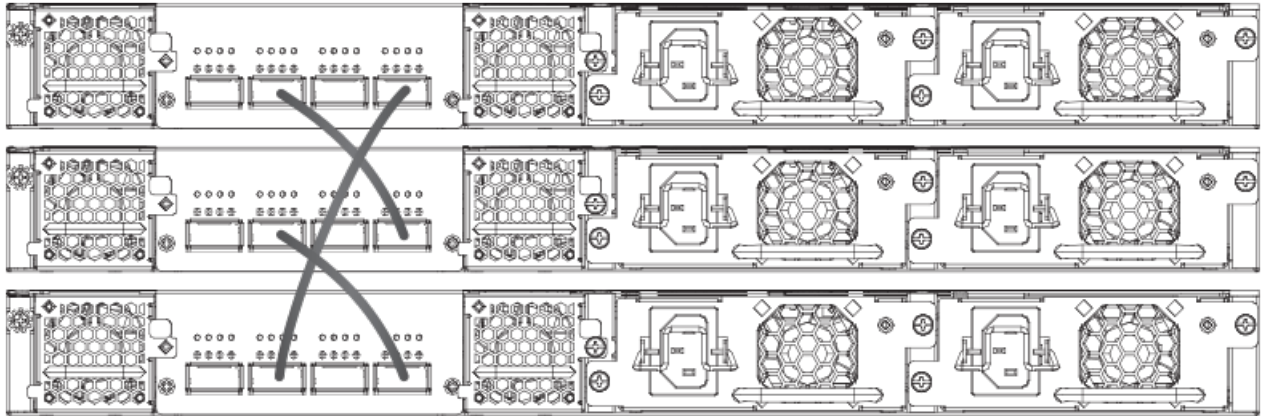
FIGURE 30 ICX 7650 40-Gbps linear stack

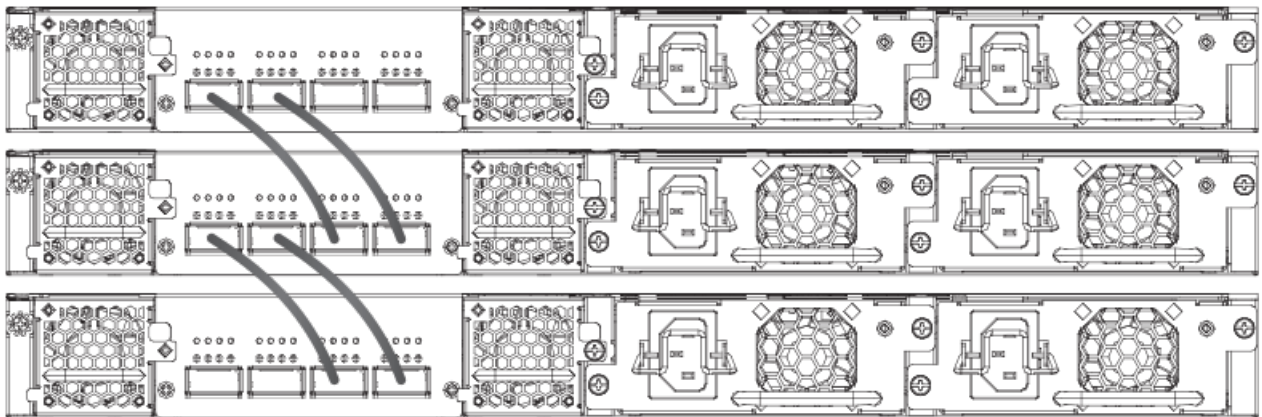

FIGURE 32 ICX 7650-48ZP two-unit stack linear-topology trunk (40 Gbps)

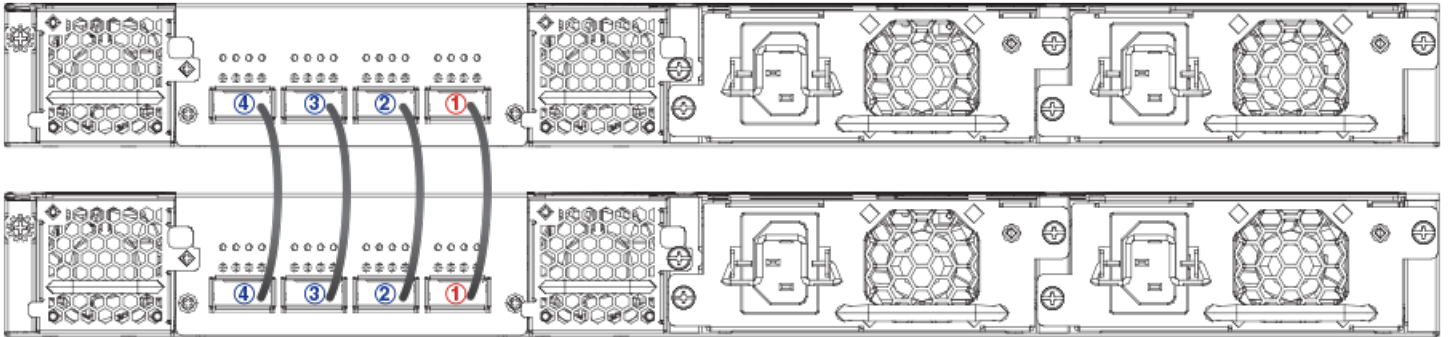
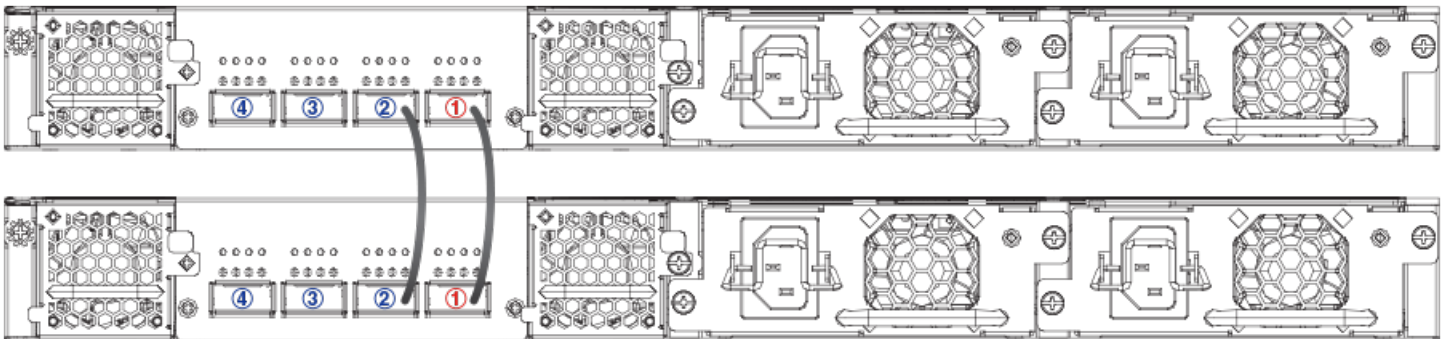


FIGURE 33 ICX 7650-48ZP two-unit stack linear-topology trunk (100 Gbps)



ICX 7650 configuration notes

Consider these items when configuring an ICX 7650 stack:

- On ICX 7650 devices, "rear module" refers to Module 3.
- Stacking ports operate in 100-Gbps stacking mode by default when an ICX 7650 device has no rear-module configuration.
- Optics and stacking ports differ for 100-Gbps and 40-Gbps stacking. Connections remain down if you attempt to configure stacking with a port speed mismatch. It is the user's responsibility to change the optics.
- To join a stack, a new ICX 7650 unit must be preconfigured to match the **rear-module** configuration of the existing stack.
- You cannot issue a **rear-module stack-40g** or **no rear-module** command unless the data uplink configuration has been removed from the ports.
- When a stack has been formed, you cannot configure the rear module for uplink mode without removing the stacking configuration from all stack members and rebooting the units.
- Stack units must be configured with matching High-Gig Ethernet settings.
- When the rear module is operating in uplink mode, you can configure stacking offline; however, stacking elections are blocked. When you execute the **write memory** command, you will be prompted to save or erase the stacking configuration. If you elect to erase the stacking configuration with the **erase startup-config** command, all the stacking configuration, including the stacking.boot file configuration, is removed.
- Stacking or uplink mode settings must be saved with the **write memory** command and do not become active until the **reload** command is issued for the stack or standalone unit.

- If uplink mode is active on the ICX 7650 rear module, Module 2 cannot be used for uplink.
- If the ICX 7650 rear module has been operating in stacking mode, is reconfigured for uplink mode, and later is returned to stacking mode, Module 2 uplink port configuration may be lost. When Module 3 has been configured with the command **rear-module uplink-100g** or **rear-module uplink-40g** and before the user executes the **write memory** command to save the configuration, the following warning message appears: "After reload, rear module ports will be configured as uplink ports, and module 2 will be unused. Existing configurations for ports in module 2 may be removed."
- A configuration mismatch with the physical module installed as Module 2 can cause a stacking unit to become non-operational. The mismatch can be resolved by removing the unit from the stack so that the active controller relearns its configuration or by correcting module information. Refer to [Resolving Module 2 mismatches in an ICX 7650 stack](#) on page 135 for more information. For additional information on Module 2, refer to the *ICX 7650 Switch Hardware Installation Guide*.

ICX 7650 rear-module options

NOTE

ICX 7650 devices cannot operate in a stack when the rear module is configured for data uplink. Stacking election mechanisms and all stacking operations, including IPC communications, are blocked in uplink mode.

The following operating modes can be configured on the ICX 7650 fixed rear module (Module 3):

- 2 X 100-Gbps stacking (the default)
- 4 X 40-Gbps stacking
- 2 X 100-Gbps data uplink
- 2 X 40-Gbps data uplink

Changing ICX 7650 stacking speed

Be sure to connect stacking ports using optics that are compatible with the planned port speed. Be sure that the correct ports are connected. Be sure that speeds match on both ends of the stacking connection.

1. To change the rear-module stacking speed from 100 Gbps to 40 Gbps, enter the following commands on each affected unit.

ICX 7650 devices cannot operate in a stack when the rear module is configured for data uplink. Stacking election mechanisms and all stacking operations, including IPC communications, are blocked in uplink mode.

When the rear module operates in stacking mode and has active member units attached to it, you cannot convert the rear module to uplink mode. To change the rear module to uplink mode, you must first unconfigure the stack.

Follow these steps to convert the rear module (Module 3) of an ICX 7650 device from stacking to uplink mode.

- (Optional) Enter the **show stack** command to check for active stack configuration.

FIGURE 34 ICX 7750 stacking ports on front panel

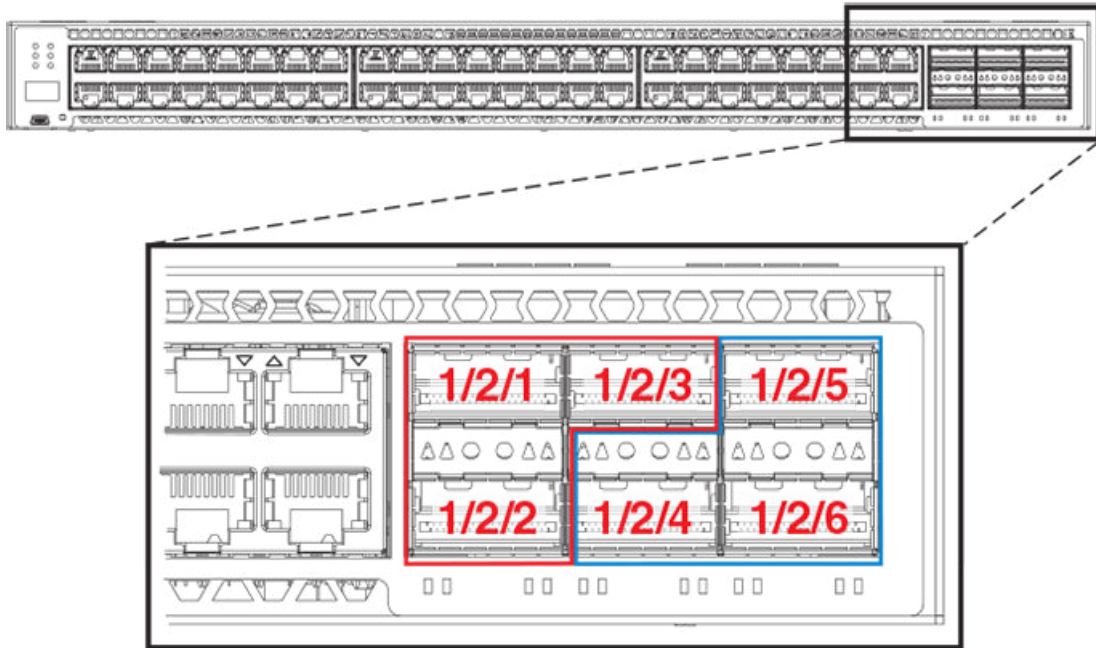
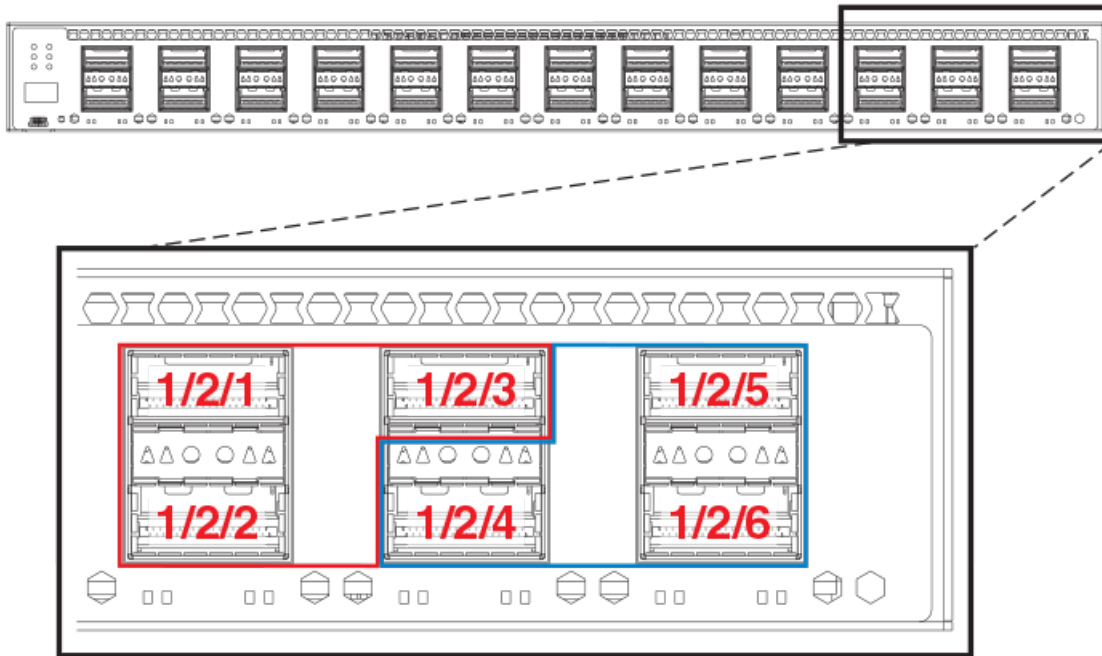
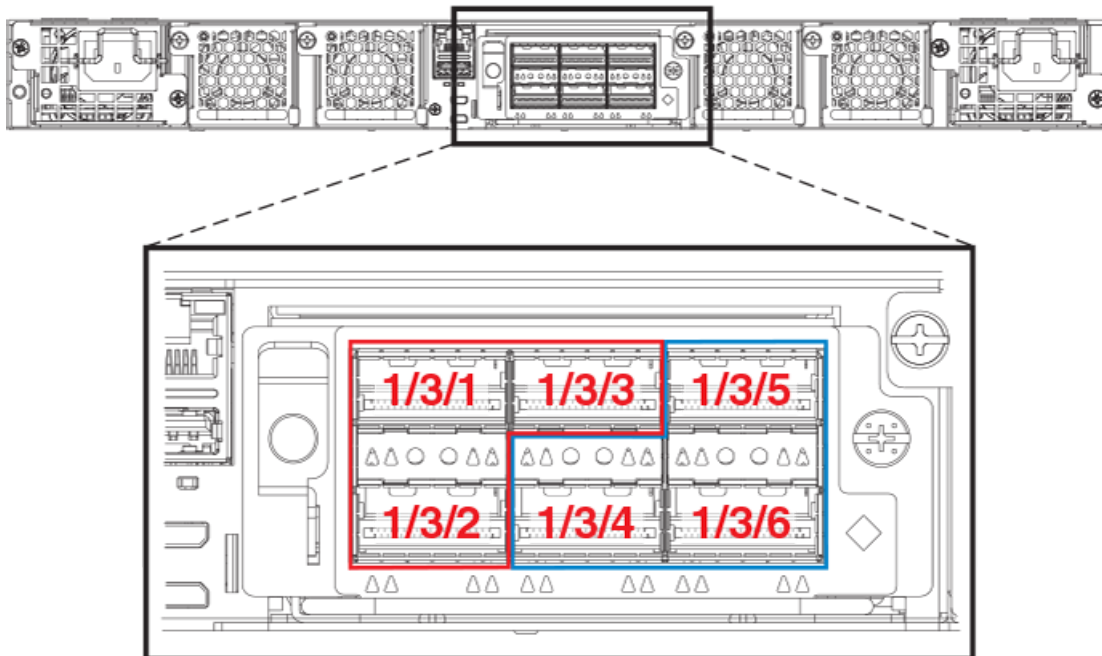


FIGURE 35 ICX 7750-26Q front panel stacking ports



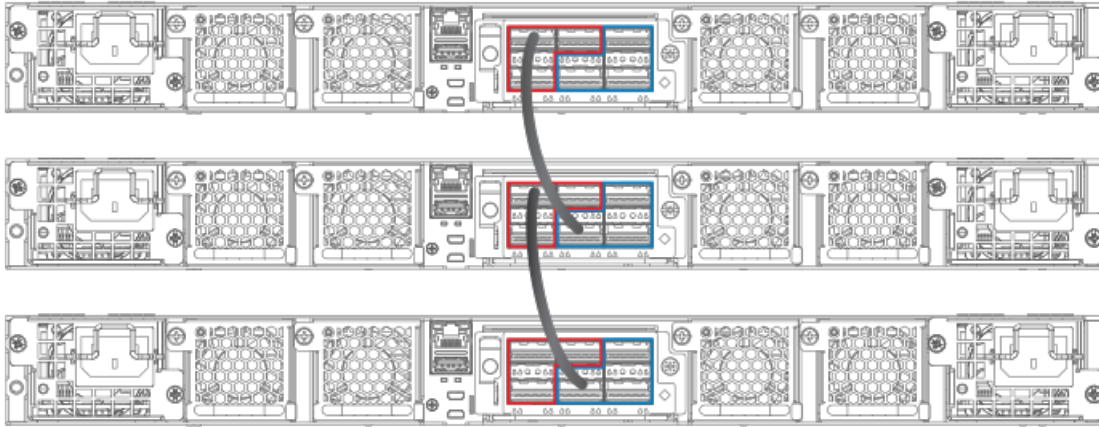

FIGURE 38 ICX 7750 ring stack from front panel

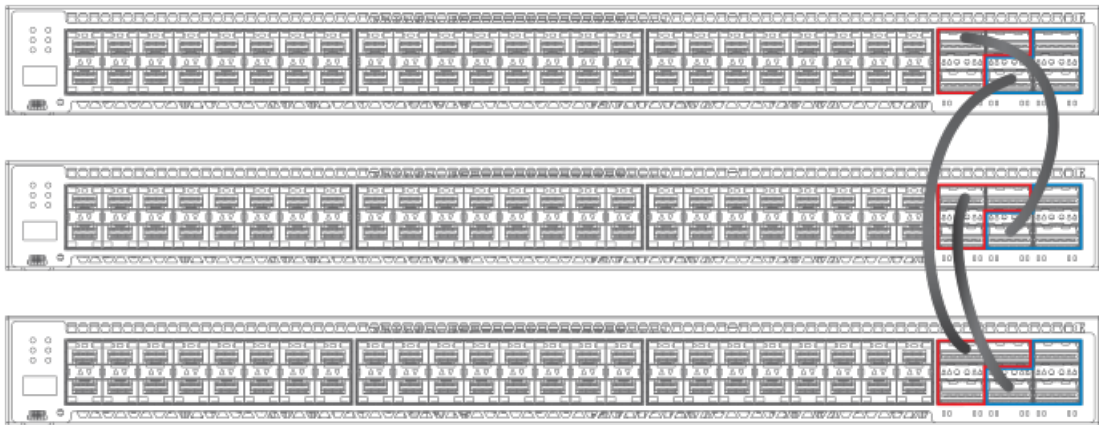


FIGURE 39 ICX 7750 ring stack from rear panel

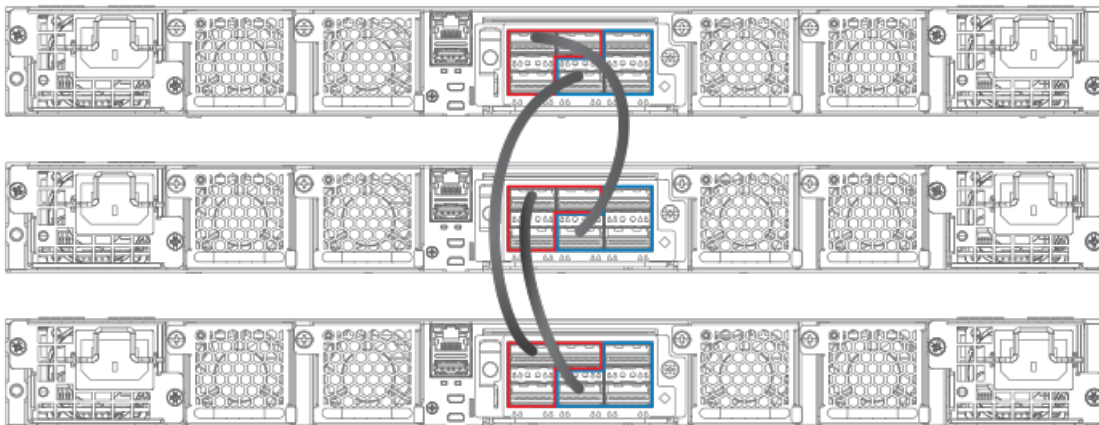
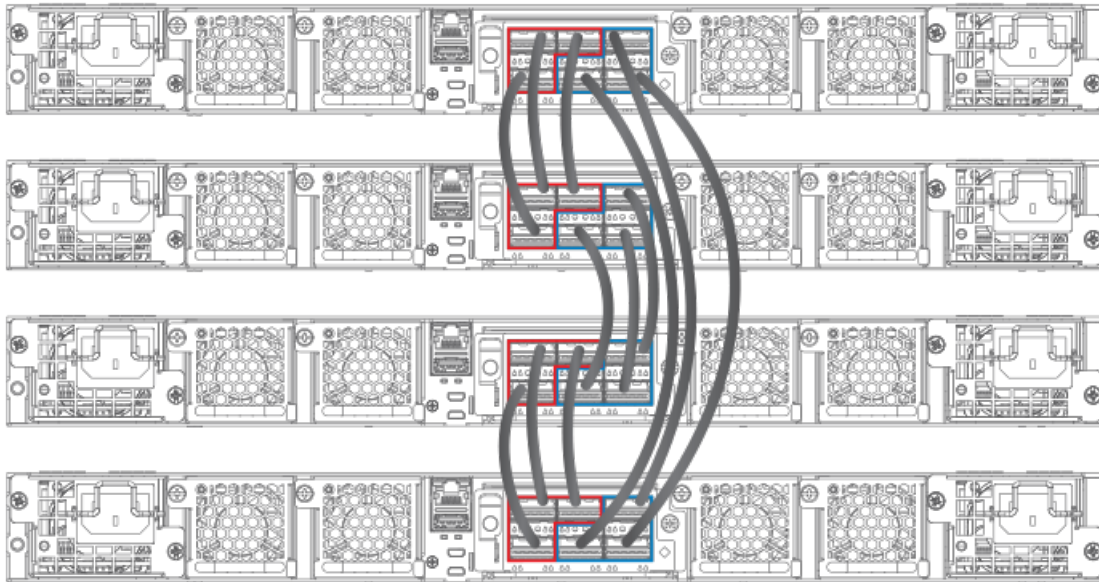


FIGURE 40 ICX 7750 fully populated ring stack from rear panel with three-port stacking trunks

FIGURE 41 ICX 7750-48C two-unit stack with linear-topology trunk (four-port trunk)

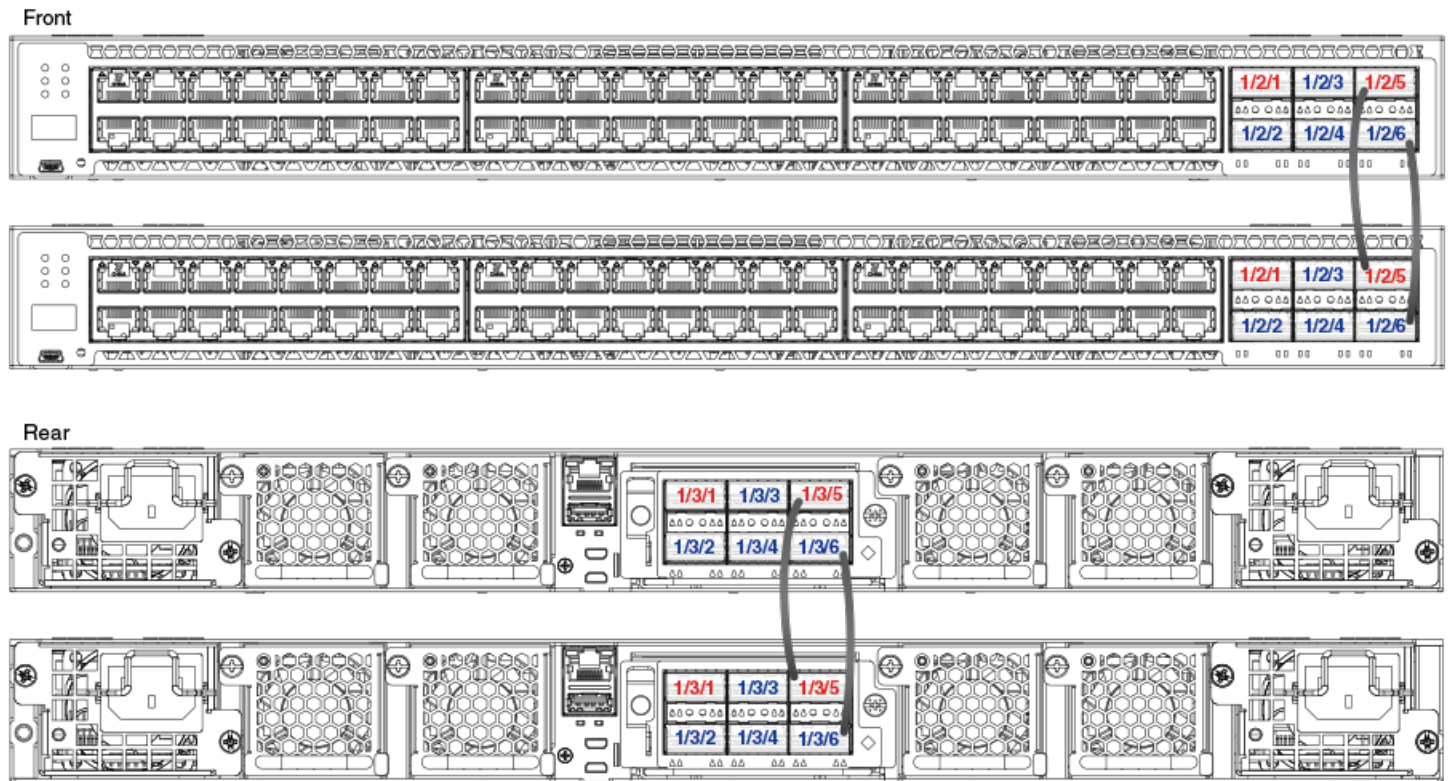
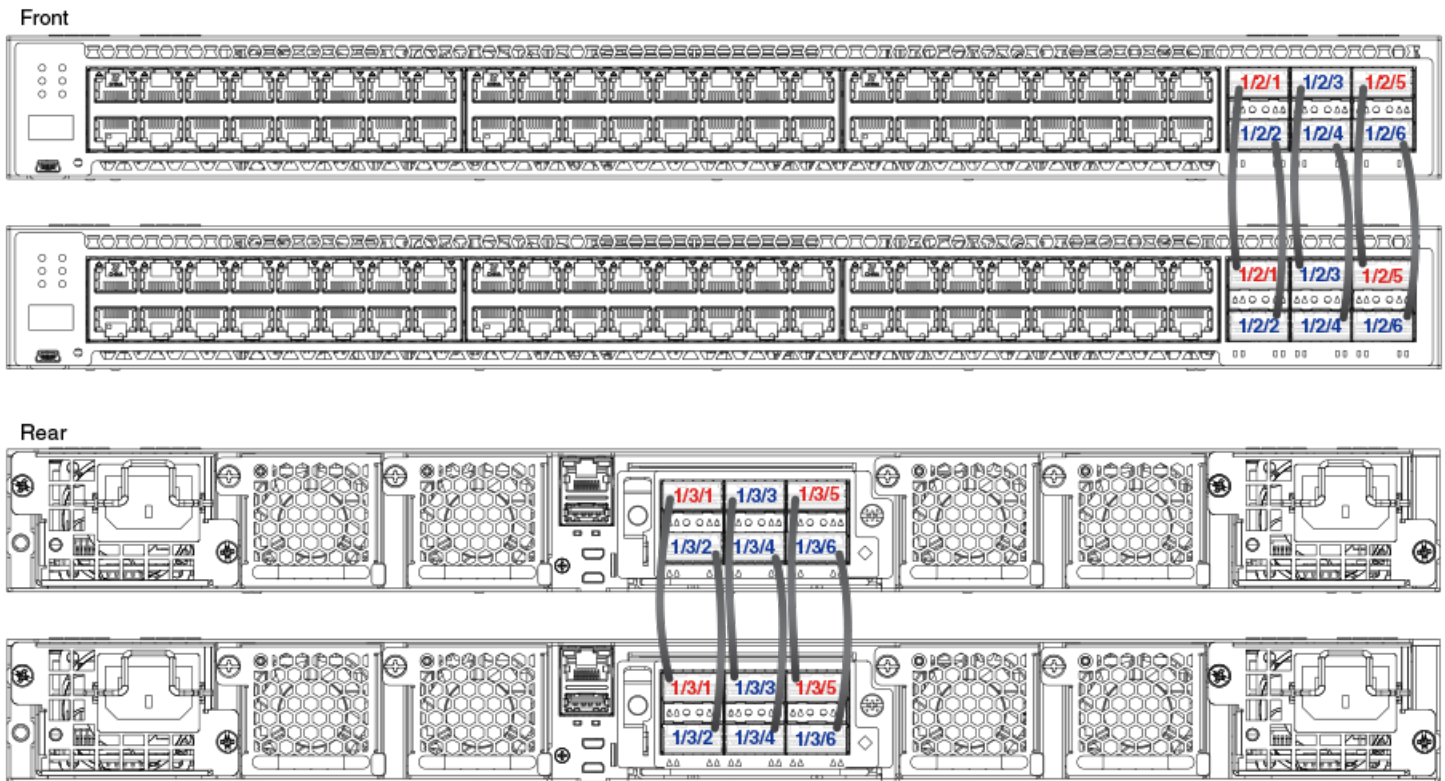


FIGURE 42 ICX 7750-48C two-unit stack with linear-topology trunk (twelve-port trunk)



Installing the ICX 7750 in a remote stack

The ICX 7750-26Q, ICX 7750-48C, and ICX 7750-48F can support stacking distances of 10 kilometers.

To achieve maximum stacking distance, these ICX 7750 models must use Ruckus LR4 fiber optics. LR4 optics require high-power operating mode and an advanced thermal profile to control the fan cooling system. As a result, LR4 optics can be used for stacking only on specific ICX 7750 ports: 1/2/5 and 1/2/6 on module 2 (front panel) or 1/3/5 and 1/3/6 on module 3 (rear panel).

NOTE

The ICX 7750-26Q supports LR4 optics on module 2 ports 1/2/1 through 1/2/6. The stacking cable must be attached to stacking port 1/2/1 or 1/2/4 (refer to the following figure). Port and trunk configuration are otherwise the same as for any ICX 7750 stack.

On an ICX 7750 stack, you can configure stack-port x/2/5, stack-port x/2/6, stack-port x/3/5, stack-port x/3/6, stack-trunk x/2/5 to x/2/6, or stack-trunk x/3/5 to x/3/6. Some combinations are not allowed. For more information, refer to "Valid-stack-port sets" in [ICX 7750 stack configuration overview](#) on page 136.

Port locations for potential stacking ports are shown in the following figures. Although different models are depicted, the port locations are the same on all ICX 7750 units.

FIGURE 43 Module 2 front panel stacking ports (ICX 7750-26Q)

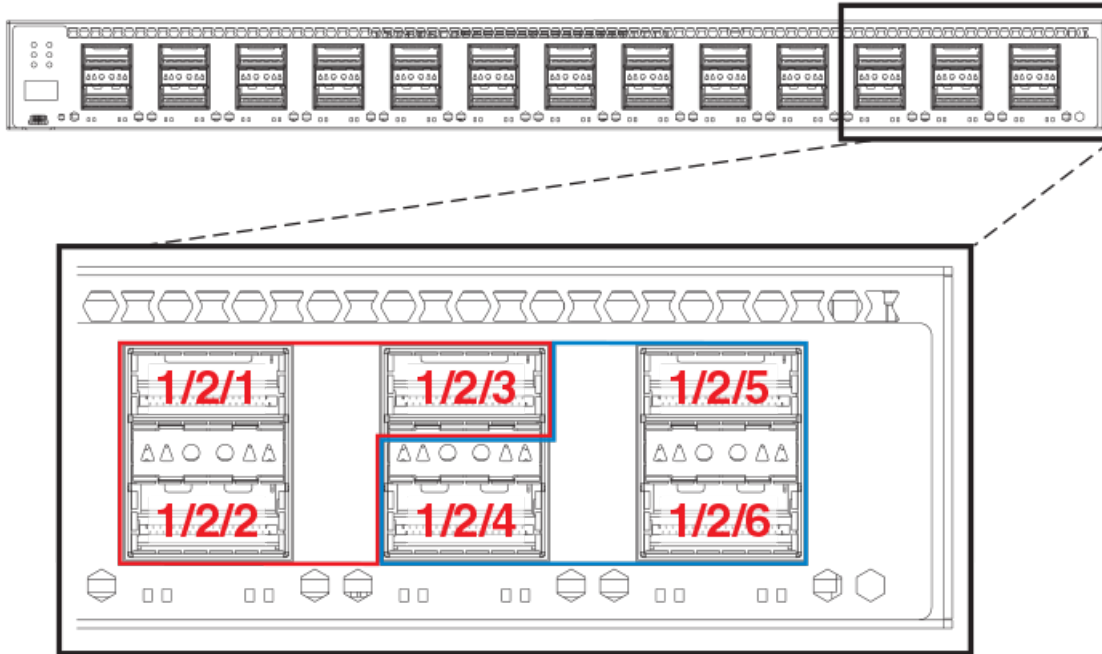


FIGURE 44 Module 2 front panel stacking ports (ICX 7750-48C)

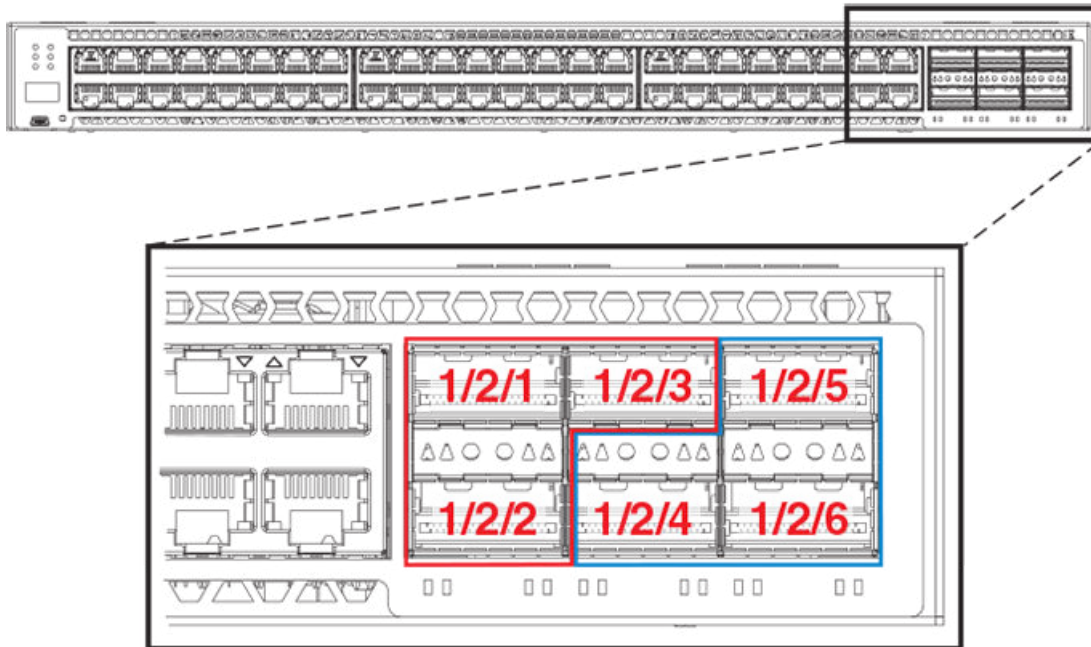
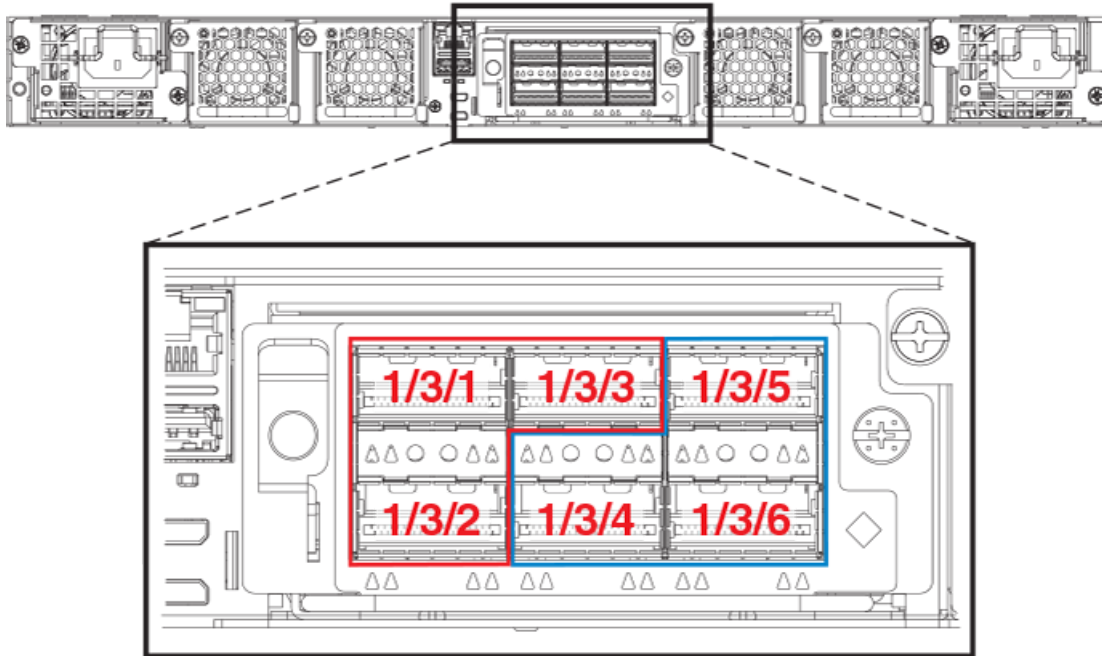


FIGURE 45 Module 3 rear panel stacking ports (ICX 7750-48C)

ICX 7750 stacking configuration notes

- If an ICX 7750 has a 40-Gbps port configured for breakout into sub-ports, any attempt to enable the unit for stacking will fail. Remove the breakout configuration before enabling stacking on the unit. Refer to the *Ruckus FastIron Management Configuration Guide* for more information on breakout cable configuration.
- When adding a new unit on a linear stack, make sure that the last unit of the existing stack has both stack-ports or stack-trunks configured.
- Unused stacking ports can be used as data ports. For example, you can elect to use only one valid-stack-port as a stacking port and use the other valid-stack-port as a data port. Furthermore, when an ICX 7750 stacking module is not configured for stacking, its stacking ports can be used as data ports. For example, they can be tagged or untagged or configured as breakout ports.
- To configure a stack trunk manually on a stack unit, use the **stack-trunk** command. However, in a live production environment, use the **multi-stack-trunk** command as described in [Creating an ICX 7750 stacking link in a production environment](#) on page 147.
- Only ports that are in sequential order can be configured as a stacking trunk.
- A valid-stack-port, either port 1/2/1 or 1/2/4 in module 2 or port 1/3/1 or 1/3/4 in module 3, is always the first sequential port in a trunk.

ICX 7750 trunk formation during interactive-setup

Stack interactive-setup can discover links between existing units and enlarge stacking trunks. It can detect new links between two end units and change the topology from a chain to a ring. You cannot select partial links. Stack interactive-setup allows only an all-or-none selection.

The following stack interactive-setup example shows the creation of two stacking trunks for a three-unit ICX 7750 stack. One of the new trunks creates a new connection between units 2 and 3, resulting in the formation of a stacking ring.

FIGURE 46 ICX 7850-32Q stacking ports

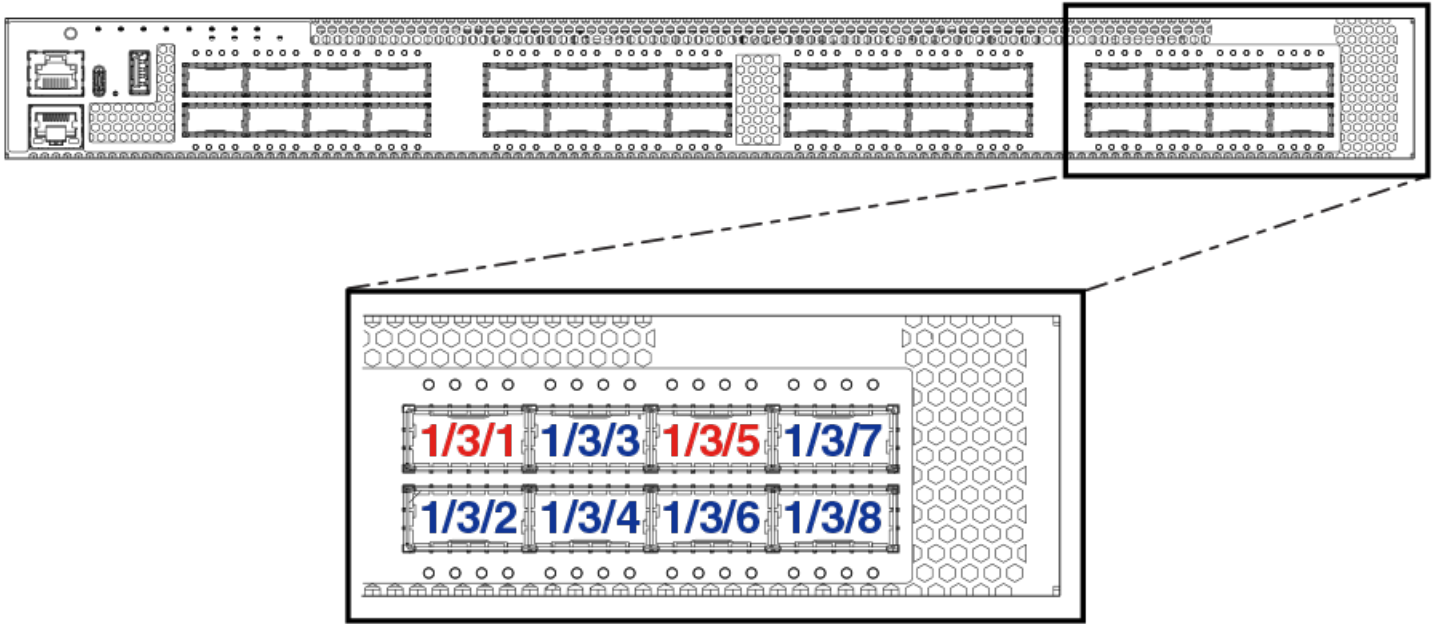
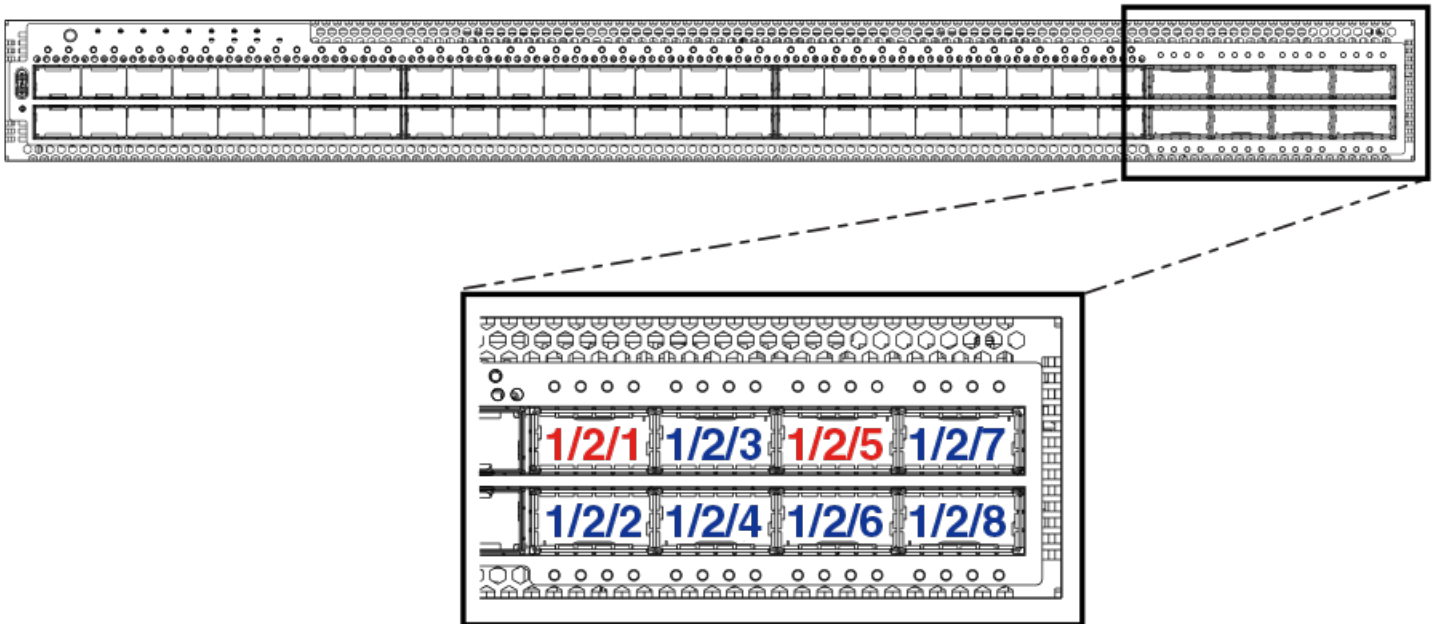
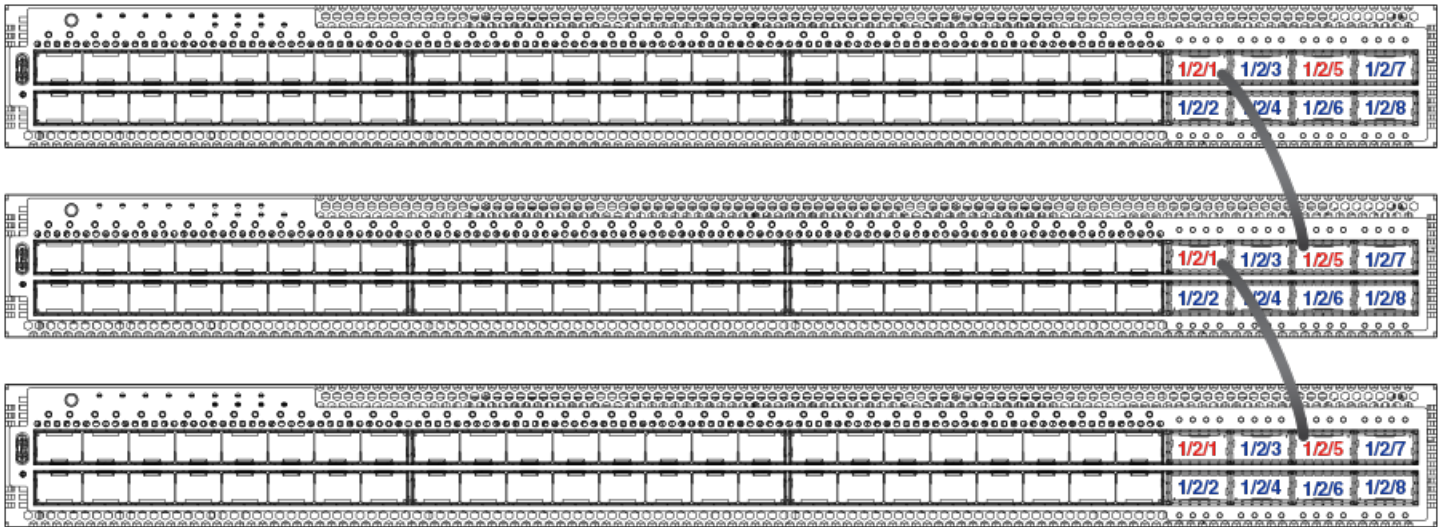


FIGURE 47 ICX 7850-48F/48FS stacking ports



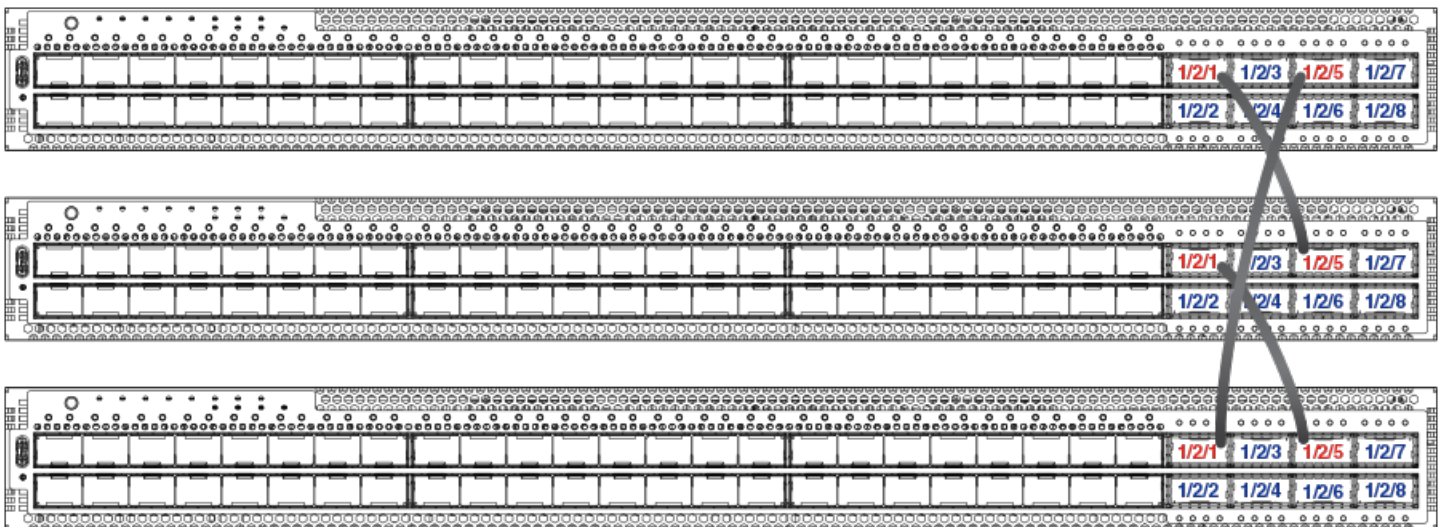

FIGURE 48 ICX 7850-48F/48FS linear topology



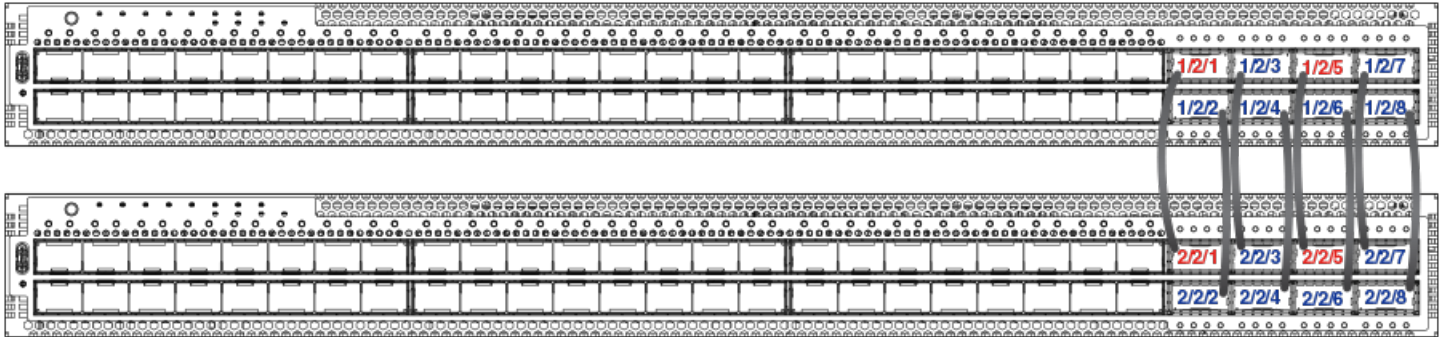

Furthermore, when an ICX 7850 stacking module is not configured for stacking, its stacking ports can be used as data ports.

- It is allowable (but not advised) to have a 100-Gbps trunk or port in one direction and a 40-Gbps trunk or port in another direction.
- Ruckus recommends that you keep the same stacking link bandwidth across the stack.
- Ruckus recommends that all ports in the same stacking trunk be the same speed. When ports with different speeds are in the same trunk, a warning message is displayed in the output of the **show stack** command as shown in the following example.

Hitless Stacking

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Hitless stacking overview

Hitless stacking is supported on FastIron units in a stack. It is a High Availability feature set that ensures little or no loss of data traffic during the following events:

- Active controller failure or role change
- Software failure
- Addition or removal of units in a stack
- Removal or disconnection of the stacking cable between the active controller and the standby controller

During such events, the standby controller takes over the active role, and the system continues to forward traffic seamlessly, as if no failure or topology change has occurred. In software releases that do not support hitless stacking, events such as these could cause most of the units in a stack to reset, affecting data traffic.

FastIron stackable units support the following hitless stacking features:

Hitless stacking switchover - A manually-controlled (CLI-driven) or automatic switchover of the active controller and standby controller without reloading the stack and without any packet loss to the services and protocols that are supported by hitless stacking. A switchover is activated by the CLI command **stack switch-over** command. A switchover may also be activated by the **priority** command, depending on the configured priority value.

Hitless stacking failover - An automatic, forced switchover of the active controller and standby controller because of a failure or abnormal termination of the active controller. During a failover, the active controller abruptly leaves the stack, and the standby controller immediately assumes the active role. As with a switchover, a failover occurs without the stack being reloaded. Unlike a switchover, a failover generally occurs without warning and is likely to result in packet loss for up to a few seconds (packets traversing the stacking link may be lost).

Hitless stacking failover is enabled by default beginning with FastIron release 08.0.20.

Hitless stacking behavior

Hitless stacking is enabled by default for FastIron release 08.0.20 and later releases. In previous releases, the **hitless-failover** command must be set to **enable** in the configuration.

Hitless Stacking

Hitless stacking behavior

If you install a FastIron 08.0.20 or later image on a new system with no previous configuration, the **hitless-failover** command is enabled by default.

If you upgrade to FastIron release 08.0.20 or later from a previous version that has **hitless-failover** enabled, hitless-failover is retained as the default.

If you upgrade to FastIron release 08.0.20 or later on a system with an earlier release that does not have **hitless-failover** enabled in its configuration, the previous configuration is retained.

Hitless stacking can be disabled using the **no hitless-failover enable** command. When hitless failover is disabled, the following limitations are in effect:

- If a failover occurs, every unit in the stack reloads.
- Manual switchover is not allowed. If the **stack switch-over** command is entered, the following message appears on the console:

```
Switch-over is not allowed. Reason: hitless-failover not configured.
```

- Internal switchover resulting from a priority change is blocked until the entire stack is reloaded or hitless stacking is enabled. A priority change triggers an election, but the newly elected winner does not immediately assume its role.
- During a stack merge, the active controller with the highest priority wins the election and reloads every unit of the losing stack.

NOTE

Synchronization between the active controller, standby controller, and stack members occurs whether or not hitless stacking is enabled.

If hitless stacking has been disabled, enable hitless stacking failover as described in "Enabling hitless stacking failover." As soon as hitless stacking is enabled, the following behavior takes effect immediately:

- If a failover occurs, the stack does not reload.
- Manual switchover (CLI command **stack switch-over**) is allowed.
- If a priority change occurred while hitless stacking was disabled and the configured priority value requires a switchover, the system starts a 60-second timer before performing a switchover. After the switchover, the highest priority standby controller becomes the active controller.
- During a stack merge, the active controller with the larger number of units wins the election and reloads every unit of the losing stack.
- If two stacks have the same number of units, the active controller election criteria are based, in order, on priority, system up time, ID, and finally the MAC address.
- If two stacks have the same number of units and the same priority, then the stack with the longest system up time (by 30 seconds or more) wins the election. Otherwise, the smallest ID is compared next, followed by MAC address. If the losing active controller has the highest priority, it becomes the standby controller after reloading and relearning the protocols. It becomes the active controller after an internal switchover.

NOTE

If the active controllers of two merging stacks have different hitless stacking settings (for example, hitless stacking is enabled in one stack and disabled in the other), the winning controller retains its hitless stacking setting and runtime configuration for the merged stack.

You can use the **show stack** command to check whether hitless stacking is enabled.

- If **hitless-failover enable** is configured, the following is displayed:

```
Standby u2 - protocols ready, can failover or manually switch over
```

- If **hitless-failover enable** is not configured, the following is displayed:

```
Standby u2 - No hitless failover. Reason: hitless-failover not configured
```

NOTE

Whether or not hitless-failover is enabled, if the entire stack reloads, and the active controller does not come up, the bootup standby takes over in four minutes or longer, depending on the size of the startup-config file, to allow the active controller sufficient time to process a very large startup-config file during bootup. The bootup standby takes over by reloading every unit including itself. A bootup standby is the device that was the standby controller before the reload. It may not be the current standby controller.

Supported hitless stacking events

The following events are supported by hitless stacking:

- Failover
- Switchover
- Priority change
- Role change

Non-supported hitless stacking events

The following events are not supported by hitless stacking. These events require a software reload, affecting data traffic.

- Unit ID change - When a stack is formed or when a unit is renumbered using stack interactive-setup.
- Stack merge - When the old active controller comes back up, it reboots. If it has fewer members than the present active controller, it loses the election, regardless of its priority. If it has a higher priority, it becomes the standby controller after the reboot and is synchronized with the active controller. Next, a switchover occurs, and it again becomes the active controller.
- Stack upgrade - Software cannot be upgraded on stack units without impact on traffic, unless the upgrade is performed through ISSU. Refer to the *Ruckus FastIron Software Upgrade Guide* for more information.

Supported hitless stacking protocols and services

The following table highlights the impact of a hitless switchover or failover on the major functions of the system.

Hitless Stacking

Services and protocols that are not listed in the following table encounter disruptions, but resume normal operation once the new active controller is back up and running.

Hitless stacking configuration notes and feature limitations

- Layer 3 multicast traffic is supported by hitless stacking.
- After a switchover or failover, the syslog may contain invalid (non-existent) port numbers in messages such as "Interface *portnum* state up." This is because some messages from the old active controller remain in the syslog after a switchover or failover.
- Failover for devices connected to the management port is not supported. For example, if during a failover, an end station is connected to the stack through the management port of the active controller, the connection is shut down. After the failover, the management port on the new active controller will work.
- The following describes hitless stacking limitations with software-based licensing for BGP:
 - To enable BGP on a stack unit, you should have an appropriate BGP license installed on all the stack units.
 - If the active controller has a BGP license but any other unit in the stack does not have one, you cannot enable BGP on the stack unit.
 - If the active controller is not running BGP, a stack unit is operational regardless of whether the active controller or stack units have a BGP license.
 - If the active controller is running BGP and a unit without a BGP license joins the stack, the unit is put into a non-operational state. However, if the user installs a valid BGP license to a non-operational unit, the unit immediately becomes operational. If the user disables BGP instead, the active controller returns the non-operational units to operation.

What happens during a hitless stacking switchover or failover

This section describes the internal events that enable a controlled or forced switchover to take place in a hitless manner as well as the events that occur during the switchover.

Real-time synchronization among all units in a stack

Hitless stacking requires the active controller, standby controller, and stack members to be fully synchronized at all times. This is accomplished by baseline and dynamic synchronization of all units in a stack.

When a stack is first booted and becomes operational, baseline synchronization occurs across all of the units in the stack. The active controller copies the current state of its CPU to all units of the stack, including the standby controller. The information received from the active controller is programmed locally in the hardware on all units. The information includes:

- Startup and runtime configuration (CLI) - These files are copied to the standby controller only.
- Layer 2 protocols - Layer 2 protocols such as STP, RSTP, MRP, and VSRP run concurrently on both the active controller and standby controller.
- Hardware Abstraction Layer (HAL) - This includes the prefix-based routing table, next hop information for outgoing interfaces, and tunnel information.
- Layer 3 IP forwarding information - This includes the routing table, IP cache table, and ARP table as well as static and connected routes. Layer 3 routing protocols are not copied to any of the units in the stack but remain in standby state on the standby controller until a switchover occurs. Peer adjacency is restored after a switchover. If BGP4 or OSPF graceful restart is enabled during a switchover, the standby controller (new active controller) initiates a graceful restart,

and a new set of routes is relearned. The new set of routes will be the same as the old routes, unless the network has changed.

- OSPFv2 and OSPFv3 non-stop routing support - For more information, refer to the *Ruckus FastIron Layer 3 Routing Configuration Guide*.

When control protocols are synchronized and protocol synchronization timers have expired, the standby controller is placed in hot-standby mode, ready to take over as the active controller. If a switchover occurs, the standby controller takes over without interrupting data traffic.

After baseline synchronization, any new events that occur on the active controller are dynamically synchronized on the standby controller. Such events include:

- CLI, HTTP, and SNMP configurations
- Link events
- Interrupts
- Layer 2 and Layer 3 forwarding table updates
- Dynamic user authentication updates such as 802.1X or multi-device port authentication

After a switchover, the new active controller receives updates from the stack members and sends verification information to the stack members to ensure that they are synchronized.

NOTE

The events described previously occur internally and do not create or affect the external network topology.

Standby controller role in hitless stacking

In software releases that do not support hitless stacking, the standby controller functions as a dummy device, meaning it provides limited access to CLI commands such as **show**, **stack**, and a few **debug** commands. The active controller can access the full range of the CLI. The standby controller synchronizes its configuration with the active controller at each reset.

With the introduction of hitless stacking, the standby controller shadows the active controller. The role or behavior of the standby controller with hitless stacking is as follows:

- The local console on the standby controller still accepts only **show**, **stack**, and a few **debug** commands.
- The runtime configuration on the standby controller is synchronized with the active controller whenever there is a configuration change.
- Protocols are configured in the runtime configuration, but no protocol packets are sent out on the standby controller.
- The state of every unit is known, including the state of the active controller. The **show** commands display current information such as STP or port states.
- When a failover occurs, the standby controller uses its current runtime configuration. The configuration could be different from the active controller if the last configuration transmission was lost.
- After a failover, the new active controller (the old standby controller) programs all other units in hardware, based on its runtime configuration.

Standby controller election

Candidates for standby controller must meet the following criteria:

- The unit is operational, and the image and module configuration match those of the active controller.

Hitless Stacking

Support during stack formation, stack merge, and stack split

- The runtime configuration matches that of the active controller.

If more than one unit in the stack meets these criteria, the standby controller is chosen according to the following criteria, in the order shown:

- Priority - The unit with the highest priority value.
- Current standby - The unit that is currently the standby controller.
- Bootstrap master - The unit that was the active controller before the stack was reloaded.
- Bootstrap standby - The unit that was the standby controller before the stack was reloaded.

Once the standby controller is identified, the following internal events take place.

1. The standby controller is assigned by the active controller 30 to 60 seconds after election (60 seconds if the active controller boots up in less than 120 seconds).
2. The standby controller receives and processes the runtime configuration sent by the active controller.
3. The standby controller learns the protocols within 70 seconds.

When the standby controller is fully synchronized, the system is ready for a switchover or failover.

Runtime configuration mismatch

In some cases, such as a runtime configuration mismatch between the active controller and candidate standby controller, the standby controller cannot be assigned by the active controller unless the candidate standby controller is reloaded.

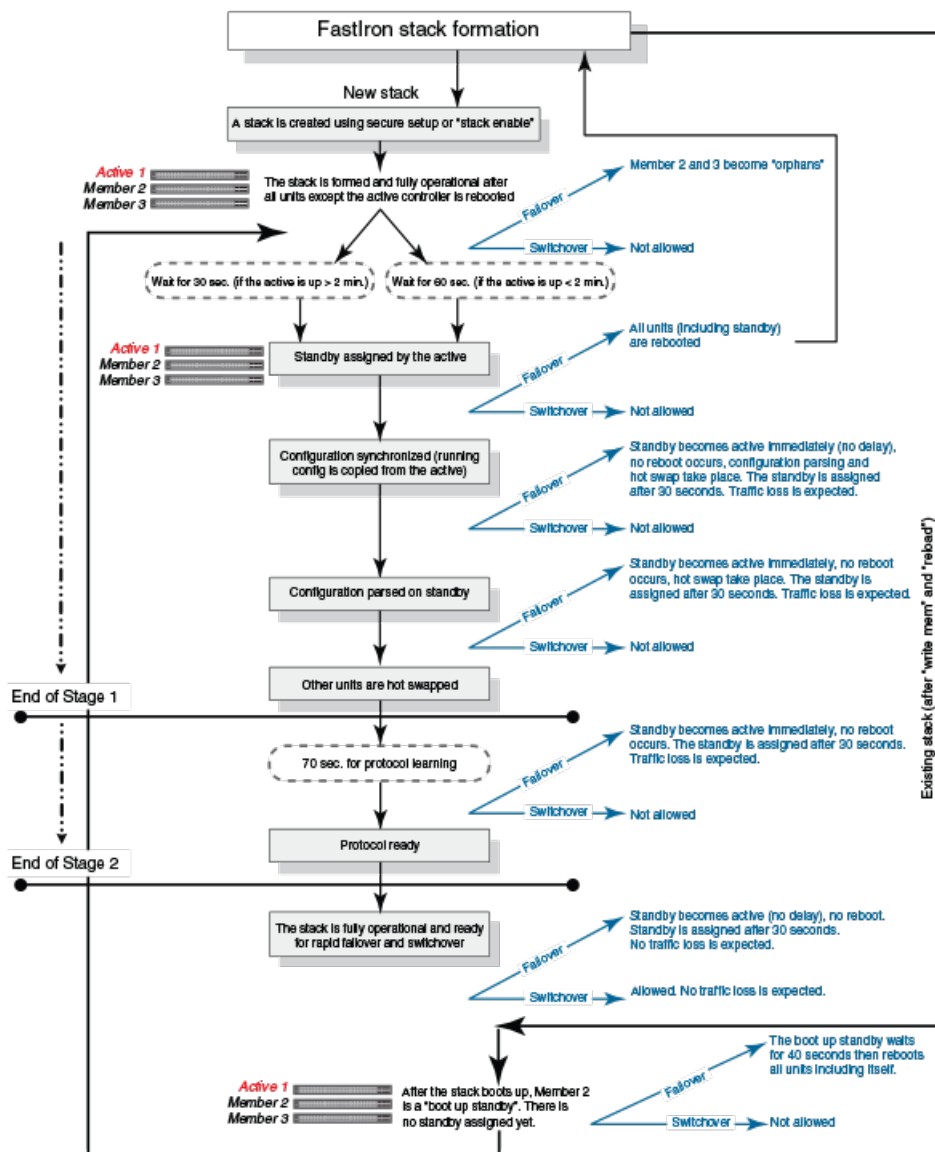

FIGURE 51 Hitless stacking support during stack formation

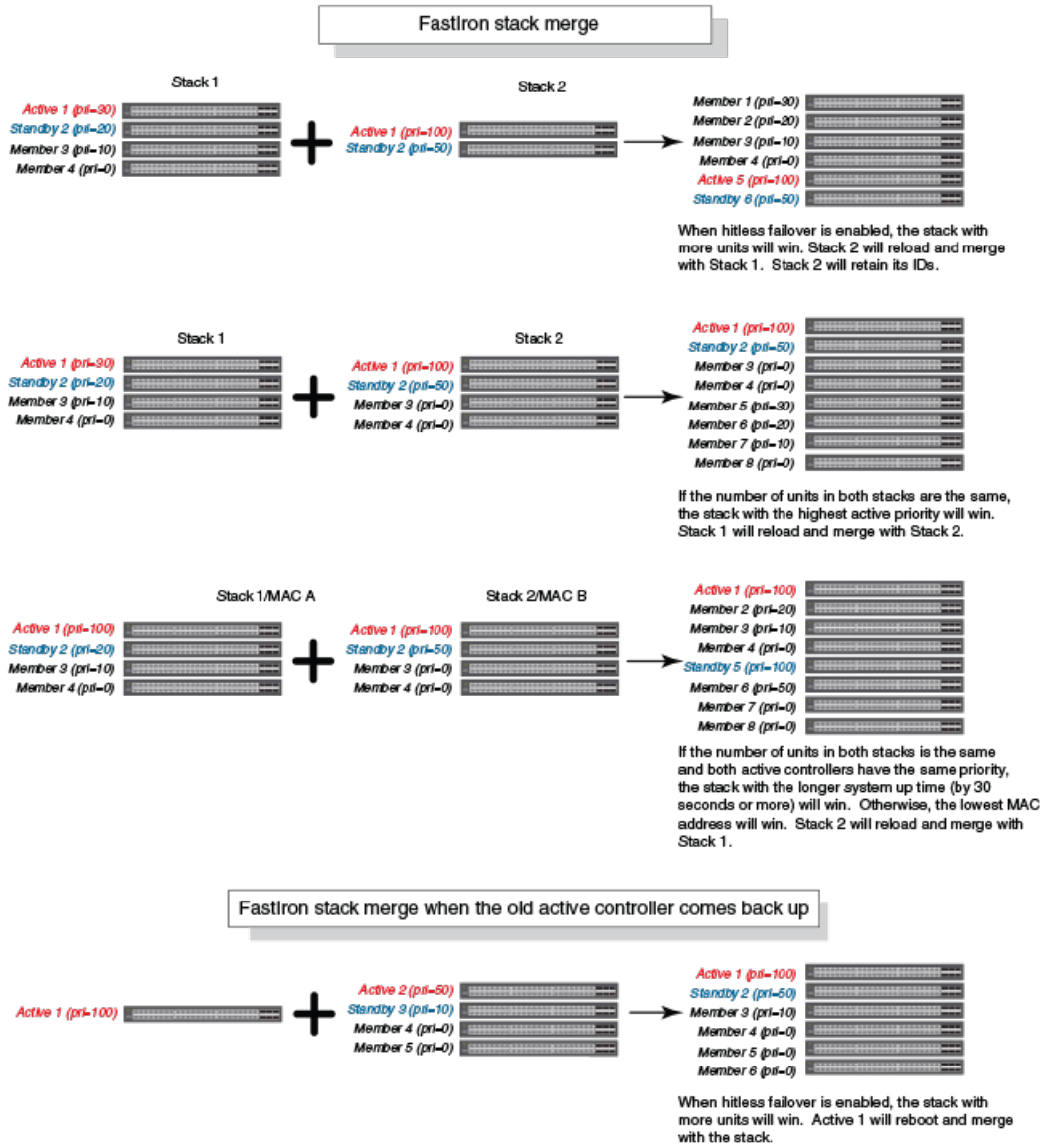

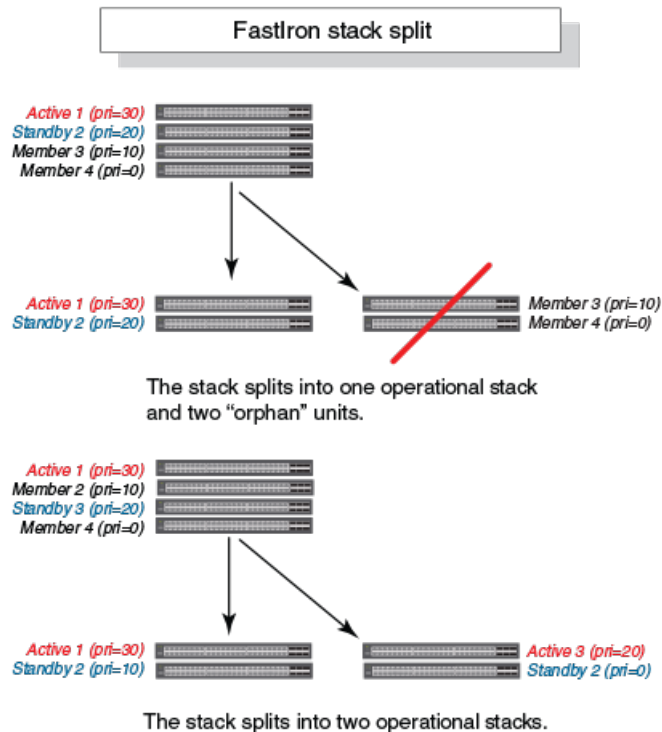

Hitless stacking failover

Hitless stacking failover provides automatic failover from the active controller to the standby controller without resetting any of the units in the stack and with little or no packet loss to hitless stacking-supported services and protocols.

Enabling hitless stacking failover

NOTE

Hitless stacking failover is enabled by default in FastIron release 08.0.20 and later releases.

To enable hitless stacking failover, enter the following command at the global CONFIG level of the CLI:

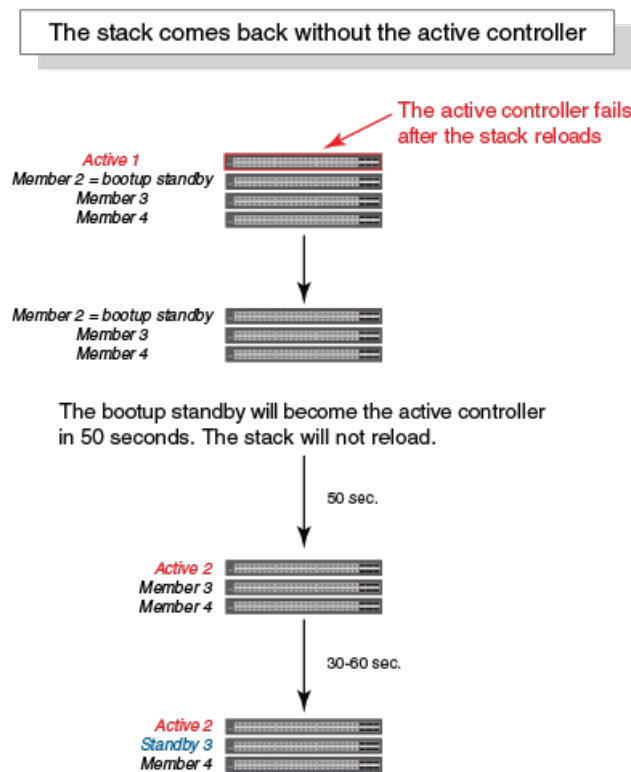
The command takes effect immediately. Hitless switchover is allowed, and in the event of a failover, the standby controller takes over the active role without reloading the stack.

Hitless stacking switchover

Hitless stacking switchover is a manually-controlled (CLI-driven) or automatic switchover of the active controller and standby controller without reloading the stack and without any packet loss to the services and protocols that are supported by hitless stacking. A switchover is activated by the **stack switch-over** CLI command. A switchover may also be activated by the **priority** command, depending on the configured priority value.

By default, hitless switchover is allowed on systems with FastIron release 08.0.20 or later installed, as long as hitless failover is configured, and the priority of the two controllers is the same. Hitless switchover behavior is described in [Hitless stacking behavior](#) on page 171.

Hitless switchover can be used by a system administrator to perform maintenance on a controller that has been functioning as the active controller.

Executing a hitless stacking switchover

The following must be in effect before a hitless switchover (to the standby controller) is allowed:

- Hitless stacking is enabled.
- The stack has a standby controller.
- The standby controller has learned the protocols.
- The standby controller has the same priority as the active controller.
- More than 120 seconds have passed since the previous switchover or failover.

You can use the **show stack** command to check these criteria.

To perform a switchover, enter the following command.

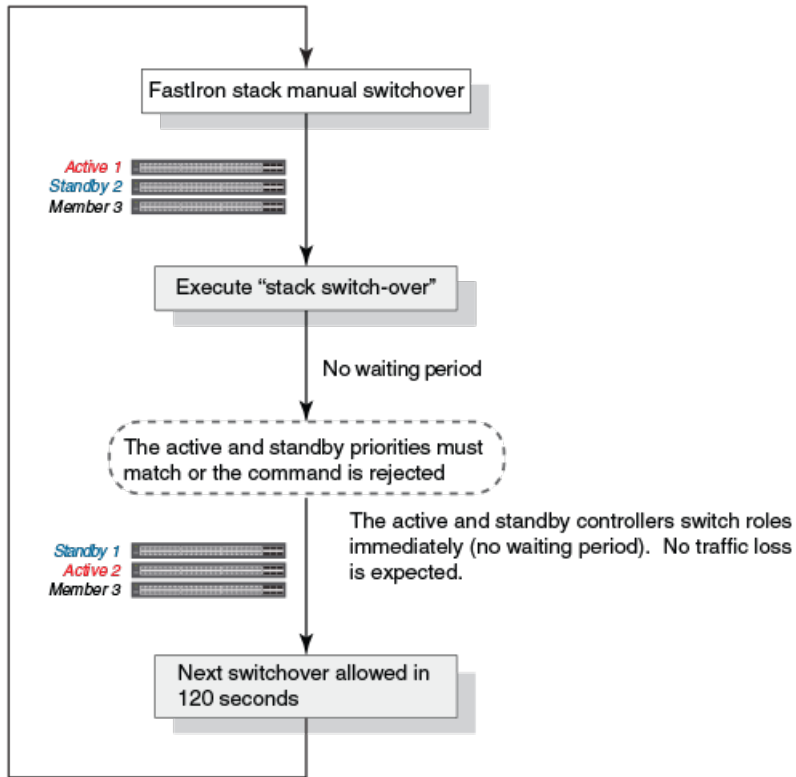

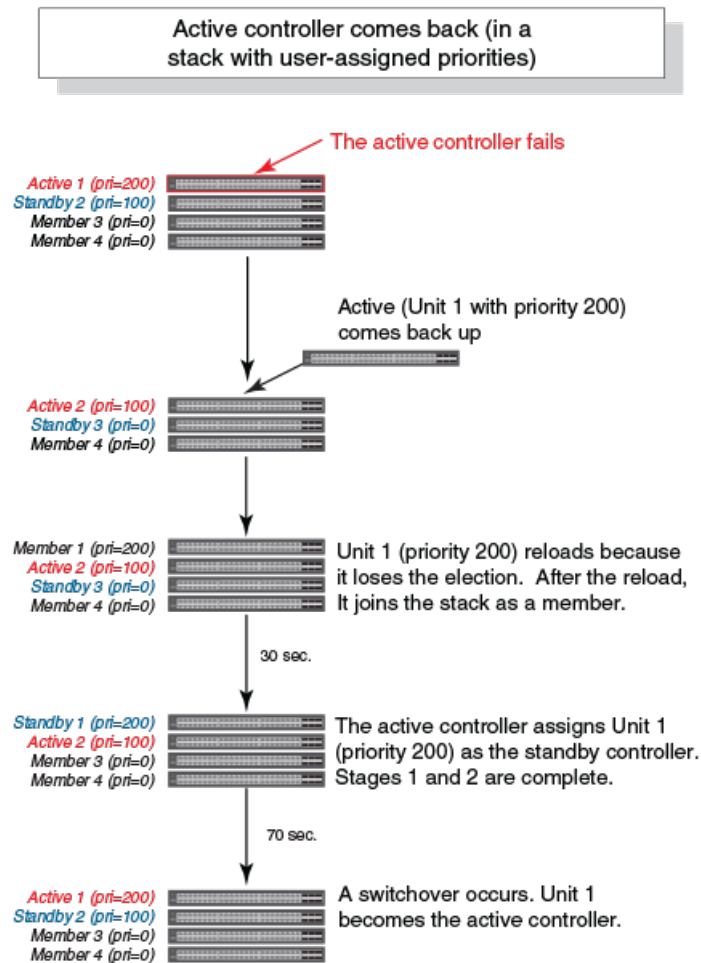

FIGURE 55 Manual switchover



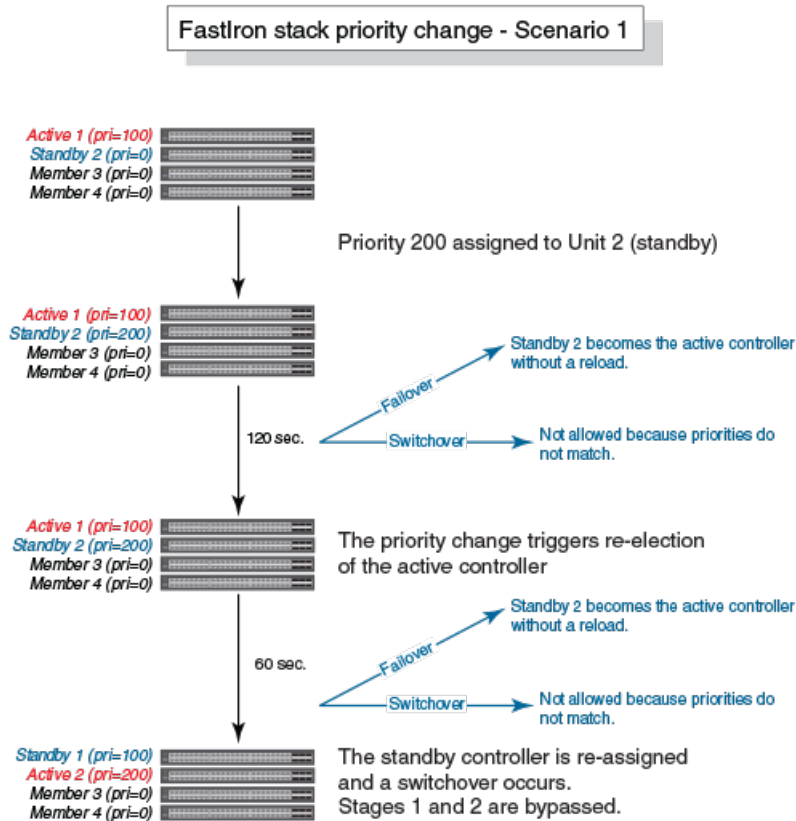
The following figure illustrates a hitless stacking switchover when the active controller goes down and then comes back up. The stack in this example has user-configured priorities.

FIGURE 56 Hitless stacking switchover when the active controller comes back up



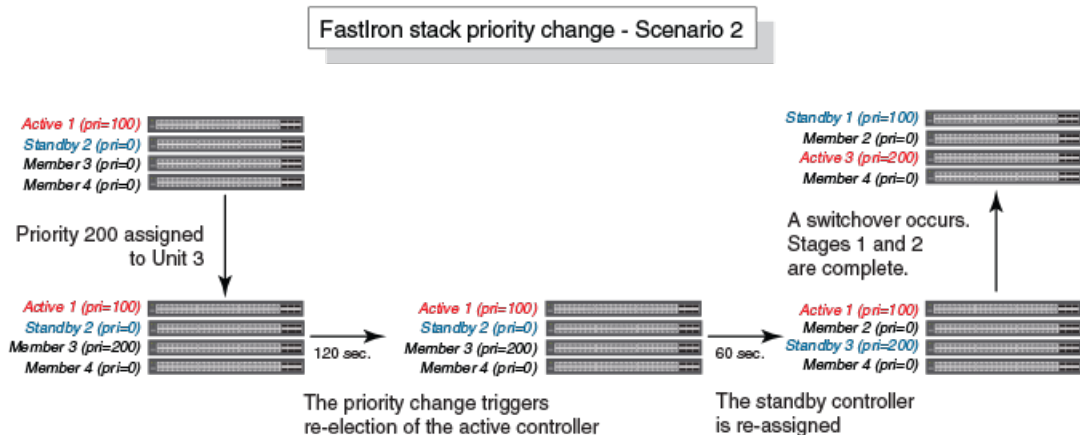
The following figure illustrates a hitless stacking switchover after the network administrator increases the priority value of the standby controller.

FIGURE 57 Scenario 1 - Hitless stacking switchover after a priority change



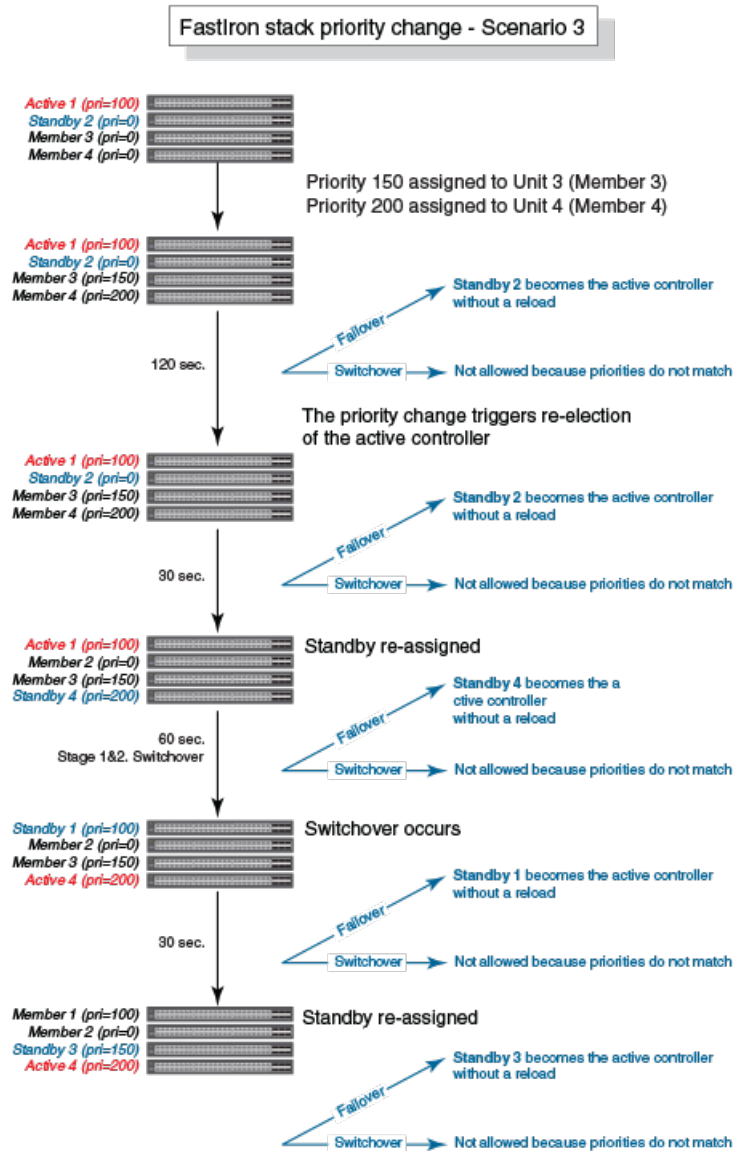
The following figure illustrates a hitless stacking switchover after the network administrator increases the priority value of one of the stack members.

Displaying pending device roles

When hitless stacking is disabled, a priority change triggers an election, but the newly-elected winner does not assume its role until the entire stack is reloaded or hitless stacking is enabled. You can use the **show stack** command to view pending device roles. The “Role” column displays the current role for each unit. The “Comment” column displays the role that will take effect after a reload or when hitless stacking is enabled.

Stack Management

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Managing a stack through one IP address

A Ruckus stack can be managed through a single IP address. You can manage the stack using this IP address even if you remove the active controller or any member from the stack. You can also connect to the active controller through Telnet or SSH using this address. All management functions, such as SNMP, use this IP address to acquire MIB information and other management data.

Enabling or disabling stacking mode

When a unit is stack-enabled or joins a stack either actively or passively, it reserves priority queue 7 for stacking traffic control, assigns buffers for the stacking ports, and configures the first two 10-Gbps ports as stacking ports.

NOTE

Designated stacking ports cannot contain any configuration information, such as VLAN membership. If configuration information exists, **stack enable** will fail. You must remove all configuration information from the port and re-issue the **stack enable** command.

To enable stacking mode on a new unit before you add it to the stack, enter the following command.

```
device# configure terminal
device(config)# stack enable
Enable stacking. This unit actively participates in stacking
```

To see the configuration of the stack at any time, enter the **show running-config** command. Refer to [Displaying running configuration information](#) on page 220 for details.

Disabling stacking mode

To remove stacking capability, enter the **no stack enable** command. This prevents the unit from actively sending out probe messages; however, the unit could still be called to join a stack by an active controller. To prevent this, enter the **stack disable** command in device configuration mode.

The **stack disable** command prevents a unit from sending or listening for any stacking probe messages. In this mode, the unit cannot be forced to join a stack.

```
device# configure terminal
device(config)# stack disable
```

To restore the capability of the device to send and receive stacking probe messages, enter the **no stack disable** command in device configuration mode.

Controlling the stack through the CLI

A Ruckus stack can be configured and managed using the command line interface (CLI). You can access the stack and the command CLI in two ways:

- Through a direct serial connection to the console port
- Through a local or remote Telnet session using the stack IP address

You can initiate a local Telnet or SNMP connection by attaching a cable to a port and specifying the assigned management station IP address.

The stacking commands in the CLI are organized into the following levels:

- **Global** - Commands issued in global mode are applied to the entire stack.
- **Configuration mode** - In this mode, you can make configuration changes to the entire stack. To save changes across reloads, you must save them to the active controller startup-config file. The configuration mode contains sub-levels for individual units and ports, VLANs, routing protocols, and other configuration areas.
- **Stack unit configuration mode** - Commands issued in this mode apply to the specified stack unit. Configuration information resides in the active controller.

NOTE

By default, any user who can open a serial or Telnet connection to the stack can access all of these CLI levels. To secure access, you can enable passwords or local user accounts, or you can configure the active controller to use a RADIUS or TACACS/TACACS+ server for authentication. Refer to the *Ruckus FastIron Security Configuration Guide* for more information.

Logging in through the console port

When a device becomes a stack member, it establishes a remote connection to a virtual console port on the active controller. Input and output are relayed between the physical console port on the stack member and the virtual console port on the active controller. Because each stack member connects to an independent virtual console port on the active controller, the console ports on multiple stack units may be used simultaneously.

When a stack unit establishes communication with the active controller, it also establishes a remote console session to the active controller. In a normally functioning stack, a console cable may be connected to any of the stack units and provide access to the same commands on the active controller.

To establish a remote console session on a stack unit, enter the **rconsole** command followed by the stack unit ID as shown in the following example.

```
device# rconsole 1
```

You can terminate a session between stack members in any of these ways:

- Enter the **logout** command at any level.
- Enter the **exit** command from the User EXEC level.

NOTE

For **rconsole** connections from stack units to the active controller, the escape sequence and other methods of terminating the session are not available.

NOTE

Error messages that are generated during a reload of the active controller do not appear on **rconsole** connections from stack units to the active controller. To see these error messages, you must connect a console cable to the active controller itself.

The following example shows how to establish a remote console session to a stack member and obtain status information. Notice that the **show stack** command on the stack member displays different information from what is shown when the **show stack** command is entered on the active controller.

A remote console session is established with stack unit 2 in the following example.

device# rconsole 2

NOTE

You can also use the **rconsole** command followed by the PE ID from a CB unit to reach a PE unit.

CLI command syntax for stack units

CLI syntax that refers to stack units must contain all of the following parameters:

- *stack-unit* - If the device is operating as a standalone, the stack-unit is 1. Stack unit IDs can be any number from 1 through 12.
- *slotnum* - This refers to a specific group of ports on each device.
- *portnum* - This must be a valid port number.

Stack unit identification

Stack units are identified by numbers 1 through 12. You can display stack unit IDs by entering the **show stack** command.

A new device (one that has not been connected in a stack or that has not been manually assigned a stack unit number) ships with a default number of 1. Once you enable stacking and the unit becomes part of a stack, its default stack unit number changes to the lowest available number in the stack. You can configure the **stack suggested-id** command in a standalone unit before it joins a stack to assign this unit the suggested ID.

Stack units must each have a unique identification number. Every stack member, including any standalone units, retains its stack unit number unless that number is already being used in the stack, or until you manually renumber the unit using stack interactive-setup. For more information about how to renumber stack IDs using stack interactive-setup, refer to [Changing stack unit IDs with stack interactive-setup](#) on page 75.

Naming a stack unit

You can assign names to stack units to help identify them. Stack unit names can be up to 63 characters long. A stack unit name must start with an alpha character and must not contain spaces.

Perform these steps to assign a name to one or more stack members.

1. Enter global configuration mode.

```
device# configure terminal
```

2. Enter the **stack unit** command followed by the number of the stack unit you want to name.

```
device(config)# stack unit 1
```

The device enters stack unit configuration mode.

3. Enter the **unit-name** command followed by the name that you want to represent the unit in configuration output.

```
device(config-unit-1)# unit-name operations
```

The example assigns the name operations to stack unit 1.

4. (Optional) Repeat steps 3 and 4. You can repeat this step as many times as needed.

```
device(config-unit-1)# stack unit 2  
device(config-unit-2)# unit-name engineering

The example enters stack unit configuration mode for unit 2 and assigns the name engineering to the unit.

5. When you are finished naming units, enter the **write memory** command in Privileged Exec mode to save the configuration.

Stack management MAC address

The stack is identified in the network by a single MAC address, usually the MAC address of the active controller (the default). If a new active controller is elected, the MAC address of the new active controller (by default) becomes the MAC address for the entire stack. However, you can manually configure your stack to use a specified MAC address.

In a stack, the management MAC address is generated by the software and is always the MAC address of the first port of the active controller. This ensures that the management MAC address remains consistent across stack reboots and helps prevent frequent topology changes that result from protocol enable, disable, and configuration changes.

When you are configuring Layer 2 protocols, such as STP, RSTP, and MSTP, on stack units, the management MAC address of the active controller acts as the Bridge ID.

Manually allocating the stack MAC address

When a stack is enabled, “hitless-failover enable” configuration is added, and a default stack MAC address is assigned if none is configured. The address assigned is the MAC address of the unit as shown in the output of the **show stack** command.

The MAC address is a hexadecimal number in the format xxxx.xxxx.xxxx.

If necessary, you can manually configure the stack to use a specific MAC address.

NOTE

The **stack mac** command may be useful for administrative purposes; however, it should be used with caution to prevent duplication of MAC addresses.

To configure a stack MAC address manually, enter the following command in device configuration mode.

```
device# configure terminal
device(config)# stack mac 0000.0000.0011
```

NOTE

Enter the **no** form of the **stack mac** command to revert to the use of the active controllers' MAC address.

The following example shows the stack MAC address being configured manually as confirmed in the **show running-config** command output.

Stack device roles and elections

There are three distinct roles played by units that are part of a stack:

- Active controller
- Standby controller
- Stack member

Active controller

The active controller contains the saved and running configuration files for each stack member. The configuration files include the system-level settings for the stack and the interface-level settings for each stack member, as well as MIB counters and port status. The standby controller also has a synchronized copy of the active controller startup-config file in case the active controller fails.

When a stack is formed, the console function for each stack member is automatically redirected to the active controller console. The active controller console port handles all stack management functions, as well as ping activity, Telnet sessions, and TFTP image downloads for every stack member. If you connect to the console port on a stack member that is not the active controller, you are automatically directed through the console of the active controller.

The active controller synchronizes its startup configuration with the standby controller and the rest of the stack members. You can recover the previous flash configuration of the standby controller and the stack members by issuing the **stack unconfigure** command. For an example of this command and the output generated, refer to [Unconfiguring a stack](#) on page 217.

The active controller may reset the rest of the stack members, if necessary. However, if the active controller itself must be reset because configuration has changed or new images have loaded, you must use the **reload** command..

Standby controller

In addition to the active controller, another stack member is elected as the standby controller. If the active controller fails, the standby controller takes over based on the following criteria:

1. If hitless-failover enable is not configured, the standby reloads all units, including itself. It reloads to become the active controller.
2. If hitless-failover enable is configured, the standby immediately takes over the active controller role without reloading any unit.
3. If the entire stack reloads and the active controller does not come up, the standby waits for four minutes to take over by reloading every unit, including itself.

The standby controller synchronizes its configuration with the active controller at each reset.

Bootup role

When a stack unit boots, it boots in a particular role, active controller, standby controller, or stack member, or as a standalone device. When the bootup role is standby controller or stack member, the CLI available to the unit is limited to **show** and **stack** commands. A unit in the role of standby controller or stack member does not act without instructions from the active controller.

The last line of the **show version** output identifies the unit role unless the unit is in standalone mode.

```
My stack unit ID = 1, bootup role = active
My stack unit ID = 3, bootup role = standby
```

NOTE

To convert a standby controller or stack member to a standalone device, use the **stack unconfigure me** command (refer to [Unconfiguring a stack](#) on page 217).

Active controller and standby controller elections

Whenever there is a topology change in the stack (a reset occurs, a unit fails, a stacking port changes state, or members are added or removed), elections are held to determine the status of the active controller and standby controller. The results of the election take effect after the next stack reset.

Certain conditions, in a particular order, determine which units serve as active controller and standby controller after an election. The hierarchy of factors achieves a predictable winner, regardless of the boot up sequence for a unit.

Active and standby controller elections are determined in a slightly different way when hitless failover (the default) is enabled. The order reduces traffic interruptions during unit reset.

- **Boot as active controller** - Indicates that a unit was previously active controller before the current boot sequence and will again assume the role of active controller when two standalone units are combined into a stack. When a third standalone unit joins the stack, the current active controller becomes subject to the other factors in this list. You can upgrade your current active controller to "boot as active controller" status by executing the **write memory** command. The system interprets the **write memory** action as a directive to maintain the current active controller role regardless of resets or a new unit joining the stack.
- **Greater number of members** - The unit that has control over the greater number of stack members.
- **Failover unit** - In a two-unit stack, the unit that is active controller after a failover and has an up time of more than 10 minutes, when the second unit has an up time of less than three minutes.
- **Priority** - The unit with the highest priority value.

- Longer up time - The unit with the longest up time if the up time is at least 30 seconds longer than for any other unit. When up times are compared, there is no effect if the difference is less than 30 seconds.
- Lowest boot stack ID - The unit that has the lowest boot stack ID. Unit ID 1 is the lowest. The unit ID may be 1 through 12.
- MAC address - The member with the lowest MAC address.

When hitless failover is disabled, the following factors, in the order shown, are used to determine active and standby controllers.

- Boot as active controller - Indicates that a unit was previously active controller before the current boot sequence and will again assume the role of active controller when two standalone units are combined into a stack. When a third standalone unit joins the stack, the current active controller becomes subject to the other factors in this list. You can upgrade your current active controller to "boot as active controller" status by executing the **write memory** command. The system interprets the **write memory** action as a directive to maintain the current active controller role regardless of resets or a new unit joining the stack.
- Priority - The unit with the highest priority value.
- Greater number of members - The unit that has control over the greater number of stack members.
- Longer up time - An up time that is more than 30 seconds longer than the next one in size is considered. Where up times are compared, there is no effect if the difference is less than 30 seconds.
- Lowest boot stack ID - The unit that has the lowest boot stack ID. Unit ID 1 is the lowest. The unit ID may be 1 through 12.
- MAC address - The member with the lowest MAC address.

Active controller and standby controller resets

If hitless stacking failover is enabled, when an active controller is reset or removed from the stack, the standby controller takes over immediately.

NOTE

Hitless stacking failover is enabled by default.

The stack behaves differently when a failover occurs depending on whether `hitless-failover enable` is configured. If it is not configured and the active controller is reset or removed from the stack, the standby reloads the entire stack. The standby reloads to become the active controller. If `hitless-failover enable` is configured, the standby takes over immediately without reloading any unit.

If both the active and the standby controllers are removed, the rest of the stack continues to function because the other stack members are operating on whatever is programmed in the hardware. However, the stack members are not able to learn any new addresses. In this case, the following message is displayed every few minutes.

```
Stack member is non-operational because of no Active or standby controller  
You can recover to standalone mode by "stack unconfigure me"
```

Use the **stack unconfigure me** command to restore the units as standalone devices with a pre-stacking configuration.

Standby controller selection based on priority configuration

You can choose a standby controller by configuring a stack unit with the second highest priority or with the same priority as the active controller. The standby controller takes over when the active controller fails. If the original active controller becomes active again, it does not win back its active role, which helps to minimize traffic interruption on the stack. However, if the original active controller has the higher priority and hitless failover is enabled, the active controller regains its role without resetting other stack units. If hitless failover is disabled, the active controller resets the other stack units after it regains control.

Two-unit stack controller selection scenario

In a two-unit stack, you can ensure that one unit resumes the active controller role after a reset by assigning it a higher priority. However, assigning the two units the same priority reduces the number of resets during failover.

The following steps occur on failover when hitless failover is enabled and both members of a two-unit stack are configured with the same priority:

1. Unit 1 (the active controller) resets.
2. The stack fails over to the standby controller (Unit 2).
3. Unit 1 returns to operation with the role of stack member.
4. Unit 2 (now acting as controller) sends a stack merge request to Unit 1.
5. Unit 1 resets and rejoins the stack as the standby controller.

If the active controller has a higher priority than the standby controller in a two-unit stack, the following steps occur:

1. Unit 1 (the active controller) resets.
2. The stack fails over to the standby controller (Unit 2).
3. Unit 1 returns to operation.
4. Unit 2 (now acting as controller) sends a stack merge request to Unit 1.
5. Unit 1 resets and rejoins the stack as the standby controller.
6. Unit 2 schedules a switchover to make Unit 1 the active controller. No unit is reset for the switchover.

Standby controller election criteria

Standby controller election is based on the following criteria:

- The highest priority
- Bootup as active controller
- Bootup as standby controller
- The lowest boot stack ID
- The lowest MAC address.

Stack unit priority

A unit with a higher priority is more likely to be elected active controller. The priority value can be from 0 through 255, with a priority of 255 being the highest. The default priority value assigned to the active controller and standby controller is 128.

You can assign the highest priority value to the stack unit you want to function as the active controller. When you enter a new priority value for a stack unit, that value takes effect immediately but does not affect the current active controller until the next reset. However, with hitless stacking failover enabled, the stack unit with the highest priority will become the active controller in about five minutes.

NOTE

Hitless stacking failover is enabled by default.

You can give your active controller and standby controllers the same priority or different priorities (active controller highest, standby controller second-highest). If the active controller and standby controller have the same priority, when the active controller fails and a standby controller with more members attached takes over, the original active controller is not able to resume its role.

However, if the priority of the active controller is higher than the priority of the standby controller, and if hitless stacking failover is disabled, the old active controller will regain its role and will reset the other units. If hitless stacking failover is enabled, the old active controller (with the higher priority) will become a standby controller, and later, the system will perform an internal switchover to make the old active controller the active controller without resetting other units.

As an example, suppose both the active controller and standby controller have the same priority. If there are more than two units in a stack and the active controller leaves and comes back, it cannot win back the active role because the new active controller now has more members, and the old active controller has none.

If hitless stacking failover is enabled (the default) and there are only two units in a stack, both the old active controller and the new active controller have no members, so the unit with the higher priority wins the active role. If the active and standby controller have the same priority, then the unit with the longer up time wins. If the old active controller stops responding or reloads, the standby controller takes over immediately. When the old active controller reloads and comes back as an active controller, there are two active controllers, which causes the stacks to merge. The old active controller loses the active controller election regardless of its priority because the new active controller is a failover unit (assuming it has an up time of more than 10 minutes and the other unit has an up time of less than three minutes, due to reset). Consequently, the old active controller is reloaded by the new active controller and boots up as a member. Then it is assigned the standby controller role. If the former active controller has a higher priority, the system triggers an internal switchover to make it the new active controller. If the former active controller has an equal priority, it remains the standby controller.

When the active controller and standby controller have the same priority, the system allows a stack switchover as long as hitless stacking failover is enabled. Hitless stacking failover allows the active controller and standby controller to switch roles without traffic interruption.

If you want to assign the same priority to the active controller and the standby controller, you must do so after the stack is formed. This prevents the intended standby controller from becoming the active controller during stack construction.

Changing the priority of a stack member triggers an election that takes effect immediately unless the active controller role changes and hitless stacking failover is disabled, in which case the member priority changes do not take effect until after the next stack reload. With hitless stacking failover, the stack unit with the highest priority becomes the active controller without reload.

To display stack member priority values, enter the **show stack** command.

```
ICX7750-48XGC# configure terminal
ICX7750-48XGC(config)# stack unit 3
ICX7750-48XGC(config-unit-3)# show stack

Changing the priority of a stack unit

To change the priority value for a stack unit, enter the **priority** command at the stack unit configuration level. The priority can be a value from 0 through 255, where 255 is the highest priority.

```
device# configure terminal
device(config)# stack unit 1
device(config-unit-1)# priority 128
```

Stack software images

Consider the notes in this section when upgrading or downgrading a stack.

Refer to the release notes and to the *Ruckus FastIron Software Upgrade Guide* for instructions about upgrading the software.

Confirming stack software versions

All units in a stack must be running the same software image. To confirm this, check the software version on all devices that you want to add to a stack. Upgrade any units that are running older versions of the software before you build the stack.

To check the software version for each stack member, perform the following steps.

1. Use Telnet or SSH or connect to any of the console ports in the stack.
2. Enter the **show version** command. Output similar to the following is displayed.

```

NOTE

If any unit in the stack is running an incorrect version of the software, it will appear as non-operational. You must install the correct software version on that unit for it to operate properly in the stack.

Stack mismatches

When a stack mismatch occurs, the active controller can put any stack member into a non-operational state, which disables all of the ports except the stacking ports. Stack mismatches can occur for a variety of reasons.

NOTE

After a stack mismatch, the active controller can still download an image to the non-operational unit.

The active controller generates a log message whenever it puts a stack unit into a non-operational state. The following examples describe the types of mismatches and the related log message:

- Advanced feature mismatch - The active controller is enabled for advanced features (such as BGP), and the stack unit is not enabled.

```
Stack: Unit 2 0000.0020.0100 doesn't have the matching advanced feature privileges
```

- Image mismatch - A stack unit is running a different software image than the active controller is running.

```
Stack: Unit 2 0000.0020.0100 image mismatch
```

- Configuration mismatch - The module configuration for a stack unit does not match the reserved configuration on the active controller.

```
Stack: Unit 2 0000.0020.0100 config mismatch
```

- Memory allocation mismatch - The active controller does not have enough memory to accommodate the stack unit.

```
Stack: Malloc failure for unit 2.0000.0020.0100
```

Advanced feature privilege mismatch

Advanced feature privileges must be enabled to run features such as BGP. For advanced features to operate across the stack, both the active controller and standby controller must be enabled for advanced features. A unit that is not enabled for these features is put into a non-operational state.

If the active controller is *not* enabled for advanced features, these features will not operate on the stack.

Minor mismatch for stack units

With a minor mismatch, an operating stack can still exist, but traffic is dropped from all ports except the stacking ports for units with the mismatched software. You can download the correct image to the mismatched devices from the active controller. A minor software mismatch means that there is no IPC or election algorithm change, but there is a release version disparity. Minor software mismatches can occur with patch release upgrades. The system logs and displays a message similar to the following.

```
Warning! put stack unit 2 to non-operational reason=image mismatch
```

The **show stack** command displays output similar to the following.

Normally, the system recovers from a minor image mismatch using the Auto Image Copy feature. However, if the feature has been disabled or if the configuration of a stack unit does not match the configuration of the active controller, the stack unit does not function. In this example, unit 2 is non-operational due to an image mismatch. To correct this situation, use the **copy flash flash** command. Refer to [Copying the flash image to a stack unit from the active controller](#) on page 207.

Major mismatch for stack units

A major mismatch indicates an Interprocessor Communications (IPC)-related data structure change, an election algorithm change, or a version of the software that does not support stacking. This can happen when the software undergoes a major change (such as a change from 08.0.80 to 08.0.90). When a major mismatch occurs, the system logs and displays a message similar to the following.

```
T=5h38m43.9: Warning! Recv 6004 IPC in 10m from 609c.9f2a.97e0 e1/2/1: wrong version 105 != 107.  
Please make sure all stack units run the same image.
```

In a major mismatch, the stack cannot be built and will not operate. You must download the correct version of the software to the mismatched units individually.

Configuration mismatch for stack units

Generally, when a stack unit is added to or removed from the stack, its static configuration is not overwritten by the active controller. However, the active controller deletes the dynamic configuration for a unit if it leaves the stack.

A configuration mismatch occurs when the base module configuration for a replacement stack unit does not match the runtime configuration on the active controller. If the configuration on the active controller is static, it cannot be overwritten by the new configuration, and a configuration mismatch occurs.

Configuration mismatches can occur during manual setup when a unit is moved from one stack to another stack or when the ID of a unit is changed by stack interactive-setup.

When you renumber identical units using stack interactive-setup, the configurations are not mapped to the new units (because they match exactly). However, if you switch the IDs of units that are not identical, a configuration mismatch occurs.

When a configuration mismatch occurs, port-related functions on all ports are disabled on the mismatched unit (except for the stacking ports). All other functions are unaffected. For example, the active controller can still copy the unit's image or reset the unit.

Recovering from a stack unit configuration mismatch

When a configuration mismatch occurs, the active controller logs and displays a configuration mismatch message and puts the mismatched unit into a non-operational state. In the following example, the original stack unit 3 has failed, and a replacement unit has been installed that does not match the configuration of the original unit. You should see the following message.

```
Warning! put stack unit 3 to non-operational reason= config mismatch
```

Complete the following steps to recover from a configuration mismatch.

1. Enter the **show stack** command to see the status of the stack, and the **show running-config** command to see the configurations of the stack units.

2. To resolve the mismatch, you must remove the configuration for stack unit 3. Use the **no stack unit** command in configuration mode.

```
device# configure terminal
device(config)# no stack unit 3
```

This removes configuration related to unit 3.

If you are unable to remove the configuration because of a multi-slot trunk configuration or other configuration identified by system output, you must first manually remove the problem configuration.

When you have successfully deleted the mismatched stack unit, a re-election is triggered, and the active controller learns the correct module configuration from the standby controller or from other stack members. No reload is required.

Memory allocation failure

A memory allocation (malloc) failure occurs when the active controller does not have enough memory to run a stack unit. This failure may occur if you configure a large number of VLANs (for example, 4000) or STP instances (for example, 255) in the router image. A memory allocation failure message means that the active controller is low on memory after allocating these resources and does not have enough remaining memory to control a stack member. You can correct this by reducing the number of VLANs or STP instances.

NOTE

After you make configuration changes, such as the number of VLANs or STP instances, you must reset the stack.

Auto Image Copy for stack units

The Auto Image Copy feature ensures that all units in a stack are running the same flash image after a stack merge. This feature also enables automatic reload of the stack units. It prevents the image mismatch that occurs when one or more member units join the stack with a different running image and signature than the active controller and standby controller.

Auto Image Copy is enabled by default on devices, and the user does not have to manually copy the active controller's running image to the mismatched members.

Auto Image Copy limitations

The following limitations apply to the Auto Image Copy feature:

- Auto Image Copy is applicable only to those stack units that are in a non-operational image mismatch state.
- Auto Image Copy does not work if there is a major image mismatch, when the image version of the IPC is different from the stack unit version.
- Auto Image Copy does not work if the user has copied a different image into the flash, creating a mismatch in versions between the flash and the running image on the active controller for the stack.

Verifying Auto Image Copy

Use the **show stack** command to check for any units in the mismatch state after the stack is formed. The following example shows that stack unit 2 is not operational, due to an image mismatch.

Disabling Auto Image Copy

Auto Image Copy is enabled by default. However, if you wish to disable this feature, enter the following command in global configuration mode.

```
device# configure terminal
device(config)# image-auto-copy disable
```

Use the **no image-auto-copy disable** command to re-enable Auto Image Copy. This restarts Auto Image Copy immediately and ensures that all stack units have the same image.

NOTE

You can use the **show running-config** or the **show stack detail** command to see if Auto Image Copy is disabled.

Copying the flash image to a stack unit from the active controller

You can replace a bad image on a stack unit or an image that does not match the active controller's image by copying the correct flash image from the active controller.

NOTE

In most cases, you do not have to manually copy the flash image to a mismatched stack unit. For more information, refer to [Auto Image Copy for stack units](#) on page 206.

To copy the flash image to the primary flash memory of a stack unit from the active controller primary flash, enter the **copy flash flash** command followed by the keyword **unit-id-pri** and the stack unit number as shown in the following example.

```
device# copy flash flash unit-id-pri 2
```

The example copies active controller primary flash to the primary flash for stack unit 2.

You can also copy flash to more than one stack unit at the same time as shown in the following example.

```
device# copy flash flash unit-id-pri 2,3,5-8
```

The example copies active controller primary flash to stack units 2 and 3 and 5 through 8.

Use the keyword **unit-id-sec** to copy from active controller primary flash as shown in the following example.

```
copy flash flash unit-id-sec 2-4
```

The example copies active controller secondary flash to stack units 2 through 4.

For additional information on **copy flash** commands, refer to the *Ruckus FastIron Command Reference*.

Configuring stacking trunks in a live environment

To create or modify a trunk in a production environment, use the **multi-stack-trunk** command. The **multi-stack-trunk** command is used to ensure that a stack trunk is formed on two directly connected stack units at the same time. The **multi-stack-trunk** command can only be enabled on the active controller unit.

By configuring a multi-stack-trunk on two sets of connected stack ports, a trunk-to-port connection is avoided. A trunk-to-port connection is formed when one side of the ports forms a trunk, and the other side of the ports does not. A trunk-to-port connection can result in dropped packets and can potentially break a stacking link.

The following example shows a trunk being formed between stack units 1 and 2 and another trunk being formed between stack units 2 and 3.

```
device(config)# stack unit 1
device(config-unit-1)# multi-stack-trunk 1/2/3 to 1/2/4 and 2/2/1 to 2/2/2
device(config-unit-1)# stack unit 2
device(config-unit-2)# multi-stack-trunk 2/2/3 to 2/2/4 and 3/2/1 to 3/2/2
```

Use the **no** form of the **multi-stack-trunk** command to remove the stacking trunk configuration.

Displaying multi-trunk stacking configuration

The **multi-stack-trunk** command is used on live stacks and is effectively a combination of two **stack-trunk** commands to ensure that a trunk-to-trunk connection is created on both ends of a stack link simultaneously. When the **multi-stack trunk** command is used to create a trunk, the configuration is saved as stack trunk ports, and the running configuration displays the stack trunk details on both ends under the heading `stack unit <unit> configuration`.

```
ICX7750-48C Router# configure terminal
ICX7750-48C Router(config)# stack unit 1
ICX7750-48C Router(config-unit-1)# multi-stack-trunk 1/2/4 to 1/2/6 and 2/2/4 to 2/2/6
```

In the previous example, a two-port trunk is created between stack units 1 and 2. This example enlarges the two-port trunk to a three-port trunk.

Use the **show running-config** command to display the related configuration under **stack-trunk** and **stack-port**. For the multi-stack trunk created in the previous example, the running or startup configuration displays the following configuration for the **show running-config** command.

```

Error messages encountered when configuring a stacking trunk

The following error messages may occur when you configure a trunk on a Ruckus ICX stack:

- If you form a multi-trunk connection on two sets of stack ports that are not directly connected on neighboring units, the **multi-stack-trunk** command is rejected, and an error message similar to the follow example is displayed.

```
Error! 1/2/3 has no connection. Please use "stack-trunk".
```

- When a unit joins or leaves a stack, or a stack trunk is configured using the **stack-trunk** command, a stack election is triggered. The **multi-stack-trunk** command triggers a stack election among the stack units and reprograms (or removes) the stack trunk port in the hardware. A timer is set on all units to coordinate a stack election. Traffic is generally interrupted for less than 5 seconds for the system to detect the port down event and reprogram hardware. You must wait for the stack election to be completed before entering another command. If you do not wait for the stack election to finish, the following warning message is displayed.

```
Stack port or trunk change is in progress, please try later.
```


- You cannot enter the **stack switch-over** command until the stack election is completed or until the **multi-stack-trunk** command configuration is complete. If you enter the **stack switch-over** command too early, the following warning message is displayed.

```
Please try later, reason: during stack port or trunk deployment.
```

Configuring stacking ports in a live environment

You can use the **multi-stack-port** command (similar to the **multi-stack-trunk** command) to change a live stack-trunk to a stack-port. The **no multi-stack-port** command removes a live stack link.

The following example replaces a live stack-trunk with a stack-port on both units.

```

NOTE

Both the **multi-stack-trunk** and the **multi-stack-port** commands perform numerous checks to make sure no unit would become unreachable. However, the checks have limitations. Verify the physical connections with the **show stack connection** command, and make sure that reducing or removing stack-ports or stack-trunks will not break the stack.

NOTE

Reducing or removing live stack-trunks or stack-ports changes stacking ports to data ports. This creates Layer 2 loops if no Spanning Tree Protocol is configured in the default VLAN. Ruckus recommends that you either disconnect these ports or disable them.

Adding, removing, or replacing units in a stack

You can add, remove, or replace stack units using interactive-setup or manually using static configuration. The recommended method is to connect units to the stack before you supply power to the units; however, you can also connect powered units.

Installing a new unit in a stack using stack interactive-setup

This method can be applied to clean units or units that have existing configurations.

1. Connect the new unit to the stack by connecting the appropriate stacking ports.
2. Run stack interactive-setup on the active controller, and assign an ID to the new unit. The active controller resets the new unit.
3. Once the new unit boots and joins the stack, enter the **write memory** command on the active controller.

Removing a unit from a stack

To remove a unit from the stack, disconnect the cables from the stacking ports. This can be done whether the units are powered on or powered off. When you remove a unit that is powered on, it is still in stacking-enabled mode. To remove the stacking files, enter the **stack unconfigure me** or **stack unconfigure clean** command.

The **stack unconfigure me** command returns a unit to the state it had before joining a stack and recovers its startup configuration. The **stack unconfigure clean** command removes the unit's startup configuration. When you issue either command, the unit operates as a standalone unit once it reboots.

When a unit is removed from a stack, the active controller deletes the unit configuration if it has been dynamically learned. Refer to [Stacking terminology](#) on page 19 for definitions of static and dynamic configurations.

Stack unit replacement

You can replace any stack unit except the active controller with a clean unit of the same model without entering any commands. Discovery and unit replacement are completed in approximately one to two minutes; however, additional time is required to reload the new unit.

To replace a unit, the following are required:

- The unit being replaced must have a static configuration. Use the **show stack** command as shown in the following procedures to check for an "S" next to the unit, indicating its configuration is static.
- The physical modules of the replacement unit must match one and only one provisional configuration, that is, a stored configuration without a physical unit present.

- The replacement unit must be a clean unit. You can convert a unit to a clean unit using the **erase startup-config** command followed by the **reload** command without saving any configuration.

Stack unit replacement is performed for one unit at a time to handle any setup.

NOTE

Starting with release 08.0.90, connecting the stack units with IDs in ascending or descending sequential order is no longer required.

Unit replacement limitations

Starting with release 08.0.90, stack unit replacement does not work in the following cases:

- Multiple units are being replaced simultaneously. In this case, use stack interactive-setup or stack zero-touch provisioning to discover the stack units.
- The modules on the replacement unit do not match any provisional configuration.
- The modules on the replacement unit match more than one provisional configuration.
- Stack zero-touch provisioning is enabled.

Replacing a stack unit automatically with a clean unit

- (Optional) Enter the **show stack** command on the active controller, and check for an "S" beside the unit to confirm that the configuration for the unit you are replacing is static.
- If the configuration is not static, enter the **write memory** command to change all dynamic configurations to static. A static configuration remains after the unit is removed.

After the configuration is saved with the write memory command, all unit IDs are followed by an "S" as shown in the following example.

When you remove a unit with a static configuration, the configuration is still present. The **show stack** command output lists the unit state as "reserve" as shown in the following example for unit 2.

Adding, removing, or replacing units in a stack

3. Remove the old unit from the stack.

Although the unit is absent, the provisional configuration for the unit is still retained on the active controller.

4. Make sure that the hardware (module) configuration of the replacement unit is identical to the hardware configuration of the unit you removed.
5. Connect the new unit to the stack using the same stacking ports as the old unit.

If the replacement unit configuration matches the configuration retained on the active controller, the active controller resets the new unit. The new unit becomes a member and joins the stack, and the stack keeps its original topology.

Replacing a stack unit with stack interactive-setup

You must use stack interactive-setup to replace stack units in the following cases:

- The replacement is not a clean unit.
- You do not want the active controller to trigger an automatic replacement.
- You are replacing multiple units simultaneously.

NOTE

If you are replacing more than one unit simultaneously, you may also use stack zero-touch provisioning to discover the units; however, stack interactive-setup allows interactive control of the process.

NOTE

If you use stack interactive-setup to assign a new unit an ID that has mismatched static configuration, the utility displays a warning message that the new unit will be put in a non-operational state after it joins the stack.

NOTE

You can return a configuration-mismatched unit to operation by configuring the **no stack unit** command for the nonoperational unit from the active controller. This removes the entire stack configuration so the active controller can learn the configuration-mismatched unit as a new unit. The active controller triggers an election and learns the unit. Refer to [Recovering from a stack unit configuration mismatch](#) on page 204 for more information.

To replace a stack unit with stack interactive-setup, perform the following steps.

1. (Optional) Enter the **show stack** command on the active controller, and check for an "S" beside the unit to confirm that the configuration for the unit you are replacing is static.
2. If the configuration is not static, enter the **write memory** command to change all dynamic configurations to static. A static configuration remains after the unit is removed.
3. Remove the old stack unit from the stack.
4. Connect the new unit to the existing stack using the same stacking ports as the old unit.
5. Enter the **stack interactive-setup** command. Select interactive-setup option 2 if the replacement unit is a clean unit. Select interactive-setup option 3 if the replacement unit contains configuration. Stack interactive-setup suggests an ID based on matching the new unit with the static configurations. You can overwrite the suggested ID by entering the ID of the old unit.

The active controller resets the unit, and it joins the stack.

In the following example, units 2 and 3 are removed and replaced. Because unit configuration has been saved, once the units are removed, the **show stack** command displays the state of both units as "reserve." This indicates that provisional configuration is stored for the two units.

Moving a unit to another stack

Moving a member from one stack to another stack can cause non-sequential ID assignment. The active controller will honor the original ID of the newly added unit if the ID is not already in use. The active controller assigns a new ID if the original ID is already in use. You can use the **stack interactive-setup** command to change the ID of the new unit. Refer to [Changing stack unit IDs with stack interactive-setup](#) on page 75 for more information.

Removing an active controller from a powered stack

To remove an active controller from a powered stack, disconnect the active controller. The standby controller waits for 30 seconds and then assumes the role of active controller. If hitless failover is enabled on the stack, the standby controller takes over immediately. A single active controller device functions as a standalone unit even if it is still stacking-enabled. You do not have to issue a **stack unconfigure me** command for an active controller.

Reloading a stack unit

Use the **reload** command to reload one or more stack units, for example, when necessary to repair a malfunctioning unit. Stack units can be reloaded only if they are not the active controller.

When the **reload** command is entered on the active controller without the **unit-id** parameter as shown in the following example, the entire stack reloads.

```
device# reload
```

NOTE

If you need to reload the active controller, use the **stack switch-over** command. When switchover occurs, the original active controller can be reloaded using the **reload unit-id** command.

You can specify a list of stack members to reload as shown in the following example.

```
device# reload unit-id 1,2,4-8
```

The example reloads units 1 and 2 and units 4 through 8.

For additional information on the reload command, refer to the *Ruckus FastIron Command Reference*.

Managing stack partitioning

Ring topology stacks do not partition when a stack member fails. Operation is interrupted briefly while the stack recalculates a new path. Ring topologies are more stable than linear topologies because they provide redundant pathways in case of accidental failure.

When a unit in a stack with a linear topology fails, the stack divides (partitions) into two or more separate stacks that all have the same configuration. This may cause an IP address conflict in the network. To keep the stacks separate, change the IP address of each new stack.

When a stack breaks into partitions, the partition with the active controller remains operational. If a partition contains the standby controller, this partition becomes operational because the standby controller assumes the active role and reloads the partition units. However, if hitless failover is enabled, the partition units are not reloaded. A partition without an active controller or standby controller does not function. To reconfigure these units to act in standalone mode, you must first enter a **stack unconfigure me** command on each unit.

To reverse the partitioning, reconnect all of the units into the original stack topology using the stacking ports. This is the same as merging stacks. If the original active controller again has the highest priority, it regains its role. If two partition active controllers have the same priority, the active controller with the most stack members is elected. This process helps minimize traffic interruption.

Merging stacks

Ruckus ICX stacks may be merged, but the total number of stack units must not exceed the maximum stack supported by the device. For example, you could combine two stacks of ICX 7750 devices with four units each into a single stack of eight units.

NOTE

You cannot use interactive-setup to merge stacks because interactive-setup does not work across stack boundaries.

You can merge stacks by connecting them together using the stacking ports. Before doing this, make sure that no stacking ports (for example, ports on an end unit in a linear stack topology) have been reconfigured as data ports.

When stacks are merged, an election is held among the active controllers. The winning controller retains its configuration and the IDs of all of its original stack members. The remaining stack units lose their configuration and are reset. If the IDs of the losing stack units conflict with the IDs of the winning units, they may change, and the IDs will no longer be sequential.

NOTE

You can use interactive-setup to renumber the members in the newly merged stack. Refer to [Changing stack unit IDs with stack interactive-setup](#) on page 75 for more information.

The following examples show how stack merging works:

- If a stack partitions into multiple stacks because of a connection failure, you can fix the connection and the stack partitions will merge back into the original stack with no change to stack IDs because all stack IDs are distinct.
- In a linear stack topology, the end units of the stack have only one stacking port configured. Before you can merge two linear stacks, you must reconfigure the end units so that both ports are stacking ports.

Unconfiguring a stack

The **stack unconfigure** command is a runtime command that returns stack units to their pre-stacking state. When a stack unit is unconfigured, its stacking flash is removed, and its startup-config.txt flash file is recovered. These actions apply to all units to which this command is applied, regardless of the role of the unit in the stack.

When the **stack unconfigure** command is applied to the active controller, it removes **stack enable** from the runtime configuration but not from the startup configuration. If you want to remove the **stack enable** command from the active controller permanently, you must enter the **write memory** command after the **stack unconfigure** command.

When the **stack unconfigure** command is applied to the standby controller or a stack member (besides the active controller), it removes **stack enable** from the recovered startup-config.txt file and resets the unit.

NOTE

When a stack member becomes a standalone unit after the **stack unconfigure** command, it could become a clean unit if it had no startup configuration flash. When a clean unit matches the active controller's static configuration, the active controller integrates the clean unit into the stack. Thus, the standalone unit is reloaded to be a member of the stack.

Users can avoid this problem by disconnecting the member unit from the stack and issuing the **stack unconfigure me** command on the unit to change it to a standalone unit.

To remove the configuration from the current stack unit, enter the following command.

```
device# stack unconfigure me
```

To remove the configuration from the current unit, including the startup configuration, so that the unit reboots as a clean unit, enter the following unit on the stack member console.

```
device# stack unconfigure clean
```

NOTE

The **stack unconfigure clean** command can be entered only on the stack member console.

To remove the configuration from the entire stack, enter the following command on the active controller for the stack.

```
device# stack unconfigure all
```

To remove the configuration from a specific stack unit, on the active controller for the stack, enter the **stack unconfigure** command followed by the stack unit ID as shown in the following example.

```
device# stack unconfigure 3
```

The example unconfigures stack unit 3.

NOTE

The **stack unconfigure me** command can be entered from any unit; however, **stack unconfigure all** and **stack unconfigure stack-unit** commands can be issued only on the active controller.

The following example shows a session where stack unit 2 is unconfigured.

When the **stack unconfigure 2** command is issued, stack unit 2 recovers the startup-config.txt from the startup-config.old configuration file that was saved when this unit downloaded its configuration from the active controller. As the output shows, stack member 2 has been removed from the stack, and ID 2 is now reserved for a replacement unit. Stack member 3 is now the standby controller.

Syslog, SNMP, and traps for stack units

Syslog messages from stack units are forwarded to, and can be viewed from, the active controller.

All stack units support SNMP gets, sets, and traps, which are managed by the active controller. An SNMP trap is sent from a stack unit to the stack active controller and forwarded from the active controller to an SNMP-configured server. An external network management station can execute SNMP gets and sets for MIBs and collect information about any port on the stack.

SNMP traps can be configured for the insertion or removal of a stack unit or uplink module, and for optic identification.

For more information about syslog messages, refer to the *Ruckus FastIron Management Configuration Guide*.

Configuring SNMP for a stack

SNMP server and feature configuration is the same for a stack as for standalone units. In a stack, SNMP gets and sets are processed by the active controller for the standby controller and all stack members. SNMP traps generated by the standby controller and stack members are propagated to the configured SNMP server through the active controller. For more information about how to configure an SNMP server for ICX devices, refer to the *Ruckus FastIron Management Configuration Guide*.

SNMP engine IDs for stackable devices

NOTE

Beginning with FastIron release 08.0.20, when a stack is enabled, "hitless-failover enable" configuration is added, and a default stack MAC address is assigned if none is configured. The MAC address of the unit is displayed in **show stack** command output.

For Ruckus stacking devices, if an engine ID is not manually created or a stack MAC address is not specified and saved, the stack loses its engine ID when the active controller fails and the standby controller takes over because the standby controller creates a

new engine ID at bootup. To prevent this from happening, create a new engine ID or a new stack MAC address to save the engine ID to the startup configuration. This should be done before the SNMPv3 user is created.

If a new active controller is elected (for example, the standby controller becomes the active controller), you will see the following results:

- If you have configured the engine ID and saved it to the startup configuration file, the new stack configuration uses the saved engine ID.
- If you have not configured an engine ID, but a stack MAC address is configured, the new stack configuration retains the original engine ID because it is based on the stack MAC address.
- If you have not configured an engine ID and no stack MAC address is configured, the new stack configuration uses the default engine ID. The default engine ID is based on the stack's own management MAC address for the new active controller. Because the engine ID has changed, any SNMPv3 clients must be reconfigured with the new engine ID.

Displaying stack information

This section describes the **show** commands for a stack and includes output examples and field descriptions.

Displaying stacking topology

The **show stack connection** command displays the topology and a detailed connection report. It also displays connection errors or hardware failures as shown in the following sample output.

How the show running-config command displays configured stacking ports

FastIron release 08.0.90 always display stacking ports regardless of whether **stack enable** is configured. FastIron releases prior to 08.0.90 may not display stacking ports when **stack enable** is not configured. In all releases, stacking ports can be used as data ports if **stack enable** is not configured.

Displaying software version information

The **show version** command shows the software version that the stack is running. The last line of the output shows the bootup ID and role for the unit. Output resembles the following example.

MIB support for ICX stack configurations

All statistics about packets received and sent, RMON, jumbo frames (greater than 1518 bytes), runts, giants, and other instances are gathered through the stack interfaces and are accessible through SNMP. MIB support for ICX stack configurations is the same as for a standard interface. Information includes types of modules, including optics modules.

ICX Stack Troubleshooting

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Problems commonly diagnosed with stack formation

The most common reason for an unsuccessful stack build is a hardware configuration mismatch, a software configuration mismatch, or a combination of both.

The following common problems may be encountered when building stacks:

- Ports on the same trunk connect to different units.
- Ports on the same trunk connect to different trunks on the same unit.
- Sub-ports of the 4 x 10-Gbps module are down.
- One end of a 10-Gbps port is up, but the other end is down.
- Communication problems exist between units in the stack.

A common connection error is that the two cables of a trunk go to different units or to different trunks on the same unit. A stack may still form in these cases, but the incorrect connection may cause an internal forwarding loop, or the unit may have forwarding problems.

Manually triggering stack diagnosis

You can manually trigger stack diagnosis using the **show stack connection** command. This command can provide additional detail on connections that are identified as problems.

Troubleshooting an unsuccessful stack build

If you are unable to build a stack (for example, the **show stack** command does not display any members), perform the following steps.

1. Enter the **show run** command on each unit to make sure the configuration contains "stack enable." If it does not, enter the **stack enable** command on the unit. Before a stack is formed, you can still access the console port on each device. Once a stack is successfully formed, you are redirected to the active controller.

NOTE

If you are building a stack using stack interactive-setup, you do not have to enter the **stack enable** command on each unit.

2. Check that all of your stacking port connections are secure and working properly. Enter **show interfaces stack** on each device to confirm that the stacking port links are up and the ports are in the forward state.

NOTE

When you use stack interactive-setup or stack zero-touch provisioning, data ports can be in the BLOCKING state if spanning tree is configured. However, stack interactive-setup probe packets can traverse blocked ports.

3. Confirm that all of the devices are running the same software image.
4. Use the **show log** command to display any IPC version mismatch messages. These messages appear in one minute when receiving mismatched probe packets, and then once every 10 minutes.

- Use the **show stack ipc** command to see if any traffic has been sent or received. Enter **clear stack ipc** to clear the traffic statistics and then enter **show stack ipc** again so you can easily see differences in traffic flow.

If the "Send message types" field is empty, **stack enable** has not been configured. If the number of "Recv IPC packets" increases, but there are no "Recv message types," then the packets are being dropped for various reasons, including the wrong IPC version, or a checksum error. The "Possible errors" field lists reasons for packet loss.

NOTE

A small "***state not ready" count is normal, but if it continues to increase, a problem is indicated.

- If the results of a **show stack** command show other stack members, but lists them as non-operational, this could be due to an image mismatch, or a configuration mismatch. In the event of an image mismatch, you can download the correct images to the entire stack from the active controller.

NOTE

If your intended stacking ports are connected in a ring topology, they will not all appear to be in the forwarding state because of Spanning Tree Protocol, but stack interactive-setup can still build the stack.

7. Check to be sure you do not have any stacking to non-stacking connections. All platforms use proprietary link negotiation to detect whether a stacking port's neighbors are also stacking ports. The platforms then convert both sides from IEEE mode (used in data ports) to HiGig mode (used in internal ports). Under stable conditions, both ends of a stacking link are converted to HiGig mode. If a stacking port is UP but in IEEE mode, its neighbor is not a stacking port. Enter the **show stack stack-ports** command to check if any stacking port is UP but in IEEE mode. The following example shows that U3 ports 3/2/1 to 3/2/3 are UP and in IEEE mode as indicated by the **up*** mark.

If you run out of flash memory while performing a **write memory**, your stack devices may contain very large startup-config.v4 or startup-config.old files, which are preserved for recovery purposes. If you identify these old files and they are not needed, you can delete them by entering the **flash delete** command at the privileged EXEC level as shown in the following example.

Troubleshooting stack interactive-setup

Stack interactive-setup can be used to form linear and ring stack topologies. For information about the procedure, refer to [Scenario 1 - Using stack interactive-setup to create a stack](#) on page 57.

If stack interactive-setup does not detect all the units that should be detected, perform the following checks:

- Make sure that all the cables are properly connected.
- Make sure that all the relevant ports are in the UP state.
- Make sure that all the units are running the same image.
- Issue the **stack enable** command only on the unit that will serve as the active controller.
- Make sure that **stack disable** is not configured on any prospective members (for example, by entering the **show running-config** command on the unit).
- Check to see if spanning tree protocols (STP, RSTP, PVST, or MSTP) are configured either globally or on the default VLAN. Connecting new links or new units without configuring spanning tree protocols creates Layer 2 loops. Loops cause high traffic count on the affected ports and may cause high CPU utilization if the looped packets are trapped to the CPU. Stack interactive-setup and many functions may not work properly in a looped environment.

NOTE

Ruckus recommends that you configure STP globally or on the default VLAN before making new stacking connections. If the system is already experiencing loops before you configure STP, STP may not converge when the looping packets have higher priority than STP's BPDU packets. Refer to [Stacking deployment guidelines](#) on page 34 for information on handling loops.

If stack interactive-setup times out (this may happen due to inactivity), you will not be able to make any changes in your configuration or stack topology until you restart the session by entering the **stack interactive-setup** command.

Troubleshooting unit replacement issues

The unit replacement process is intended to replace one unit with a clean unit of exactly the same model without entering any command. Unit replacement is not designed to discover new units. Refer to **Replacing stack units** in [Stacking deployment guidelines](#) on page 34 for more information.

- The replacement unit is a clean unit (does not contain a startup-config.txt file).
- The replacement unit running configuration does not contain the **stack enable** command.
- The replacement unit running configuration does not contain the **stack disable** command.
- The configurations for the stack ports on the active controller match the physical connections to the unit.
- You can replace only one unit at a time. If the active controller detects multiple new units, it issues warning messages.
- The clean unit must match only one reserved stack unit configuration. The active controller issues warning messages if the new unit matches multiple units.
- The console of the new unit displays a warning message if the unit receives unit-replacement packets when it does not qualify for unit replacement.

Checking hardware after an upgrade failure

You can perform a few basic checks if you suspect a hardware failure.

When the system resets as the result of an upgrade failure, you may see output similar to the following example.

The **copy tftp flash** command copies the image to all stack units including the active controller. The **copy flash flash** command copies the image from the primary or secondary flash on the active controller to the primary or secondary flash image of a stack member. If you are unable to copy an image to one or more stack units, check the following:

- Make sure the unit is actually part of the stack. Use the **show stack** command.
- If a unit joins a stack after the **image copy** command was issued, you will need to copy the image to this unit separately.

Configuration, startup configuration files, and stacking flash

Stacking system behavior is defined by the runtime configuration, which can be displayed using the **show running-config** command. The **write memory** command stores the runtime configuration in a flash file called startup-config.txt. During bootup, the system reads and applies the startup-config.txt file to the runtime configuration. The startup-config.txt file can be shown using the **show config** command.

The stacking system installs a stacking.boot file on each unit that tells the unit what its role is during the boot process. The stacking.boot file is generated whenever there is an election that defines the roles for all units.

When an active controller is booted or a **write memory** command is issued, the active controller synchronizes its startup-config.txt file to every stack unit. The original startup-config.txt files in the standby controller and other stack members are renamed to startup-config.old. If you issue the **stack unconfigure me** command on the standby controller or stack member directly, these units recover their original startup-config.txt files and reboot as standalone devices. If you enter the **stack unconfigure all** command from the active controller, all devices recover their old startup-config.txt files and become standalone devices. When this happens, the startup-config.old file is renamed to startup-config.txt, and the stacking.boot file is removed.

Whenever a stack unit configuration parameter, such as the priority setting, is changed, an election is held to determine the active controller, and the result is written into the stacking.boot file. A prompt message appears on the console that recommends you use the **write memory** command. For an active controller role change to take effect, you must reset the entire stack.

If you do not use the **write memory** command but reset the stack, the stack units continue to operate in their roles as defined by the stacking.boot file. After the reset, each unit readjusts based on the current runtime configuration. However, you may observe different results depending on what has not been saved. If you have renumbered the stack unit IDs, you may see a configuration mismatch because your changes no longer match the active controller configuration.

If you change priorities to elect an active controller, the new active controller assumes its role after a reboot, whether or not you have used the **write memory** command. If you do not save your priority change before the next reboot, the reboot triggers an election that may result in a different winner based on the priority in the unsaved configuration. The new winner assumes the active controller role after the next reboot.

If you change the stacking port configuration and do not save your changes, you may encounter connectivity errors. To recover from a configuration error, define the correct stacking port by running stack interactive-setup.

NOTE

You should always execute the **write memory** command after making stacking-related configuration changes such as changing priority or changing stacking ports. If you do not want to keep the changes, change the configuration back to the previous version, and then execute the **write memory** command. Do not discard configuration changes by using a reset without executing the **write memory** command.

Stacking unit role transition considerations

An active or standby controller contains the stacking system configuration and its internal data structures. When an active or standby controller becomes a member, the configuration and data structures are not cleared. This does not affect its capability to function as a member. However, if the user changes the configuration, this member unit cannot become a standby again because of the difference in configuration. A member unit can become a standby only if the member was never a standby or active controller (with no configuration) or if it has the same configuration as the current active controller.

Port down and aging

Aging is only used as a safeguard. If a unit is powered down or the stacking link is removed, the system immediately detects that the port is down and knows that its neighbor is gone. That unit is immediately removed from the active controller.

If a stacking port does not receive keep-alive messages from its neighbor within 60 seconds, it ages out the neighbor. When a unit is no longer stack-enabled or when one stacking port becomes a non-stacking port, it sends a notification that the port is no longer a stacking port. When the neighboring port receives the notification from its neighbor, it immediately removes the neighbor.

The following message is logged and displayed when a port is aged out.
