- Priority 2 (P2)—High. Network or service is impacted, but not down. Business impact may be high. Workaround may be available. Go to the **Open a Case** section.
- Priority 3 (P3)—Medium. Network or service is moderately impacted, but most business remains functional. Go to the **Self-Service Resources** section.
- Priority 4 (P4)—Low. Requests for information, product documentation, or product enhancements. Go to the **Self-Service Resources** section.

Overview

The purpose of this pre-deployment checklist for a virtual machine is to help you plan your Cloudpath deployment by considering various aspects of your network.

This checklist is targeted for both the customer who is performing the deployment and the Cloudpath representative who may be assisting the customer with the deployment.

It is recommended to read through this document thoroughly, and complete any requested information, prior to starting the initial configuration.

Customer Worksheet

To help plan your Cloudpath deployment, it can be helpful to complete the customer worksheet questions to provide some general information about your network.

It is recommended to complete the customer worksheet before starting Cloudpath deployment.

NOTE

If you have purchased White Glove support for your Cloudpath system, you can provide the following information to your Cloudpath deployment representative.

•	Customer name (If sending this information to your Cloudpath representative)
•	Which brand of AP/Controller are you using?
•	Are you currently utilizing certificate-based authentication in your network?
•	Are you currently utilizing a RADIUS server in your network for certificate authentication?
•	Are you using Network Access Control (NAC) in your network?
•	Do you have a load balancer? If yes, who is the vendor?

Information for the Customer to Consider Before Cloudpath is Deployed

Before Cloudpath is implemented into the customer network, the following network configurations should be considered:

- The initial firewall configuration should be set up to allow Internet access for the following:
 - Access from ES -> xpc.cloudpath.net (TCP 80/443-HTTP/HTTPS)
 - Access from ES -> dist2.cloudpath.net (used for ES updates TCP 80/443-HTTP/HTTPS)
 - Access from ES -> NTP (UDP 123)

NOTE

You can use **0.centos.pool.ntp.org** on the standard NTP port (123). This can be configured to point to a local server during system setup, if you prefer.

- Internally, the guest/onboarding VLAN needs to be able to access to the wireless controller (this can be locked down to specific ports after the initial setup).
- The WLAN controller requires Layer 3 access to the Cloudpath server.
- If using Active Directory, you need the AD domain information (plus any subdomains) and the IP address of the AD server.

NOTE

AD groups should be set up before the implementation call.

NOTE

The Cloudpath VM should have Layer 3 access to Active Directory (Port 636 for LDAPs, Port 389 for LDAP).

- Your wireless controller must be WPA2-Enterprise capable.
- You should have knowledge about how to configure a captive portal on your wireless controller(s).
 - The open SSID typically has pre-authentication ACLs defined, which permit access to the VM.
 - The WLAN controller is configured to point to the Cloudpath VM as an external captive portal.
- The WPA2-Enterprise SSID should be set up to delegate authentication to the onboard AAA server or your existing AAA.

NOTE

If using an existing AAA server, it requires Layer 3 access to the Cloudpath VM to verify certificate status (optional).

- A web server certificate is required for HTTPS. The system can be configured prior to the WWW server certificate being installed, but it should be installed before attempting to enroll end-users.
 - The WWW certificate may be a wildcard certificate (*.company.com) or a named certificate (test.company.com).
 - The WWW certificate must match the DNS name used by the end-users to enroll.
 - To request a WWW certificate, you may need to provide a Certificate Signing Request (CSR). If so, you can download a CSR from ES after the system is set up.
- If using NPS, set up the NPS server role and a RADIUS server.

NOTE

The new RADIUS server certificates and root CA can be uploaded after Cloudpath is configured.

- If using a pre-existing RADIUS server, you need the IP address and access to the RADIUS server-signed certificates.
- If using an existing CA, and you would like to use Cloudpath as an intermediate CA to issue client certificates, you need the public and private key of the existing CA to upload into Cloudpath.
- If using Cloudpath as a proxy for an existing CA (Microsoft CA or Custom External CA) you need the CA URL and CA chain for the remote CA.
- DNS should be configured for Cloudpath and other components appropriate for your network.
- You should have a general idea about your deployment scheme for employees, partners, contractors and guests.

Initial Setup

Before an implementation call between the customer and a Cloudpath representative, the Cloudpath representative should review the customer checklist in this guide as well as the entire *Cloudpath Deployment Guide*.

If deploying to a local VMware server, the customer should download the OVA file prior to the implementation call.

The call should cover the following topics at minimum:

- Discussion about what the customer wants to achieve
- Initial product setup
- Workflow basics

Who Should Be Involved in the Initial Setup Call

Be sure to include anyone in the initial setup call regarding your Cloudpath system who will be involved with administering the network.

Cloudpath implementation affects different aspects of your environment. Therefore, you might want to involve other members of your network team. Suggestions follow:

- Cloudpath is installed as a virtual appliance. If you have a VM team, they should be contacted regarding the deployment.
- The open and secure SSIDs are set up on the wireless controller. The person/team who manages this aspect of your network should be available for making adjustments to the wireless controller.
- Cloudpath can be set up to authenticate users to an Active Directory or LDAP server. Typically, you do not need to make adjustments to the authentication server. However, if there are issues connecting to the secure network, the person/team responsible for the authentication server might be required.
- If you plan to use the onboard RADIUS server, which is recommend, you do not need the RADIUS server team. However, if you plan to use NPS or another external RADIUS server, the RADIUS person/team should attend the setup meeting as user certificates are authenticated to the RADIUS server.

NOTE

After the initial setup, Cloudpath provides a list of the inbound and outbound traffic of your system. Firewall updates may be required for getting Cloudpath up and running in your network.

Deployment Testing for Cloudpath

Ideally, for your deployment testing, you should have devices on hand for each operating system that you plan to support. While the enrollment workflow behaves the same on each device, the Wizard application behaves slightly differently on each operating system. With Android, this issue is compounded by the fact that each vendor can make modifications to the Android operating system, causing the application, in some cases, to behave differently between models.
