What Support Do I Need?

Technical issues are usually described in terms of priority (or severity). To determine if you need to call and open a case or access the self-service resources, use the following criteria:

- Priority 1 (P1)—Critical. Network or service is down and business is impacted. No known workaround. Go to the **Open a Case** section.
- Priority 2 (P2)—High. Network or service is impacted, but not down. Business impact may be high. Workaround may be available. Go to the **Open a Case** section.
- Priority 3 (P3)—Medium. Network or service is moderately impacted, but most business remains functional. Go to the **Self-Service Resources** section.
- Priority 4 (P4)—Low. Requests for information, product documentation, or product enhancements. Go to the **Self-Service Resources** section.

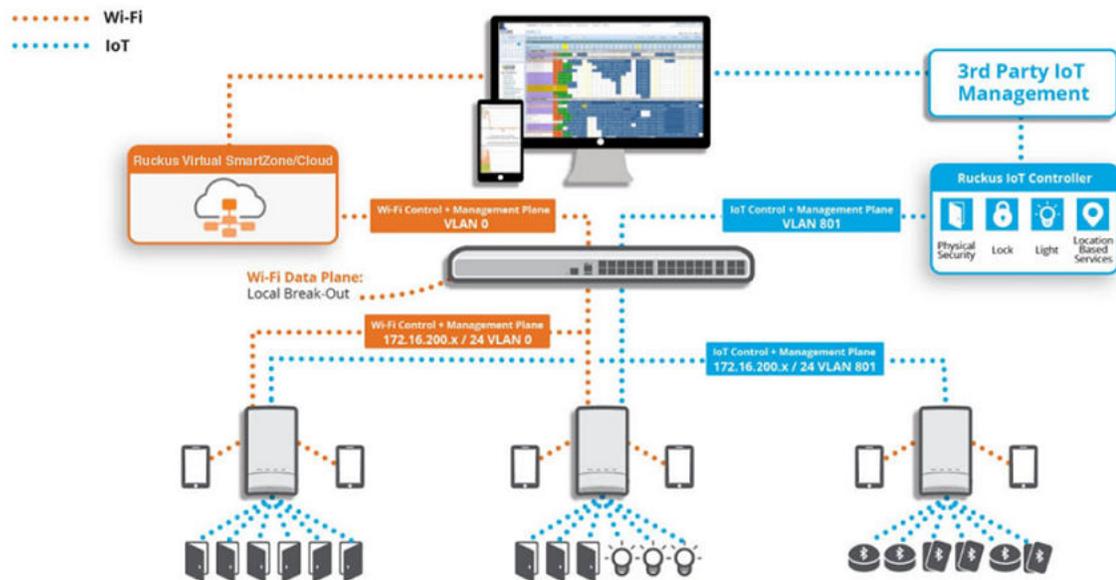
RUCKUS IoT Suite Overview

This guide supports 1.5 and later releases. The RUCKUS IoT Suite is a collection of network hardware and software infrastructure components used to create a converged, multi-standard Internet of Things (IoT) access network.

RUCKUS IoT Suite End-to-End Solution Deployment

The following diagram shows a typical RUCKUS IoT Suite deployment.

FIGURE 1 Typical RUCKUS IoT Deployment



The following components make up the RUCKUS IoT Suite deployment:

- RUCKUS IoT-ready Access Points (APs): Accommodate RUCKUS IoT Modules, and provides Built-in IoT support to establish multi-standards wireless access for Wi-Fi and non-Wi-Fi IoT endpoints
- RUCKUS IoT Modules: Radio or radio-and-sensor devices that connect to a RUCKUS IoT-ready AP to enable endpoint connectivity based on standards such as Bluetooth Low Energy (BLE) and Zigbee
- RUCKUS SmartZone Controller: A network controller that provides a management interface for the WLAN
- RUCKUS IoT Controller: A virtual controller, deployed in tandem with a RUCKUS SmartZone OS-based controller, that performs connectivity, device, and security management

The IoT Challenge

Enterprises seeking to deploy IoT solutions come across challenges such as network investment, system integration, security, data analytics and several others. To encourage adoption, enterprise IoT solution vendors develop vertically-integrated, proprietary infrastructure silos that often address only a single problem but that do not readily integrate with other silos and offer limited opportunity for infrastructure reuse. The net result is that even successful IoT deployments require redundant network infrastructure, additional security apparatus, and extensive integration services.

The RUCKUS IoT Solution

To address the IoT challenge, RUCKUS has developed a suite of products that can be deployed as an IoT access network that consolidates multiple physical-layer networks into a single converged network. This common network simplifies IoT endpoint onboarding, establishes uniform security protocols, and converges IoT endpoint management and policy-setting. In short, an IoT access network enables organizations to more quickly realize benefits from IoT use cases.

The RUCKUS IoT Suite simplifies the creation of IoT access networks through the reuse of LAN and WLAN infrastructure, which shortens the time to deploy and reduces the cost of an IoT solution.

Before You Begin

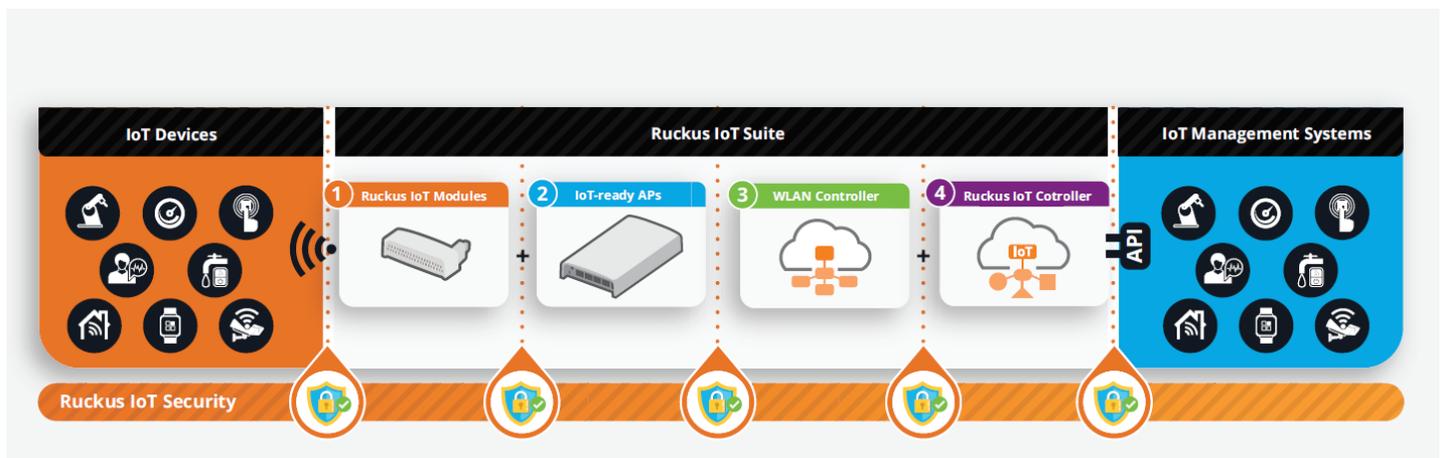
To begin using the RUCKUS IoT Controller to manage the IoT devices and IoT services, you must prepare the following components:

- An existing network with an Internet connection
- A RUCKUS SmartZone or Virtual SmartZone wireless LAN (WLAN) controller implementation on the network.

Building a Converged IoT Access Network

RUCKUS has developed the RUCKUS IoT Suite to enable a secure IoT access network. The following figure shows the various components that comprise the RUCKUS IoT Suite. The following steps provide a brief introduction to each component, and prerequisites to be considered before installing the components on the network.

Step 1: Installing a RUCKUS IoT Controller

The RUCKUS IoT Controller is a virtual controller that integrates with the SmartZone Controller to perform connectivity, device, and security management functions for non-Wi-Fi devices. The RUCKUS IoT Controller can be installed on the four hypervisors described in the following table.

TABLE 2 Supported Hypervisors

Hypervisor	Vendor	Version
ESXi	VMware	6.0 and later
VM Virtual Box	Oracle	5.1.20 and later
VM Player	VMware	12 or later
KVM	Linux	2.11.1 or later
Hyper-v	Microsoft Windows	6.2 or later

NOTE

For compatible hardware for the hypervisors listed above, refer to the respective vendors website.

Before you begin installing the RUCKUS IoT Controller on any hypervisor, consider the following prerequisites:

- Ports 80, 123 or NTP, 443, 1883, and 8883 must be open.

- The virtual machine (VM) on which the RUCKUS IoT Controller is installed must have a minimum of 4 vCPUs, 4 GB RAM, and Fixed 20 GB HDD.

NOTE

For a high-scale deployment, RUCKUS recommends a minimum of 8 vCPUs and 8 GB RAM for the RUCKUS IoT Controller.

NOTE

RUCKUS recommends the following minimum hardware requirements for IoT Server.

- **CPU:** 4 core i7 or equivalent
- **Memory:** 32 GB
- **Hard Disk:** 1 TB

Step 2: Deploying RUCKUS Access Points and Ensuring Discovery of Controllers

Using the Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol (DHCP) Option 43 method, deploy RUCKUS Access Points (APs) and ensure discovery of the WLAN Controller and, subsequently, of the RUCKUS IoT Controller.

The IoT Access Point supports Option 43 with the following suboptions:

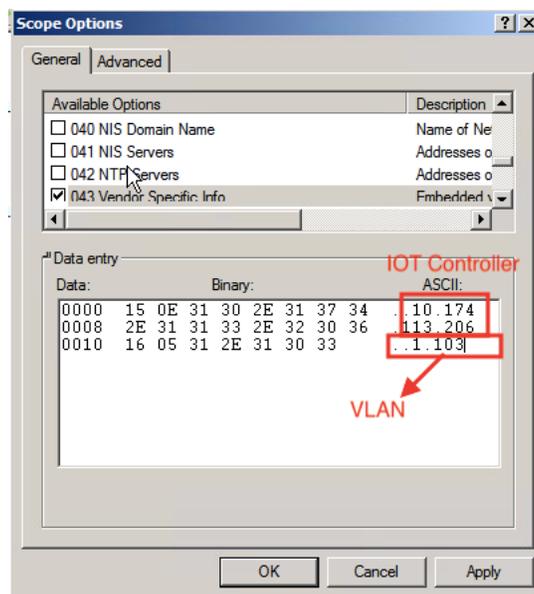
- Suboption 21: Used to configure a RUCKUS IoT Controller IPv4 address or FQDN (mandatory)
- Suboption 22: Used to set the control VLAN for IoT Control/Data traffic (optional)

Option 43 supports both binary and ASCII formats. The IoT Access Point bootup process checks for Option 43 and suboptions 21 and 22. Once the application receives this information, it uses the information to connect to the RUCKUS IoT Controller over the PubsSub channel.

You can use the DHCP Option 43 sub-option code 06 to set the SCG/vSZ/SZ IP address in the format SubCode /Length/ (Value In Hex). For example : If the IP address is 10.24.123.4, then the hex string is as follows 06 0b 31302e32342e31323332e34.

The DHCP Option 43 sub-option code 21 and 22 is used to set the Ruckus IOT controller IP address.

Step 3: Configuring the RUCKUS IoT Controller and Initializing IoT Services

Linux DHCP option 43, sub option 21 configuration is as follows:

- option RKUS.scg-address "192.168.0.3"
- option RKUS.riot-address "192.168.0.2";

dhcp_opt43 configuration subopt 22- "vlan_mode.vlan_id"

- #option RKUS.iotvlan-address "0.4" -enables onlink VLAN
 - #option RKUS.iotvlan-address "1.4" -enables offlink VLAN
- Offlink VLAN configuration is used when the IOT Gateway/AP and IOT controller are in different networks.
 - Onlink VLAN configuration is used when the IOT Gateway/AP and IOT controller are in same network.

Step 3: Configuring the RUCKUS IoT Controller and Initializing IoT Services

The RUCKUS IoT APs and devices can be managed using the RUCKUS IoT Controller.

Before you begin configuring RUCKUS IoT Controller services, consider the following prerequisites:

- The controller must be installed on a hypervisor.
- The RUCKUS IoT Module must be installed on the RUCKUS AP.
- The required credentials to log in to the RUCKUS IoT Controller must be secured.
