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## **About This Guide**

This User Guide provides information on how to set up and manage the Ruckus Wireless<sup>™</sup> SmartPositioning Technology (SPoT<sup>™</sup>) system for use in gathering location data from Ruckus Wireless WiFi controllers and Access Points.

This guide is written for service operators and system administrators who are responsible for managing, configuring, and troubleshooting Wi-Fi networks. It assumes a basic working knowledge of local area networks, wireless networking, and wireless devices.

**NOTE** Refer to the release notes shipped with your product to be aware of certain challenges when upgrading to this release.

# Introducing the Ruckus Wireless SmartPositioning Technology (SPoT) Solution

SPoT enables retailers, stadiums, and transportation hubs to enhance the way they interact with customers based on precise location.

Many organizations face these simple and important, but sometimes difficult to answer questions:

- How can I help my customers navigate through the large mall and deliver timely coupons to get their business?
- How much of my business last week was due to repeat customers?
- How long did passengers have to wait on average for their train?

The Ruckus Wireless SPoT solution provides the necessary intelligence to answer these questions. Specifically, location-sensitive and public-facing organizations can benefit from these services:

- Indoor way-finding in complex environments, for both customers and employees
- Delivering highly-relevant, geo-targeted advertising and promotions
- Footfall analytics
- Understanding in-facility customer behavior
- Improving the guest experience

With accurate indoor positioning that is cost-effective, and simple to deploy and use, enterprises can now create the right indoor contexts for marketing campaigns, develop comprehensive footfall analysis and provide varied forms of digital concierge services to customers and employees. These location based services and the intelligence they inherently provide can benefit a number of markets, including:

- Retail
- Hospitality
- Healthcare
- Education
- Warehousing and logistics
- Smart cities/Government
- Convention and event logistics

Ruckus SPoT makes it simple to navigate complex indoor environments, study footfall trends, and enable context driven content delivery, turning wireless LAN systems into indispensable tools for businesses and customers alike.

## How It Works

The Ruckus SmartPositioning solution collects the RSSI information of mobile clients from an existing Ruckus ZoneFlex deployment, and pushes the information to a SPoT server in the cloud. The SPoT server then computes location estimates from the RSSI information and pushes the location estimates to an API server, which allows the relevant customer-facing applications to consume the location data through a set of APIs.

The Ruckus SPoT smart positioning solution includes the following components:

- SPoT Positioning Engine pinpoints in real time a user's location in any Ruckus WiFi-enabled environment.
- SPoT Location Analytics Dashboard delivers a rich set of client location information.
- SPoT Engagement Tools including a set of APIs to power a new generation of mobile apps. These tools empower developers to build "Location Intelligent" features into a new generation of mobile applications.

## **SPoT Server Topology**

This section illustrates and describes the SPoT Server topology.

The cloud-based SPoT software is hosted at a cloud provider's data center. A high level architecture for the SPoT Server and other required components is illustrated in Figure 1: SmartPositioning high level architecture on page 10.


**NOTE** Ruckus also offers a virtualized version of SPoT (virtual SPoT, or vSPoT) that can be installed on a virtual machine on customer's premises. For more information, see the *vSPoT Installation Guide*, available from support.ruckuswireless.com.

**NOTE** For the purposes of this document, the terms "SPoT" and "vSPoT" generally refer to the cloud-hosted and virtual versions of Ruckus SmartPositioning Technology (SPoT), respectively. In many cases, the term "SPoT" collectively refers to both the cloud-hosted and virtual SPoT versions, while "vSPoT" refers to the virtual application only.

The complete SmartPositioning solution consists of the following components:

- Wireless Infrastructure
- Venues
- SPoT Server
- API Server
- SPoT Administration Portal
- Analytics Dashboard
- Calibrator App

## Wireless Infrastructure

SPoT is designed to work with either a ZoneDirector or SmartZone controller, along with supported Access Points running a supported controller AP firmware.

Each controller + AP group corresponds to a specific Venue (for example, a shopping mall or a public event). The following controllers are supported:

- ZoneDirector controller + ZoneFlex APs:
  - ZD 1100
  - ZD 1200
  - ZD 3000
  - ZD 5000
- SmartZone controller + SmartZone APs:
  - SmartCell Gateway 200 (SCG 200)
  - SmartZone 100 (SZ-100)
  - virtual SmartZone (vSZ)

#### Venues

Venues are the primary resource managed by a SPoT deployment.

Each venue represents a physical space that can vary in size from a small room to a large multistory building. Each venue should correspond to a specific AP Group on ZoneDirector, or an AP Zone on SmartZone controllers.

## SPoT Server

This section describes how the SPoT server works.

Each venue reports the necessary RSSI data to a SPoT Server, which receives and collates all the data from the wireless infrastructure and communicates with a ZoneDirector or SmartZone controller for any settings, configuration and management requirements.

The SPoT Server then forwards the data to a load balancer to distribute the computing load (essentially the positioning algorithm) among multiple Locator nodes. Each Locator is a virtualized computing node and it executes the core indoor positioning algorithm to calculate the location for a particular detected WiFi device. The Locators have the ability to be scaled horizontally to ensure scalability and optimal use of cloud resources.

## **API Server**

This section describes how the API server works.

The API server serves as a repository of the location estimates from the Locators. The External (Post Engine) API set is the interface through which applications, both 3rd party and those developed internally by Ruckus, connect with the SmartPositioning platform. Applications that require the location estimates can access the database in the API server through a set of RESTful JSON APIs over HTTPS for security and privacy.

The External (Post Engine) API allows applications to have access to the following resources:

- Accounts: User accounts are categorized into one of 3 roles: Admin, Calibrator, and Consumer.
- Venues: Venue administration is under the jurisdiction of the Admin user role.
- Radio Maps: Contain the necessary calibrated data, floor plans and zone information.
- Floors: Subset of a Radio Map for a particular floor.
- Zone Maps: Subset of a floor plan for a particular zone.
- **Zones**: Information regarding a zone that can be arbitrarily designed.
- Calibration Points: Contain the RSS reports from each AP for each calibration point.
- Access Points: Location information for each AP.
- Locations: Consumers of location data will be able to query the database in different ways.

NOTE For more information on SPoT API usage, see Using the API Explorer.

## **SPoT Administration Portal**

The SPoT Administration Portal is the web-based interface used to manage and configure your venues, maps, access points and user accounts.

## **Analytics Dashboard**

The Analytics Dashboard serves as an out-of-the-box SmartPositioning application that is usable across verticals.

This is the primary Ruckus-developed tool for consumption of location data; however the provision of a post-engine API allows third party developers to develop their own applications that can use the raw location data in different ways.

## **Calibrator App**

The Calibrator app is a free Ruckus app for Android and iOS that is used to calibrate the system to accommodate each venue's particular RF environment.

This app must be installed and run on a mobile device while walking around the venue to calibrate the SmartPositioning location algorithm.

**NOTE** The Calibrator App is not required for all Ruckus SPoT products (specifically, SPoT Presence does not require calibration). See SPoT Presence for more information.


## A Typical Deployment

This section describes the key steps involved in deploying the Ruckus SPoT solution for a venue.

# Setting up a Venue for a SPoT Service 2

This section describes the steps required for setup and configuration of a venue for SPoT location service.

Some steps are required to be completed by the customer, while some are performed by Ruckus Sales/Support personnel or a Ruckus value-added reseller.

**NOTE** For vSPoT, you will need to perform additional steps prior to beginning this procedure. For instructions on vSPoT virtual server installation and configuration, see the vSPoT Installation Guide, available from support.ruckuswireless.com.

The setup process consists of the following steps:

- Step 1: Perform a Site Survey
- Step 2: Obtain SPoT License and Log In to Your SPoT Account
- Step 3: Access the SPoT Admin Dashboard
- Step 4: Map Creation and Venue Server Instantiation
- Step 5: Adding Access Point MAC Addresses
- Step 6: Prepare the Controller/Access Point Deployment for SPoT Calibration
- Step 7: Perform the Calibration Process

**NOTE** For SPoT Presence, you do not need to perform the site survey, map creation or calibration steps in this procedure. See SPoT Presence for more information.

## Step 1: Perform a Site Survey

The site survey should be completed by the customer as per any WiFi installation.

As a rule of thumb, for any location in the venue, at least 3 APs should be able to hear a mobile client with at least an RSS of -85 dBm in order to achieve the best performance. For more information on best practices for performing the site survey for SPoT location service, see the SPoT Best Practices Guide, available from the Ruckus Support website.

# Step 2: Obtain SPoT License and Log In to Your SPoT Account

Once you have purchased your SPoT license, you will receive an email notification with instructions on how to access your account in the SPoT Admin portal. For further instructions, please see Requesting an Account.

Once your account is set up in the relevant SPoT data center, you may access your account in the SPoT Admin Portal via the relevant URL as follows:

- US: https://us-sys.ruckuslbs.com
- Europe: https://eu-sys.ruckuslbs.com

Follow the on-screen instructions and configure your SPoT account settings.

## Step 3: Access the SPoT Admin Dashboard

Access the SPoT Admin Dashboard to create a new venue. Creating a Venue includes several required tasks such as activating the licenses, creating a venue ID and entering the postal address of the venue. After this is completed, click on **Create Your Own Map** in Radio Maps to create a map of your venue that is compatible with the requirements of SPoT. The figure shows an example of a floorplan map with locations of APs indicated. The map file can be in any common image format such as JPG, PNG, etc.

You can also take a quick web tour of the various pages by clicking on the **Take a Tour** button on the top left hand corner. Snippets of information are also available by clicking on the question mark icons. For more information on accessing and using the SPoT Admin Dashboard, see Navigating the Dashboard.




Figure 3: Sample map with AP locations indicated

## Step 4: Map Creation and Venue Server Instantiation

The following procedures describe the steps required to create venue maps for SPoT deployment using the SPoT Admin Portal.

#### **Create Your Own Maps**

Use the following procedure to create your own maps using the SPoT admin portal's built-in map creation tools:

- 1. On the SPoT Admin Dashboard, go to Radio Maps.
- 2. Click Create Radio Map.
- 3. In Radio Map Settings, enter a Name for this radio map.

**NOTE** Only lowercase letters, numbers, underscores and dashes are accepted. (Do not use spaces in your map name.) Also, do not leave this field empty. If you leave it empty and try to create a map first, you will have to start over.

- 4. (Optional) Enter a **Description** to help you identify this radio map.
- 5. Click the Start Mapping button.

- 6. If you would like to make edits on an existing radio map, select it from the **Import** from drop-down list.
- 7. Click Start Mapping.

**NOTE** If you are editing an existing radio map, the steps involved are the same as creating a new one. To change the background map of an existing radio map, be sure to properly align and overlay the new map over the old one. Ensure that the resolution of the map images remain the same or else the calibration cannot be retained.

**NOTE** If you are editing an existing radio map, note that if any AP or calibration point is removed or shifted, the calibration data will not be migrated over. This means that calibration needs to be performed again for the new radio map.


Figure 7: Enter a Floor name



**9.** Click **Choose Your File...** and select your map file. It may take several seconds for the map to load. Wait for the map to load.

NOTE The maximum file size of each uploaded map is 7MB.

Figure 8: Choose your map file




- 10. Once the map file is loaded, the first step is to Scale & Position Your Map.
- **11.** First, grab your map image and position it within the window. Adjust the size of the map image using "click-and-drag" at the edges.
- 12 Click Start Scale Input.
- **13.** Click two points on the map for which the distance between them is known.

Figure 9: Scale your map by selecting two points and entering the distance in mm




**14.** Click **Next**. The next step is to plot the coverage area. Do so by clicking each corner of the map around the edges. The coverage area is displayed as a grey shaded area overlaying your map.

**15.** Click **Next**. The *Add Access Points* screen appears. Click each point on the map to indicate the locations of your APs. If your map already has APs marked (as in this example), simply click once on each of the points. When finished, click **Next**.

**NOTE** At this point, a pop-up message appears to notify you that you can choose to proceed without calibration using the calibration-free locator method (Calibration-free SPoT and SPoT Presence). Click **Next** to proceed without calibration.

**16.** Add Calibration Points (CPs). The more CPs you add, the more data SPoT will be able to collect, and therefore the more precise your output will be. On the other hand, you will have to manually calibrate each CP twice (once for each radio), so take that into consideration. CPs that you have added are displayed as blue dots on the map. If you make a mistake, click **Clear** and start over.



Figure 12: Add Calibration Points


When finished, click **Next**. The next step is to **Add Zones**. (This step is optional. If you do not wish to create zones, you can skip this step.) Add Zones to demarcate areas of interest within the coverage area. Zones provide the ability to collect location data for these areas separately from the entire venue. To add a Zone, click **New**, enter a **Name** for the zone, and click **OK**.

17. Define the Zone by clicking the corners of the zone to be defined. The zone is displayed as a colored overlay on the map. You may define as many zones as you wish and each zone will be represented by a different color. For regions where the zones overlap, the top-most zone will take precedence.

- **18.** Click **End** to save the zone. To create multiple zones, click **New** and repeat the process. When finished creating all the zones you want to create, click **Finish**.
- **19.** You will return to the *Create Radio Map* page. If you want to make any changes to AP or CP locations, click **Edit** in the Mapping section to edit your map.
- **20.** Click **Save** to save your map. It may take several minutes to complete the map creation. Once completed, the screen displays a "The following floors will be created" message.

- **21.** To make changes, click **Edit**. Once you are satisfied with the floors you have created, click **Save**.
- 22. The system begins processing the radio map you created. Once complete, the screen displays the message, "Radio Map was successfully created."

- **23.** At this point, your map files have been completed and you can view the following files from your browser:
  - original.svg: An SVG version of your map with APs and CPs denoted.
  - venue.yml: A YAML file with details on your APs and CPs.
  - venue\_calibration.yml: A YAML file with calibration details on all CPs. These values will be empty until you have performed calibration. See Performing the Wireless Positioning Calibration.
  - [Floor Name].png: A PNG version of your floor map.

- [Floor Name]\_annotated.png: A PNG version of your floor map with CPs annotated.
- [Floor Name]\_zone\_sections.png: A PNG file displaying the Zones you defined.

Your SPoT server will be provisioned within the next 24 business hours if this venue has the necessary SPoT licenses. An email notification will be sent when the server is provisioned and ready for calibration.

## Step 5: Adding Access Point MAC Addresses

The following procedures describe the steps required to add the MAC address of the access point.

The MAC address must be filled in the access point page. The AP MAC address must coincide with the AP position on the map created in the Create Your Own Map process.

#### Adding the MAC Address

- 1. From the **Venues** list, click the **Access Points** link to edit the venue. A list of fields with (not set) is displayed along with the AP numbering from the Map.
- 2. Click Edit Access Points to view the page. Mouse over a name to display the AP floor number and the X and Y coordinates of the floor map.
- **3.** Fill in the MAC address of the AP you wish to update.
- 4. Click Save to confirm your changes.

**NOTE** If the AP is used in a venue it cannot be added to another venue since the AP cannot be used in two places. Ensure that the AP MAC address is deleted from a venue before using it with another AP.

# Step 6: Prepare the Controller/Access Point Deployment for SPoT Calibration

Once the Venue has been created and the WiFi infrastructure is installed and ready, access the ZoneDirector or SmartZone controller web interface and configure the Location Services so that communication between controller/APs and the SPoT Server can be established automatically.

See the following sections for the relevant controller configuration procedures:

- ZoneDirector
- SmartZone

## Zone Director Configuration for Location Service Support

To configure ZoneDirector for location service support.

- **1.** Log into ZoneDirector.
- 2. Go to Configure > Access Points.
- In the AP groups section, click Create New or Edit to configure an AP group for SPoT system integration.
- 4. In the Location Services section, click Enable.
- 5. Enter the Venue Name that you configured on the SPoT Admin dashboard.
- Enter the SPoT Server's FQDN (Fully Qualified Domain Name), and Server Port number. The FQDN, server port number and password are available from the SPot Admin Dashboard, on the Venues > Config page.
- 7. Enter a Password for secure communication with the SPoT Server.
- 8. Click OK to save your changes.

#### Ensuring That ZoneDirector Can Communicate with the SPoT Server

Once the location service has been configured, you should ensure that the controller can communicate with the SPoT server.

To verify ZoneDirector and AP connectivity with the SPoT server:

- 1. Log into the ZoneDirector Web interface, and go to Monitor > Location Services.
- 2. Verify that the Status column in the Location Server Status table displays "Connected."

You can also check connectivity via ZoneDirector CLI using the ping command. If the ping is unsuccessful, the following information can be used for troubleshooting.

#### Firewall rules that may be applicable

All traffic flows are initiated from IN (behind firewall) to OUT (Internet) direction. Typically, such flows do not require rules to be added to the firewall explicitly. However, it is always a good idea to have these firewall rules handy in case of any network connectivity issues. If you must input a "destination" name in a firewall rule instead of "any," use the same FQDN name that you configured on the controller's Location Services configuration page.

#### Proper DNS Resolution of FQDN

Ensure that the DNS server is able to properly resolve the SPoT server's FQDN. You can check this easily by doing a ping test from either the controller or the AP.

#### Making Sure the Controller Maintains the Correct Time

Ensuring that the clocks are well synchronized is of critical importance to SPoT location accuracy. To ensure that the controller keeps the correct time, Ruckus recommends using a Network Time Protocol (NTP) server and setting the controller's system time to your local time zone.

**NOTE** Very close NTP synchronization between controller, APs and the SPoT Location server is a very a critical step to success. Being out of sync by about 40 seconds prevents the APs from showing green on the SPoT Admin dashboard.

To ensure ZoneDirector maintains the correct time:

- 1. Go to Configure > System.
- 2. Scroll down to the System Time section, and verify that the Use NTP to synchronize the ZoneDirector clock automatically check box is enabled. ZoneDirector uses the Ruckus Wireless NTP server (ntp.ruckuswireless.com) by default, or you can enter the IP address of a different NTP server if you prefer.
- **3.** Choose your time zone from the **Select time zone for your location** drop-down menu.
- 4. Click **Refresh** and verify that the time displayed is the proper time for your time zone.
- 5. Click Apply to save your changes (if you made any changes).

#### Preparing the AP Group for Calibration

Once you have confirmed successful communication between the controller and the SPoT server, you must configure the AP group for SPoT calibration. This consists primarily of configuring an AP Group to use only a single channel for 2.4 GHz radio calibration and a single channel for 5 GHz radio calibration. After calibration is complete, you can set the channels back to your preferred channel choices.

To configure the AP group for calibration:

 On the Configure > Access Points page, Edit the relevant AP group. In Channel Range Settings > Radio B/G/N (2.4G), select Override System Default, and deselect all channels but one (channel 1, 6 or 11 is recommended). In Channel Range Settings > Radio A/N/AC (5G) Indoor, select Override System Default, and deselect all channels but one (any 5 GHz channel can be used). Click OK to save your changes.

**NOTE** After calibration is completed, the AP group should be re-configured to allow only channels 1, 6 and 11 on the 2.4 GHz radio. The 5 GHz radio can be configured with any 3 channels that you prefer.

#### Create Two Special SSIDs for Calibration

**NOTE** This step is not required for SPoT Presence.

For calibration purposes you will need to create two special WLANs (one 2.4 GHz and one 5 GHz WLAN) for calibration purposes only. After calibration is complete, you can delete these WLANs.

- 1. Go to Configure > WLANs, and click Create New in the WLANs section.
- 2. Enter a Name for the WLAN (e.g., "Calibration SSID").
- **3.** Choose **Standard Usage**, **Open**, **WPA2** and **AES** for *Type*, *Authentication Method*, *Encryption Method* and *Encryption Algorithm*.
- 4. Enter a Passphrase.
- 5. Click OK to save your changes.
- **6.** Make sure the mobile device is associated with the calibration SSID before starting calibration.

**NOTE** After calibration, remember to delete the calibration SSIDs and change the AP group channel selection to channels 1, 6 and 11 on the 2.4 GHz radio, and any three channels on the 5 GHz radio.

#### Verify AP Connection Status from the SPoT Admin Dashboard

The final test to ensure everything is up and running properly prior to performing calibration is to verify the AP connection status from the SPoT Admin dashboard.

 Go to https://us-sys.ruckuslbs.com/admin/venues/ to view a list of Venues. Click the Manage Access Points link next to the Venue that you will be calibrating. Verify that the Status icon for each AP is green.

**NOTE** If the status icon is **amber**, this means that the time is out of synchronization with the AP by more than +/-5 seconds. Ensure that the controller is configured with a valid NTP server and perform a time sync between the APs and the controller.

## **Step 7: Perform the Calibration Process**

**NOTE** For SPoT Presence, you do not need to perform calibration. See SPoT Presence for more information.

After the controller configuration is complete and you have confirmed that the controller and its APs can communicate with the SPoT server, calibration can proceed. The calibration process consists carrying a mobile device with the calibration app running and standing at each of the designated calibration points for about 30 seconds per radio band to allow the APs to collect sufficient RSS information. The RSS data collected during the calibration process is then saved as a radio map. See Performing the Wireless Positioning Calibration for more information.

# Performing the Wireless Positioning Calibration

This section describes the calibration process which must be performed for a venue so that the APs can accurately calculate wireless client locations.

**NOTE** For SPoT Presence, you do not need to perform calibration. See SPoT Presence for more information.

## **Calibrator Process Overview**

This section provides you with an overview of the calibrator process.

Calibration must be performed once on each radio band (2.4 GHz and 5 GHz) for each calibration point. For each calibration point, 30 seconds is recommended between the start and end calibration calls to allow the system to collect sufficient signal reports to determine the point's observation matrix (OM). During this period the person performing the calibration should stand on the spot and slowly turn 360° to allow the signal fluctuations caused by the human body to average out. The SPoT Calibrator App is available for iOS and Android operating systems, and can be downloaded directly from the Google Play Store or the Apple iTunes App Store. See the relevant section depending on which operating system your device is running:

- Android SPoT Calibrator App Instructions
- iOS SPoT Calibrator App Instructions

## Android SPoT Calibrator App Instructions

The instructions in this section, describe the steps required to perform SPoT venue calibration using the Android version of the SPoT Calibrator App.

**NOTE** The SSID or Network auto switch feature has been removed since the latest Android versions have a security constraints on third party application auto switching the device's network. You need to manually connect the device to the SSID of the desired band before calibrating a point for that band.

Use the following procedure to perform the venue calibration:

1. Download and install the Ruckus SPoT calibration app.

NOTE The device on which the calibration app is run must have Internet access.

2. Go to Settings > WiFi and make sure the WiFi function is turned on.

- 3. Connect to the 2.4 GHz SSID that you created for SPoT calibration.
- **4.** Launch the SPoT Calibrator app.
- 5. Click the Gear icon to open the Settings.




Figure 28: Select a Venue




### Figure 30: Start calibration





Figure 34: Press the "i" button to display calibration summary












Figure 50: Retrieving MAC address








Figure 54: Calibration is Complete


Figure 56: Calibration status legend


Figure 57: Repeat the calibration process for the 5 GHz radio





Figure 58: Green dots indicate calibration completed





Figure 60: Calibration Point Summary








Figure 66: Turn slowly around 360 degrees on the spot




Figure 70: Calibration Point Summary




Figure 72: Click the location icon to display your current location on the map





# **Locator Test Feature**

The locator test feature is an enhancement of the existing locator feature.

The locator test feature is an enhancement of the existing locator feature. Where the locator is currently able to show the latest location of a device, the locator test feature is used to test location accuracy within a venue.

The locator shows the latest location of a device and test feature enables users to collect n number of locations for n number of test points, before presenting it as a report for end-users to statistically determine the accuracy of a SPoT deployment.

#### Location Accuracy in the Venue

The location accuracy in the venue will only be as good as per the data collected during calibration, which is the basis of RF Fingerprinting technique used by SPoT.

The elements that affect this are detailed below.

The locator test reports the error between actual positioning of the device and where SPoT positions the device. If there is good location accuracy in the venue, the test results will reflect this and vice versa.

A number of factors causes the variations in the location accuracy of the venue, which reflects in the test results.

1. Device used: The device used during calibration should be used during the locator test. The Calibration data collected is resultant from the device used and so the best reflection of location accuracy is seen when the same device is used during the locator test. The device should be charged fully or have at a minimum 50% battery

power. Most devices send weaker RSSI (received signal strength indicator) as the battery life deteriorates.

- 2. Time of locator test: The RSS within a venue fluctuates depending on multiple factors. The locator test should be taken in an environment that best reflects when the calibration was done.
- 3. Position of test points:
  - **a.** The accuracy within a venue is not static due to:
    - a. The nature of WiFi as a radio wave
    - b. RSS is different in every part of the venue
    - **c.** The dynamic environment of each venue.

Some areas will therefore have better accuracy than others. Typically, the accuracy would be best when the test device is near an AP and visible to another two (2) APs that are on the same channel. In areas where the device can only be seen by 1 or 2 APs, the accuracy results will be poor.







# **Introduction to SPoT Presence**

SPoT Presence provides customers with the ability to use SPoT location data from a ZoneDirector AP group or SmartZone AP zone for estimating client locations without having to perform the calibration steps.

SPoT Presence provides a less precise - but lower cost - option for customers who do not need precise location data on a map. The typical SPoT deployment (after calibration) provides up to 3-8 meter accuracy (90% confidence level, when the network is designed for SPoT).

SPoT Presence, on the other hand, does not require calibration but provides only clients' estimated proximity to an AP. The SPoT Presence deployment is completely automated - APs begin sending location data to the location server immediately after configuring the ZoneDirector AP group or SmartZone AP zone with SPoT location server information. No site survey, map configuration or calibration is required.

The primary differences between SPoT and SPoT Presence are summarized in the following table.

	SPoT	SPoT Presence
Location Accuracy	Point with calibration: 3m to 10m accuracy. 80% confidence. Point without calibration: average 10m	Able to detect WiFi devices up to 20-30 meters away from AP. WiFi device positioned at the nearest AP.

# How it Works

SPoT Presence works the same way as SPoT - APs send client location data to the SPoT Location Server, which then delivers that information to the SPoT Analytics Engine, which in turn produces output for monitoring client location (proximity) statistics in the Analytics Dashboard.

The location server considers each AP group as a venue, and each AP within that AP group as a zone within the venue.

# **Overview of the Setup Process**

The setup process for SPoT Presence is considerably simpler than for SPoT.

The required steps are as follows:

- 1. Create Your SPoT Account (as described in Step 2: Obtain SPoT License and Log In to Your SPoT Account).
- 2. Create your venue maps (as described in Step 4: Map Creation and Venue Server Instantiation).
- **3.** Access the SPoT Admin Dashboard (as described in Step 3: Access the SPoT Admin Dashboard).
- 4. Configure the ZoneDirector AP Group or SmartZone AP zone for communication with the SPoT Location Server (as described in Step 6: Prepare the Controller/Access Point Deployment for SPoT Calibration).
- 5. Begin using SPoT Presence for monitoring client association to your APs.

## **Calibration Process**

Calibration is not required for SPoT Presence.

Once your SPoT Presence account is set up and your ZoneDirector AP Group or SmartZone AP zone has been configured with the SPoT location server information, APs will begin sending location data to the SPoT location server.

#### **Map Management**

Map management is required for SPoT Presence. AP locations must be plotted on the venue map, however AP calibration is not required.

SPoT Presence provides all of the Dashboard views available to a typical SPoT deployment on the Analytics Dashboard.

Specifically, the Analytics Dashboard for SPoT Presence includes:

- Days Since Last Visit
- Heatmap
- Real-time Asset Tracking




Figure 96: Enter geolocation details manually

## **MQTT PSK Reset / Rotation**

From vSPoT version 3.4.x, you can reset the MQTT PSK password, which is used for (1) pre-engine API with APs or Controllers, and (2) Location Push API. This functionality is available in both SPoT and vSPoT.

After reset, the new MQTT PSK must be updated in (1) the management portal for Ruckus AP controllers, and (2) any MQTT broker/client applications that subscribe to SPoT. The following is the procedure for resetting the MQTT PSK password.

#### **Pre-requisites**

- Administrator accounts for accessing (1) SPoT Admin Dashboard for venue configuration, and (2) management portal for Ruckus AP controllers.
- Administrator needs to have relevant knowledge and permissions to update the changed MQTT PSK to any MQTT broker/client applications that subscribe to SPoT.

Figure 99: vSPoT login









## **Access Points**



## **Creating a New User**




Figure 116: Heatmap





Figure 121: Repeat Count









## **Real-time Data View Options**

This section explains the real-time data view options available, namely Heatmap and Tracking.

The Real-time data view contains two tabs at the top of the page - **Heatmap** and **Tracking**. The Heatmap display is the same as the Heatmap view on the Historical Data view (see Using the Heatmap), except that it only displays the current, real-time information, and therefore does not provide options for adjusting the time period to view.

The **Tracking** tab allows you to track assets in real-time in your venue.

#### **Asset Tracking**

SPoT and vSPoT can be used for real-time device tracking purposes.

By providing a catalog of WiFi devices to be tracked via a CSV file upload, the real time position of these Devices will be displayed on the Analytics Dashboard under **Real-Time** > **Tracking**. Devices not listed in the Catalog will also be displayed as Unlisted devices.

#### Uploading a List of Devices to be Tracked

In the SPoT Admin Portal under the **Config** tab, users can upload a CSV list of devices to be tracked in the **Device Catalogue** section. The format of the list should be as follows.

- Column 1: Group Allows the user to categorize and group devices for easier search
- Column 2: Device ID Arbitrary description for the device
- Column 3: MAC address WiFi MAC address of device. This is the only compulsory information needed.

Group and Device ID may be left blank.

After the CSV file has been uploaded, SPoT will validate the MAC addresses. Invalid MAC addresses will be filtered to the top of a CSV file that can be downloaded by the user. The user may choose to edit the MAC addresses and upload the edited .csv file or choose to leave it as is. If the MAC address is not correct, the device will not be trackable.

#### WiFi Device Tracking

To view the Tracker in the Analytics Dashboard, select **Real-time** data and click the **Tracking** tab.

To see all devices that have been cataloged in the CSV upload, choose **Select All** from the first drop-down menu and click **Add**.

To view the real time position of a group of devices within the catalogue, select the Group from the first menu. You can also display only specific devices within a Group using the second drop-down menu, by selecting each device's MAC address and clicking **Add**.

Cataloged devices detected within the last 1 minute will be shown with a Blue Icon. If devices are not detected within the current minute and were last detected within the last 7 days, the last known position of the device will be shown as an Orange Icon. For both Blue and Orange Icons, The Group, Device ID and MAC address of the device is available next to the Icons to help users identify the device. Users who want to see the real time position of unlisted devices may check the Show Unlisted Devices box. The position of

the devices is indicated with a Black lcon on the map and the MAC Address of the device will be displayed next to it.

When devices located are on separate floors, a "There are more devices detected on other floors" notice will be displayed below the floor selector. There will be instances where WiFi devices are detected but SPoT is unable to determine their location. These are referred to as outliers. For such occurrences, Outlier will be indicated next to the Device information. A table view is also available for users who prefer to view the asset tracking information in table format. Click the **Table View** button to view the asset Tracking Table.

The Configuration page on the SPoT Admin portal provides a number of options that allow you to configure various parameters for your SPoT venue according to your needs.


## **Configuring Analytics Dashboard Settings**

The Analytics Dashboard configuration settings allow you to configure the Heatmap, Dwell Time and Repeat Visitor distribution graphs.

You can configure the following:

- Adjust the scale of the heatmap colorbar
- Adjust the radius of the heatmap bubbles
- Adjust the bin sizes of the Dwell Time and Repeat Visitor distribution graphs

#### Adjusting the Scale of the Heatmap Colorbar


You can control the contrasts of the heatmap colors according to the crowd level of your venue, by adjusting the scale of the colorbar in the heatmaps.

You can do this adjustment for all the heatmaps with different time periods, namely real-time, hourly, daily, weekly, monthly and yearly heatmaps.



For example, the screenshot shows the daily heatmap with the maximum colorbar value set to 5000. As you can see, the color contrast is low and is predominately blue, which does not help to elucidate the hotspots.

Figure 134: Daily heatmap with colorbar maximum set to 5000






## Adjusting the Radius of Heatmap Bubbles

This parameter allows you to adjust the size of the heatmap bubble used to represent a detected device and will change the outlook of the heatmap. The unit is millimeters.

For example, in the figure, the radius is set to 3000mm, i.e. each detected device is represented by a bubble with a radius of 3m. And when neighboring bubbles overlap, they will be fused to create a larger bubble and the impression count number will be summed up accordingly.


Figure 136: Heatmap bubble radius of 3000mm.

The figure shows an example where the bubble radius is reduced to 1500mm. Notice how the bubbles have become smaller and the count number has reduced for each bubble. This is because when the bubbles do not overlap, the impression counts will not be summed up too.

By adjusting both the radius and scale of the color bar simultaneously, you can zoom in and out of the dataset – think of it as adjusting the scale of a graph.

## Adjusting the Bin Size of Dwell Time and Repeat Visitor Graphs



Figure 139: Dwell time distribution






**NOTE** If you switch from either "SPoT Point without Calibration" or "SPoT Presence" to "SPoT Point with Calibration," please ensure that the radio map has calibration points inserted and proper calibration has been completed.

# Fine Tuning the Location Algorithm to Improve SPoT Location Accuracy

The core location engine in SPoT is a highly sophisticated algorithm that includes several parameters that can be adjusted to optimize location accuracy.

The figure shows a summary of the menu list under the Location algorithm heading.

In general there are 5 categories:

- 1. Basic location parameters for the 2.4 GHz band.
- 2. Identical set of parameters for the 5 GHz band.
- 3. Parameters for floor selection in multi-floor venues.
- 4. RSSI smoothing filter to adjust the trade-off between latency and accuracy.
- **5.** Motion smoothing filter to set the average walking speed to further fine-tune the algorithm.

# Basic Parameters for 2.4 GHz / 5 GHz for SPoT Point with Calibration

## Number of APs to use for location calculation

This parameter determines how many APs you would like to use for location when the APs are arranged in a descending RSSI order. For example, if you enter 4, it means that we want to use the top 4 APs with the strongest RSSI for location calculation.

Even though you have, say 20 APs in a venue, and 12 APs are able to detect a particular WiFi client, most of these 12 APs will have a very low RSSI as they will be far away from this WiFi client. Thus, we would want to use just the nearest 3 – 4 APs for location purposes and ignore those with lower RSSI which can only introduce more noise into the algorithm.

The table lists recommended values for this parameter.

No. of APs in venue	No. of APs to use for location calculation
1	1
2	2
3-4	3
more than 5	4

Table 7: Recommended number of APs for location

Due to the way we deploy APs, it is highly unlikely that there will be more than 5 APs which are deployed close together (less than 10m apart). Thus in most situations, there is no advantage in using more APs.

Nevertheless, feel free to try with numbers outside the recommended numbers above because every venue is different.

**NOTE** All numerical values entered for number of APs to use for location calculation must be positive integers.

## Number of calibration points to use for location calculation

**NOTE** Not applicable to SPoT Presence.

Calibration points (CP) are the discrete points that have been overlaid on the venue for calibration purposes and you can see them from the Ruckus SPoT calibrator app or under Radio Map in SPoT Admin.

When this parameter is set to 1, the location algorithm will return the location of the CP closest to the estimated location of the WiFi client. In other words, all estimated locations will be discretized and fall on a particular CP.

For a more natural user experience, you should set the parameter to 2 or 3. In this case, the location algorithm will give a weighted average of the 2 or 3 closest CPs as the estimated location for the WiFi device. In other words, the estimated locations may fall anywhere within the venue, even in-between CPs.

**NOTE** Important: All numerical values entered for number of calibration points to use for location calculation have to be positive integers.

## Minimum RSSI below which an outlier is declared

The purpose of this parameter is to set a threshold for RSSI such that poor RSSI readings due to occasional extreme wireless fluctuations can be discarded. The location algorithm will then return an outlier instead of giving a location estimate with poor accuracy.

For instance, if this parameter is set to -85 [dBm], it means that when all the APs that can hear a WiFi client report a RSSI below -85 dBm, an outlier will be declared.

This parameter is a good way for you to adjust the trade-off between accuracy and responsiveness of the location algorithm. If the minimum RSSI is set higher, the location estimates will be better as only the strong readings are used for estimation, but the downside is there will be many instances of outliers.

On the other hand, if the minimum RSSI is set too low, there will be no outliers, but some of the location estimates will have large errors.

An easy way to set this parameter is to look at your calibration data from **SPoT Admin** > **Radio Map > Files > venue\_calibration.yml** as shown below.

Quickly scroll through the venue\_calibration.yml file and determine the approximate average highest RSSI value recorded at each CP. Note that these RSSI values are negative numbers (with dBm as units), so for example, -63 is larger than -86. The table below lists recommended values for this minimum RSSI parameter.

 Table 8: Recommended minimum RSSI values for outlier declaration

Approximate average highest RSS	I value Minimum RSSI for outlier declaration
-60	-75
-70	-85
-80	-90
-90	-95

Avoid using a value lower than -95 as it will mean including many weak RSSI reports for location calculation which will lead to poor accuracy.

If you find that the approximate average highest RSSI value is close to -90 dBm, you should re-evaluate the AP density and locations as the RSSI values are too low for good location accuracy.

**NOTE** All numerical values entered for minimum RSSI below which an outlier is declared must be negative integers.

## Minimum RSSI to trigger floor selection

If you have a multi-floor venue, the location algorithm will need to decide which floor each and every detected device is on, and this logic is triggered based on a minimum RSSI value.

For example if minimum RSSI to trigger floor selection is set to -75, it means that the floor selection logic will be triggered whenever the highest RSSI within a report is more than -75.

Again, there is a trade-off here. If this parameter is set lower, the floor selection will be more sensitive and responsive, but there could be more cases of the wrong floor being selected. On the other hand, if the parameter is set higher, floor selection will be less sensitive and there could be a few seconds time lag, but the probability of error in floor selection will be lower. However, if the parameter is set too high, the floor selection logic might never be activated, so be careful not to set this value too high.

Below is a recommendation for this parameter based on the approximate average highest RSSI value recorded at each CP.

Approximate average highest RSSI value	Minimum RSSI to trigger floor selection
-60	-70
-70	-80
-80	-85
-90	-90

Table 9: Recommended RSSI values for floor selection

**NOTE** All numerical values entered for minimum RSSI to trigger floor selection have to be negative integers.

## Minimum RSSI to trigger nearest AP selection

This option allows you to bypass the location algorithm and push the location estimate directly to the nearest AP. This is useful in use cases where you are only interested in location data on a per-AP level.

Set this value to an unrealistically high RSSI if you don't want to use this feature (for example, -20).

If you would like to use this feature, the table below lists the recommended values for this parameter based on the approximate average highest RSSI value recorded at each CP.

Table 10: Recommended RSSI values for nearest AP selection



**NOTE** All numerical values for minimum RSSI to trigger nearest AP selection must be negative integers.

## Horizontal/Vertical width of immediate search region for the next location calculation

These two parameters define the size of the rectangle for the immediate search region.

Figure 145: Horizontal and vertical widths



As the location algorithm is a real-time location engine, it makes use of the current estimated location to decide on the search region for the next location. This helps to reduce the computation load and prevent sudden "jumps" in location estimates due to wild RSSI fluctuations caused by environmental factors.

The recommended value is 100 for both horizontal and vertical widths. The unit for this parameter is in pixels and can be converted to physical distances by looking at the scale info in **SPoT Admin > Radio Map > Files > venue.yml**, as shown in the figure.

Most venues have a scale of 100, which is 1 pixel:100mm. Thus, if the horizontal/vertical widths are set to 100 [pixels], this corresponds to 10,000mm = 10m on the ground.

NOTE All horizontal/vertical width values must be positive integers.

## Algorithm sensitivity

The default value is 1e-07 and this value should not be changed except in special circumstances (generally for troubleshooting purposes). In specific cases, Ruckus

Customer Support will assist you in adjusting this value if the location accuracy is consistently poor.

#### Floor selection parameters

The default values are 3 for sliding window size and 30 for sliding window timeout. In specific cases, Ruckus Customer Support will assist you in adjusting this value if the location accuracy is consistently poor.

# Location Algorithm Parameters for SPoT Point without Calibration

This section describes the Location Algorithm Parameters for SPoT Point without Calibration.

#### Basic Parameters for 2.4GHz/5GHz

The basic parameters for 2.4GHz/5GHz are as follows:

#### Minimum number of APs to use for location calculation

SPoT Point without calibration works on the principle of identifying the AP with the strongest received RSSI from a client device, and then use the RSSI data from neighbouring APs to compute a location estimate.

For this algorithm to work, we will need at least 1 neighbouring AP. Thus this parameter should not be set below 2.

NOTE All numerical values entered have to be positive integers.

In a dense WiFi deployment, you may increase this parameter to 3 or 4 for better accuracy, but this will also increase the probability of outliers. If the density of WiFi AP is low or normal, setting this parameter to 2 is optimal.

Limitation: In SPoT 2.0, please do not select SPoT Point without calibration if the venue has only 1 AP on any floor. For SPoT Point without calibration to function, there should be at least 2 APs on each floor. However, given that the APs will most likely be operating on different channels, SPoT Point without calibration works best in venues with more than 4 – 5 APs (per floor).

#### Maximum number of neighbouring APs to use for location calculation

Using more APs does not necessarily lead to better accuracy as some of these APs might have very low RSSI which will lead to fallacious location estimate. The default setting of 3 is optimal in most cases.

For a dense WiFi deployment, you may increase it to 4 or 5 to improve the accuracy.

NOTE All numerical values entered have to be positive integers.

## Minimum RSSI below which an outlier is declared

The purpose of this parameter is to set a threshold for RSSI such that poor RSSI readings due to the occasional extreme wireless fluctuations can be discarded. The location algorithm will then return an outlier instead of giving a location estimate with poor accuracy.

For instance, if this parameter is set to -85 [dBm], it means that when all the APs that can hear a WiFi client report a RSSI below -85 dBm, an outlier will be declared. Thus, this parameter is a good way for you to adjust the tradeoff between accuracy and responsiveness of the location algorithm. If the minimum RSSI is set higher, the location estimates will be better as only the strong readings are used for estimation, but the downside is there will be many instances of outliers.

On the other hand, if the minimum RSSI is set too low, there will be no outliers, but some of the location estimates will have large errors.

An easy way to set this parameter is to look at your calibration data from **SPoT Admin** -> **Radio Map -> Files -> venue\_calibration.yml** as shown below.

Quickly scroll through the venue\_calibration.yml file and determine what is the approximate average highest RSSI value recorded at each CP. Do note that these RSSI values are negative numbers (with dBm as its units), so for example, -63 is larger than -86.

Below is a recommendation for this minimum RSSI parameter.

Approximate average highest RSSI value	Minimum RSSI for outlier declaration
-60	-75
-70	-85
-80	-90
-90	-95

Avoid using anything less than -95 as it will mean using many weak RSSI reports for location which will lead to poor accuracy.

If you find that the approximate average highest RSSI value is close to -90 dBm, you should re-evaluate the AP density and locations as the RSSI values are too low for good location accuracy.

**NOTE** All numerical values entered for minimum RSSI below which an outlier is declared have to be negative integers.

## RSSI difference threshold from strongest AP

This parameter is to mitigate cases where there are two APs with the strongest RSSI. In theory, this is possible (if you stand in the middle of the 2 APs), however in practice, the probability of this happening is almost null. Default setting of 1 [dBm] is optimal for most cases.

NOTE All numerical values entered have to be positive integers.

## Neighboring APs RSSI difference threshold

In the algorithm, we avoid using neighbouring APs with RSSI that are too much lower than the strongest AP as a low RSSI indicates that the AP is physically far away from the client device an thus not able to contribute to an accurate location estimate.

The default setting of 15 [dBm] approximately corresponds to inter-AP distance of about 10 – 20m. If the average inter-AP distance in your venue is higher, you will have to increase this parameter accordingly.

Below is a recommendation for various inter-AP distance.

 Table 12: Recommended inter-AP distances

Inter-AP distance	Neighbouring APs RSSI difference threshold
10 – 20m	15

Inter-AP distance	Neighbouring APs RSSI difference threshold
20 – 30m	20
> 30m	25

NOTE All numerical values entered have to be positive integers.

## Path loss factor

This parameter is a proxy to the RF attenuation in your venue. The default setting of 1 is optimal for most typical environments, such as office, shopping malls, retail stores, libraries, etc.

However, if you find that the location estimates in your venue are close to the AP locations, you may increase the path loss factor to adjust the path loss model.

**NOTE** All numerical values entered have to be positive integers.

## Location Algorithm Parameters for SPoT Presence

This section describes the Location Algorithm Parameters for SPoT Presence.

#### Basic Parameters for 2.4GHz/5GHz

The basic parameters for 2.4GHz/5GHz are as follows:

#### **RSSI** cutoff

The RSSI cutoff allows you to decide the listening range of each AP in SPoT Presence mode. Below is a recommendation based on the radial distance from an AP.

 Table 13: Recommended RSSI cutoff values

RSSI cutoff [dBm]	Radial distance from AP [m]
-80	25
-85	35
-95	50


NOTE All numerical values entered have to be negative integers.

## **RSSI** smoothing filter

This is a pre-location engine filter that smoothens out any abrupt RSSI fluctuations to ensure accuracy and stability of the location estimates. Turn on the filter by entering "true" as shown in the figure below. To turn it off, enter "false". The filter sensitivity parameter allows you to adjust the trade-off between stability and latency. If the filter sensitivity is set to a low value (e.g., 2), latency will be low, but the location estimate may appear jumpy at times. On the other hand, when the filter sensitivity is set higher (e.g., 10), the location estimate will be very stable, but latency will be high and location estimates will appear very sluggish in keeping up with movements across the venue.

The default value is 5, and the recommended range is between 2 and 8.

Figure 149: RSSI smoothing filter



NOTE All filter sensitivity values must be positive integers.

## Motion smoothing filter

The motion smoothing filter smoothens abrupt large changes in location estimates within a certain time window. Turn on the filter by entering "true". To turn it off, enter "false".

For example, if the new location estimate is just 2 seconds after the previous estimate, then the difference in distance between the two estimates should not be more than 20m. If the difference is 4 seconds, then the distance should not be more than 40m. This will

help present a more reasonable location estimate, especially in environments with high attenuation, interference and RSSI fluctuations.

The average speed parameter allows you to configure the distance limit with respect to time. For example, if the average speed is set at 1200, it indicates that the stipulated speed of movement is 1200mm per second. In other words, within a second, the distance between two consecutive location estimates cannot be more than 1200mm = 1.2m.

The recommended range is 1000 – 2000, depending on the average speed of movement in your venue. All numerical values entered for motion smoothing filter sensitivity must be positive integers.

**NOTE** All numerical values entered for motion smoothing filter sensitivity must be positive integers.

## **Other Parameters**


This section describes the other parameters required for configuration.

## **AP Reporting Interval**

This parameter configures the reporting interval from the AP to the SPoT location engine.

In short, this parameter decides the time granularity of the location system. The default value is 6 [seconds]. You may choose to lower it if you require a higher time resolution.

**NOTE** All numerical values for AP reporting interval must be positive integers.

## Cache

Configure the number of days to store detected device locations in cache.


These parameters affect the memory performance of SPoT and vSPoT. Large configuration values provide a large data buffer, which significantly increases the memory usage and reduces the performance of SPoT and vSPoT.

**NOTE** Before changing these parameters, do consult with your operations and system administrators teams to ensure that the necessary monitoring tools and processes are in place.

The following are the key parameters.

- 1. Number of days to cache locations (default 7 days): Locations stored in cache provides a backup in the event that *ImportLocations Resque* jobs fails to execute correctly, or fails to restart through the *Resque* user interface. Up to 7 days of locations can be recovered. Changing the configuration to 1 day will help reduce the memory usage..
- 2. Number of days to cache detected devices (default 1 day): Stores last known detected devices, which are shown in the device tracking user interface. Setting to 1 day implies that device tracking will only show devices last detected to one day ago. This is configurable up to 7 days.



## Privacy

This parameter allows you to do a one-way hashing of all the MAC addresses being collected for privacy purposes.

By default, it is set to "false" as shown in the figure below.

A few important notes regarding hashing of MAC addresses:

- Once a MAC address is hashed, you will not be able to retrieve the original MAC address. This is a non-reversible hashing.
- Hashing is not retrospective. In other words, MAC addresses collected before hashing is turned on will not be hashed.
- If hashing is turned on after the SPoT service has been running for a while, statistics related to repeat visitors will be affected as the hashed MAC addresses will be all treated as new visitors when compared against the non-hased MAC addresses. Allow 1-2 weeks for the statistics to accumulate and return to normal.

## **MAC Address Exclusion**

Users who wish to exclude certain MAC Addresses within their venue from being included in their Location Analytics may upload a .csv file into the SPoT Admin Portal Config page.

The exclusion will take place upon the uploading of the .csv file.

The .csv will require a single MAC Address per row and may include as many MAC Addresses as desired.

After the .csv has been uploaded, SPoT will validate the MAC Addresses. Invalid MAC Addresses will be filtered to the top of a .csv file that can be downloaded by the user. The user may choose to edit the MAC Addresses and upload the edited .csv file or choose to leave it as is.



Figure 159: Click List Operations to view a simple list of operations for each section




Figure 160: Click Expand Operations to view a detailed explanation of each API section
